- •An ordinance authorizing the sale and disposal of islation states that whoever municipally owned property which has been determined violates the ordinance is to be no longer needed for municipal purposes, including various police equipment, body cams and lockers.

In an effort to address an issue which City Manager Mike Mallis said has been going on for some time, Bedford Council last week approved legislation to impose a \$1,000 fine per violation on railroad companies when their trains stop on tracks and stall traffic in the city, especially inhibiting safety vehicles from responding to emergency situations.

The legislation, which amends an existing ordinance, states: "No railroad company shall obstruct... a public street, road or highway by permitting a railroad car, locomotive or other obstruction to remain upon or across it for longer than five minutes, to the hindrance or inconvenience of travelers or a person passing along or upon such street, road or highway."

The legislation also states, as it did before, that at the end of each five-minute period of obstruction, "each railroad company shall cause such railroad car... or other obstruction to be removed for sufficient time, not less than three minutes, to allow the passage of persons and vehicles waiting to cross."

While circumstances wholly beyond the control of the railroad company" are excluded from penalty, obstructions, including those caused by stopped trains and trains engaged in switching, loading or un-

partment or the fire department resulting from a violation of this ordinance, the railroad company may be charged a civil fee of \$1,000 per violation by the safety director, which will be imposed for hindering fire, ambulance and police vehicles' ability to respond to emergency calls in a timely manner.

If the fines are not paid within 30 days of the mailing of notice, the amounts will be placed as liens upon the property owner's taxes, in this case, the railroad companies, according to the legislation.

projects, and we were approved," Mallis said. "So we are going to get some funding for the city's portion of Union

Council passed an ordinance at last week's meeting authorizing Mallis to enter into a contract with Vandra Brothers Construction Inc., in reference to the 2021 Road Improvement Program, to include the alternate bid for Nordham Drive repairs and resurfacing, in the amount of \$216,027.50, but not to exceed \$248,000, including construction inspection, engineering fees, remobilization and traffic maintenance.

Council approved an ordinance amending existing legislation authorizing Mallis to enter into a contract with Allied Door Systems LLC, for a second set of touch-free automatic doors at the east and west ends of the Ellenwood Recreation Center, at a cost of \$20,785.

Council also passed the following ordinances: to accept the proposal of J.D. Striping and Service Inc. for longline striping of streets in Bedford at a cost of \$24,965.50; to amend existing legislation to designate Huntington Bank, US Bank, PNC Bank, and First National Bank to be designated as public depositories for active and interim funds of the city for the period from Aug. 23, 2021-Aug. 22, 2026; and to amend the previous appropriations ordinance to make additional appropriations for current expenditures in 2021.

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

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

Home repair resources available for Maple Hts. residents, director reports at council meeting

Maple Heights officials are always working to make residents aware of home repair resources available to them, and also are working to make new home repair resources available in the city, Economic Development Director Patrick Grogan-Myers stated in his report to city council at its meeting last week.

He said the city is still taking applications for the 2021 "Paint The City" program, which offers residents the opportunity to receive a voucher for painting supplies.

Grogan-Myers said that more information about the program is available at www.citymapleheights.com/paintprogram/or by calling the Department of Housing at 216-587-9032. Applications are available on the website, as well as the Building Department's customer service counter and the Department of Housing at Maple Heights City Hall, 5353 Lee Rd.

Grogan-Myers also reported that the city partners with the Cleveland Housing Network Housing Capital to make home repair loans available to Maple Heights residents.

"The home repair funds have gone quickly, so there is a wait list of 13 applications - over \$200,000 in home repairs - waiting for additional funding. We will continue our advocacy work to support the funding of these very important programs," he said.

Housing market improving

"The city's housing market continues to out-perform recent months and years," Grogan-Myers stated, explaining that in June 2021 there were more than 40 buyers and sellers acting independently with a median sales price of more than \$80,000.

He said June 2021 was another strong month for permits been awarded \$150,000 under the 2021 Community

with the Building Department collecting almost \$67,800 in permit fees, registration fees and plan review fees, over \$9,000 more than was collected in June 2020, and over \$27,000 more than what was collected in June 2019.

A total of 178 building permits were issued last month, he said, with work under those permits valued at over \$3.8 million

Hazelwood Ct. legislation approved

At last week's meeting, council approved legislation authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell, on behalf of the Maple Heights Land Reutilization Program, to enter into an amended agreement to sell real estate with PIRHL Acquisitions, LLC, to construct Hazelwood Court, an agerestricted senior housing facility off Broadway Ave. between Dalewood and Waterbury aves.

Grogan-Myers stated that since the May announcement that the project had been awarded Low Income Housing Tax Credits, PIRHL has been hard at work to move the project forward. He said in the coming weeks public meetings will be announced to share details and drawings concerning the project to give residents an idea of what Hazelwood Court will look like.

Other legislation on agenda

Also passed by Maple Heights Council was a resolution authorizing a second change order for Metis Construction Service, increasing the contract by \$119,401.50 for the new Vestibule and Elevator Addition Project at City Hall

In correspondence to council on the need for changes to the construction, City Engineer Ed Hren stated, "The good news is that the city was recently notified that it has been awarded \$150,000 under the 2021 Community

Development Block Grant Program and \$50,000 under the 2021 Community Development Supplemental Grant Program," to fund the additional work, which will include improvements in accessibility per the Americans With Disabilities Act.

Also approved was a resolution authorizing Blackwell to modify the grant agreement with the Ohio Development Services Agency (ODSA) to provide funding for the construction of an outdoor fitness network with security cameras in Stafford Park.

The ODSA had approved the release of \$58,000 from its General Revenue Fund to be used for the "sprayground" at the city pool, but due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the city chose not to open the sprayground for the 2021 season. Subsequently, the ODSA approved modifying the grant agreement for the \$58,000 in funding to be used for the fitness network, including security cameras for the park.

Council also approved a resolution for Blackwell to enter into a Master Cooperation Agreement with Cuyahoga County for pavement preventive maintenance services on Warrensville Center Rd., an ordinance to adopt the alternative tax budget information for the fiscal year beginning Jan. 1, 2022, and a resolution requesting that the county fiscal officer advance taxes and assessments from the proceeds of tax levies for fiscal year 2022.

Two resolutions to sell unimproved city-owned residential lots to separate property owners on Rockside Rd. and Hollywood Ave., were approved by unanimous consent. The property owners stated their interest in using the properties as side yards.

A motion on last week's agenda by council to approve Law Director Frank Consolo's appointment of Marlene J. Ridenour as assistant prosecutor/assistant law director for the city was unanimously passed. Ridenour will replace Christine Londrico, who resigned effective at the end of this month.

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
