'LGBTQ+ Pride Month' resolution in Maple Heights fails to pass on third try

A resolution to recognize the month of June, 2021 as "LGBTQ+ Month" in the city of Maple Heights and to "denounce prejudice and unfair discrimination" on any basis, including sexual orientation or gender identity, failed on its third reading at a special council meeting held Monday, June 21.

The vote was three yes votes from council members Richard Trojanski, Toni Jones and Dana Anderson, two abstentions from council members Stafford Shenett and Christian Ostenson, and two no votes from council members Tanglyn Madden and Edwina Agee. At least four votes were needed for passage, Law Director Frank Consolo confirmed at the meeting.

Trojanski, who has publicly stated his status for years as an openly gay member of council, sponsored the resolution.

He commented after the meeting: "Maple Heights City Council sends a bad message by once again voting down this resolution. While equality and recognition is one aspect of the issue, the more important one that Councilpersons Agee, Shenett, Ostenson and Madden fail to understand is the negative economic impact by turning away potential LGBTQ+ homeowners, businesses and anyone considering working as a city employee, when city council says, 'You're unwelcome here."

Anderson said, "This legislation is not stating whether you agree with the lifestyle or not. It is strictly about 7, and the residents of District 7 said no, and that's how equality and treating people fairly, so as far as some Ivote. It has nothing to do with any personal issues. That's not knocking that... It's about equality. It's about treating and that's what the residents said in District 7.' people fairly, no matter what race, color, gender, no matterwhat.

Agee also commented, stating, "I did a survey in District ople saying about their religion, and I understand, I'm what we are supposed to be doing, talking to the residents,

Madden commented that statistics from the city that she reviewed showed that there was "no recognition" of any discriminatory events against the LGBTQ community in Maple Heights.

Addressing Madden's comments Mayor Annette Blackwell stated, "I'm not sure where you got that report... but there is a man [in the city] who is openly gay, that calls my office regularly, who's harassed quite a bit, and he's been harassed since I've been in office, asking for help because he's openly gay.'

"We do have these incidents in Maple Heights," Blackwell continued. "And so we are here to protect and represent and advance the quality of life, diversity, tolerance and

She said that as council representatives the legislators worked for the city. "This is a corporation, and you have a responsibility, as an officer of this corporation, to represent everyone... there is a paycheck associated with this. You are paid. And you take an oath of office to serve everyone. You take your personality out of it; you don't have that luxury," Blackwell said.

"So I want to know what part of the oath of office you are just tossing aside today," she questioned.

 $She nett\, said\, that\, council\, members\, represented\, different$ areas of the city, "but that, at the end of the day, you represent their voice, those who choose to speak." He said his choice to abstain from voting on the issue represented a neutral respect on the discussion from the council, administration and Maple Heights residents.

V.V. Council appoints 3 new part-timers to fire dept.

Valley View Village Council met in regular session on Finance approvals June 8, and appointed Dylan Wester, Joseph Murray and Richard McĜinnis as part-time members of the Valley View Fire Department.

Fire Chief Kenneth Papesh noted that Wester lives on Stone Rd. in the village and just graduated from the fire academy, Murray is a full-time member of the Independence Fire Department and McGinnis was in the U.S. Army and in the banking industry and just graduated Watershed Partnership at a cost of \$5,000. from fire school on May 8.

Other legislation approved by council included:


- Purchase of a home at 8430 Fosdick Rd. for an amount not to exceed \$167,303.13 as part of the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program.
- •Amending the Storm Water Management Plan to update the Comprehensive Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan.
- •Authorizing the village to make an offer to buy the property at 8649 Fosdick Rd. at a price not to exceed \$273,600 as part of the FEMA program.

Mayor Jerry Piasecki said there have been two water main breaks on Schreiber and Morningside over the past week and he will request funding to Cleveland Water to replace the Schreiber Rd. main. Piasecki asked residents to keep their receipts for repair of water damaged areas for submission to the water department. Law Director Dave Lambros noted that residents should be reporting damage to their insurance companies.

The following Finance Department requests were passed:

- To hire RCU for the Design Development Architectural Concept for the monument sign at the intersection of Cloverleaf Pkwy. and Granger Rd. at a cost not to exceed \$2,500.
- To contribute as a municipal member to the Mill Creek
- To hire Waid Corporation to clean the wet well at the Strathmore pump station at a cost of \$3,800.
- •To authorize the recreation director to purchase replacement parts for various playground equipment from Miracle Midwest at a cost of \$18,111.20.
- •To renew the HVAC agreement at the community center with the Geopfert Co. at a cost of \$3,172.
- •To authorize the police chief to renew the annual support agreement with TAC at a cost of \$7,800.
- To hire David Lewin to review slope stability for the Precision Metal Products Project at 5745 Canal Rd. at a cost of \$5,000.
- Lewin was also authorized to review slope stability for the Project Buffalo at 5585 Canal Rd. at a cost of \$15,000.

In his report to council, Fire Chief Papesh thanked Recreation Director Todd Von Ville and his crew for their help with the conference on Fire Works Safety on Monday, June 7, in Valley View Woods. There were 150 fire inspectors present.

will be public." As a long-time council person, the interim mayor had a clear understanding of the rules.

Based on the recent legislative committee meeting discussions, it was revealed the interim mayor informed the mayoral designee on the committee that the committee could meet in private. In addition, he had numerous discussions with the designee and his very own sister, who is not a public official. Why is she personally engaged in official city business? Is that corruption? Is it ethical?

The committee members, on the advice of the mayor, had four meetings that were not open to the public. This poor advice caused so much confusion and chaos among the CRC members and City Council. Since it is clear the interim mayor was responsible for the most recent situation, it seems unfair to punish any member of the CRC for this blunder. In addition, the mayor did not speak up on behalf of the CRC during the council meeting and he did not show up to the legislative committee meeting. Where was he while dedicated, unpaid, voluntary concerned community members got slammed by council.

I'm struggling to understand why any of this happened and question the leadership in our community. I also wonder why the recent Mayoral Newsletter made no mention of some of the pressing issues facing our community, how to get involved, how to contact our council representatives, etc. Yet our tax money was used for what appears to be an expensive self-advertisement.

We need better leadership, communication and competence. We need transparency and accountability.

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
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'Spirit of Patriotism' **Home Decorating Contest in Independence**

Maple Hts. working to hire more police officers; shootings, fireworks

 $Maple\,Heights\,Police, with the assistance\,of\,Mayor\,Annette$ Blackwell and the administration, is working on increasing the number of officers in the department and continuing positive interactions with the community, Police Chief Todd Hansen said at a special Town Hall-type committee meeting that was open to public comment last week.

Residents were invited to participate via ZOOM telecon-On June 26, about 12:15 p.m., an officer was traveling ference in the Community Life and Education Committee meeting, intended as a continuation of a special council meeting held in May for city officials to address concerns about increased violent crimes and other issues.

> Hansen acknowledged that when he started with the Maple Heights police in the 1990s, his department had 48 officers, a number that is now down to 27 today, compounded by a workload that can go as high as 120 or more calls for service in a day.

We've been losing some people lately, and we're authorized to go up to 33 (officers) right now, but I don't know if you've seen the stories in the news, it's not just

In response to a resident's question on whether efforts were being made to obtain and use federal grant funding, Hansen said that at present, all avenues and resources were being investigated.

He added that the process was extensive because, "We have to earn the public trust, have background checks, psychological tests, polygraph tests, medical tests and interviews. We want good people out there, because we are in a lot of people's lives, and we want to make good decisions and get the best people to work here in Maple Heights, and take care of our community.

Residents recognized that officers were extremely busy, but asked whether they could interact more with the city's youth, to offer a positive presence and impact.

Hansen said that officers were present at just about every pubic event in the city and do their best to interact with youth. "We are always looking for opportunities," he said.

Shootings addressed

Residents who commented at the meeting were concerned about increased gunshots, with the Fourth of July holiday approaching.

Other residents spoke of fireworks so loud that they shook their houses, especially in the Raymond-Nitra area, in the hours between 10 p.m. and 2 a.m. Some of the residents contended that the noises were in fact caused by

Give us a call," Hansen said. "We come out on every single one of those calls. We get there quickly, and we search for evidence of gunshots.

Hansen answered a resident's question about a recent incident in the Lafayette neighborhood, confirming it was a stabbing with numerous juveniles involved. "It was an assault and stabbing, and it is all taken care of now. We did get everyone taken care of, and both sides went to the hospital.'

Hansen encouraged residents to call if they hear fireworks, because "they're not supposed to be shooting off fireworks anyway. It disturbs the neighborhood, so we $come \ out for \ fireworks \ and \ for \ gunshots. \ Please \ call \ us, we$ need to know where stuff is happening. It helps us. Everybody should call; this is important.
