Joe Lenart is a unique example of high achievement in to push him off. the Garfield Heights City Schools. He has maintained a 4.0 GPA during all four years at the high school. He began taking Honors courses early on in his high school career, very much enjoying Advanced Placement Government, a course which helped him relate to current events in society, and Honors Physics, which enhanced his problem-solving skills.

Joe reflects on more than 12 years as a student in the Garfield Heights City Schools with pride and affection for his teachers. He first began in kindergarten at William Foster, and then over his academic and co-curricular journey, attended Maple Leaf Elementary School, the Middle School and graduated on Thursday, June 3, from

He credits all of his teachers, proclaiming to remember a piece of wisdom each one had used to encourage him along the way. Joe was a member of this year's Academic Top Ten, maintaining one of the top ten highest grade point averages among the 270 graduating seniors. Joe was also a member of the National Honor Society for two years at the high school.

"The teachers in the Garfield Heights City Schools made a tremendous impact on me," said Joe. "From kindergarten through high school, the Garfield Heights City Schools instructors are top quality and truly care for the 10th straight year.

Joe also credits high school Coach Jeff Papesh with helping to push him to strive for excellence.

When not achieving and succeeding in the classroom, Joe made excellent strides on the field of interscholastic competition. He was a starting pitcher for the Bulldogs this year, winning several games on the mound, and even

Joe Lenart, GHHS academic Sentenced to 40 years for killing of elderly and athletic standout, strives woman, rape of mentally disabled teen girl during series of Slavic Village home invasions

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley has announced that Cornelius Pames, 27, was sentenced to 40 years in prison for numerous crimes he committed in Cleveland's Slavic Village neighborhood between September and October 2018.

"This individual is a monster who terrorized Slavic Village during this three-week crime wave," said Prosecutor O'Malley, "We hope that this will bring a sense of closure to the victims and some tranquility to the residents of this neighborhood."

On August 17, 2018, Pames failed to report to his parole officer, which he had been ordered to do as part of post release control supervision for several prior convictions. In 2014, he was convicted of felonious assault in Lorain County. In 2013, he was convicted of burglary, theft and possessing criminal tools in Cuyahoga County. In 2008, he had juvenile adjudications for rape, aggravated robbery and kidnapping in Cuyahoga County.

On September 12, 2018, Pames and a female victim, 14, were at a Gertrude Ave. residence near E. 65 St., when he pushed her onto a bed, grabbed her shirt and repeatedly tried kissing her despite her resistance before she was able

On September 17, 2018, two more victims, a 94-year-old woman and her 74-year-old daughter, were staying at a family member's Gertrude Ave. home while visiting from Honduras when Pames broke into the residence in the middle of the night. He physically assaulted both victims while they were sleeping and stole several items – including a cellphone, iPad, jewelry and cash – before fleeing

Officers with the Cleveland Division of Police and EMS responded to the scene and transported both victims to the hospital. The 74-year-old victim was treated for multiple injuries and the 94-year-old victim was pronounced deceased. The Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office ruled the victim's death as a homicide due to blunt force trauma to her head and neck. CPD's Homicide Unit investigated and linked Pames to the crime through DNA evidence he left on scene.

On October 1, 2018, another victim, 16, was finishing her schoolwork at her Park Ave. apartment near E. 74 St., when Pames broke into the residence in the middle of the day. He broke in using a crowbar, sexually assaulted the victim several times and threatened to kill her and her mother if she told anyone. Pames then duct taped the victim to a chair and stole several items – including two laptops, a set of car keys and a Kindle – before fleeing the

CPD responded to the scene and the victim was transported to a hospital where a sexual assault kit was collected. CPD's Sex Crimes Unit conducted an investigation that connected Pames to the crime through DNA evidence from the kit as well as DNA collected from the duct tape left at the scene.

Pames was arrested by CPD on October 15, 2018. He previously pleaded guilty to the following charges: two counts of rape, one count of involuntary manslaughter, one count of attempted murder, four counts of kidnapping, two counts of aggravated burglary, one count of gross sexual imposition and one count of escape.

Pames was sentenced today to 40 years in prison. He will also be classified as a Tier-IIÍ sex offender, which requires him to register every 90 days for the rest of his life.





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G.H. Council votes to create Human Resources Dept., appoints HR director

Garfield Heights Council, by a 4 yes-3 no vote, approved legislation at its June 14 meeting to create a Human Resources Department in the city, and appointed Jeannie Sowers to direct the new department at its first in-person council meeting in many

Mayor Matt Burke, who sponsored the legislation, co-sponsored by Council President Michael Nenadovich, stated in creating the department: "It is the mayor's desire to do the following: 1) create the Human Resources Department; 2) create the position of 'Human Resources Director' to serve within the Human Resources Department; 3) abolish the position of 'Human Resources Manager;' and 4) create the position of 'Payroll Clerk' to serve within the Human Resources Department."

The position of Human Resources Director will start out at a pay rate of \$71,328.19 annually, while the position of Payroll Clerk will start out at \$35,685.31 annually. Both will be classified as non-union pay positions.

Abolished by passage of the ordinance was the position of Human Resources Manager in the Finance Department, with a pay rate that started out at from \$61,144.51 annually.

Passed by 5 yes-2 no votes was an emergency ordinance also sponsored by Burke and co-sponsored by Nenadovich, ratifying Burke's appointment of Jeannie Sowers to act as the Human Resources Director for the city of Garfield Heights, during the period commencing June 14, 2021, "to serve at the pleasure of the mayor."

Passed unanimously at last week's meeting was a resolution to honor the memory of longtime resident David L. Mays, who passed away in April at the age of 79. Mays was highly active in the Garfield Heights community, including serving on the Zoning Board of Appeals and Tax Incentive Review Council for the city, and was also a member of the Community Emergency Response Team for many years.

Mays, a native of Garretsbend, West Virginia, moved with his family to Garfield Heights in 1954, and graduated from Garfield Heights High School. After serving in the Army from 1962 to 1969, he met his wife, Doreen, in 1970, and they were married in 1974, having two sons, Eric and Chad. The couple later became grandparents to Kajsa, Connor, Kai, Kevin and Meghan.

Also passed by a unanimous vote at Monday's meeting was a resolution sponsored by Burke and all of council commending resident Michael Clyde "for his bravery and heroic efforts in saving a life during a house fire" on E. 86 St. on Sunday, May 16.

Shots Fired

Two casings were found in a driveway of a home which had its side door slightly ajar. Three juveniles were found inside the home and told police no one had been injured. Officers checked the home but found no damage.

• On June 20, shortly before 11 p.m., Garfield units were dispatched to the parking lot of the Venture Inn, 8602 Garfield Blvd., in regard to shots being fired. Passengers in a vehicle in the parking lot were detained by police. The driver told officers there was a gun inside the vehicle and she did not have a CCW permit. The passengers told police there was a verbal argument in the bar and then shots were fired. The only information the witnesses could provide was that an older black male was responsible for discharging the weapon. A spent .40 caliber shell casing was located in the back parking lot near the deck that is attached to the establishment. The bartender told officers there was a verbal argument earlier between a bar patron and the maintenance bar employee. The bar patron left after the argument and returned a short time later with perhaps four to five juveniles. The bartender told the suspect and the juveniles they were no longer welcome in the bar and had to leave. The suspect left the bar and that is when the bartender heard shots being fired from the rear parking lot. Access to video footage was to be made available the next morning. All detained parties released on scene.

Assault

On June 15, at 10:16 a.m., police units were called to the area of Turney and Willard to locate a man who had just escaped from the custody of bailiffs at the Garfield Heights Municipal Court. The bailiff told police the suspect had just been sentenced by the judge to 168 days in jail when he got up and ran toward the double door tive for the suspect. Incident report forwarded to prosecuentrance to the courtroom. After a struggle with a Maple Heights PD Auxiliary officer, the suspect jumped onto a chair in the lobby and over the second floor railing onto the middle landing of the stairs. From there he jumped to the first floor and ran out of the building north through the lot. 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
