Deadly shooting outside gas station in Slavic Village

One man is dead and another injured in shootings outside the Marathon gas station, at the corner of Fleet and Broadway aves., about 12:23 a.m. on Monday, May 3.

When police arrived they found a male, later identified as Marquel Cobb, 25, of E. 65 St., Cleveland, laying close to the sidewalk on Fleet Ave. Cobb had suffered multiple gunshot wounds to his torso and was taken to MetroHealth Medical Center, where he was pronounced deceased at 1:10 a.m.

While police were on scene, they learned that another victim, a 17-year-old male, had arrived at University Hospitals by private auto, stating that he had been shot at the same Marathon gas station.

But there are many who don't know about this organization which goes about its quiet work of helping mothers and mothers-to-be navigate the life-changing experience of pregnancy and motherhood.

Well, Mother's Day is this Sunday, May 9, and it's time to get the word out!

Womankind was founded over 45 years ago by Michele Rogers, R.N., who stated its mission so eloquently: "Some of the strongest women in the world walk through our doors and we are here to listen, care, offer support, to instill hope and to love."

All of Womenkind's services are confidential, nonjudgmental and provided at no cost to its clients. These include: pregnancy test, prenatal care through 28 weeks of pregnancy, assistance with third trimester care and delivery, professional counseling, support services, childbirth classes, breastfeeding information, post-abortion counseling, assistance with Medicaid and WIC applications, maternity clothing, baby items and referrals for parenting classes, adoption and legal assistance.

Volunteers are the heart and soul of Womankind. Its new medical director, Dr. Kimberly Kraus, M.D., is a volunteer. Dave Bongorno is the organization's volunteer accountant, doing all the accounting, payroll taxes and more.

Womankind volunteers also include doctors, nurses, knitters, Lamaze coaches, baby clothes folders, receptionists and every kind of hard worker you can name. All working with Womankind out of love and compassion

Pandemic brings challenges

The ongoing pandemic has brought new challenges to Womankind staff and its clients. The annual baby bottle fundraiser, one of its chief avenues of support, didn't take place last year since no one was going to church. But it's back this year and with it the hope for much-needed revenue.

Even though the pandemic has brought its share of belttightening to the organization, Womankind Executive Director Maggie Lallo said, "Its doors were never shut and we continued to serve our clients with love and kindness."

"Through our baby item program, babies stayed warm through the winter," she said. "Through our prenatal clinic, pregnant women were able to receive high quality, prenatal care. Through our counseling and support services, clients were able to receive necessary assistance and have a sense of hope.³

2020 by the numbers

Last year Womankind provided the following to its clients: 600+ prenatal medical visits; 1,500+ requests for essential material items; 105+ new clients (prenatal/ medical, support services and counseling); 700+ volunteer hours provided by Womankind doctors, nurses and distribution volunteers.

Womankind spends an average of \$1,400 to cover the cost of care for one client, but a single donation can provide key essentials: **\$50** will provide diapers for one baby; **\$100** provides a safe place for a newborn to sleep; \$200 will cover one prenatal appointment for a pregnant woman; **\$500** will cover all necessary items for a newborn

Statues at Ss. Peter & Paul destroyed by vandal

Three statues outside Ss. Peter & Paul Catholic Church, vandalism. Besides the one statue the priest had observed 4750 Turney Rd., Garfield Heights, are in pieces and being vandalized, two others were damaged. were completely destroyed by vandalism in the early morning hours of last Wednesday, April 28.

About 12:45 a.m., police were dispatched to the church, at the corner of Garfield Boulevard and Turney Rd., in reference to a male damaging church property. The pastor there, Fr. John Schneider, said he observed a male damaging one of the statues outside the church.

Police arrived and saw a man matching the description of the suspect walking north on Turney Rd. He was detained and told police he had some "anger" issue and needed to take out his anger, thus damaging the statue.

Fr. Schneider told police he had heard a noise coming from outside and saw a man damaging a statue. He told him to stop and confronted the suspect. The man asked the priest what he was going to do to him, and then told the priest he would kill him. The priest then called police.



> Gambosi said the Ellenwood waterline project was included in the ordinance, at a cost of \$376,000, and the city would be starting the water main study on Broadway Ave., as well as a No Feasible Alternative study for the wastewater treatment plant approved at a previous meeting, at a cost of \$198,990.

> Also approved at the meeting was an ordinance authorizing Mallis to enter into a contract with Pelton Environmental Products to buy environmental products for maintenance and inventory of the ultraviolet disinfection system at the city's wastewater treatment plant, at a cost of \$14,038.38.

> Pelton was the sole source distributor for the replacement parts needed for the equipment, Mallis added.



nonprofits share in county tree canopy grant funds

In its second year of funding, Cuyahoga County will invest \$950,000 into its tree canopy by funding 25 projects for tree plans and tree planting sponsored by area municipalities, neighborhoods and nonprofits through the Cuyahoga County Healthy Tree Canopy Grant Program. This funding will spur the creation of 20 tree planting projects, five tree planning and planting projects and one new county tree nursery.

This innovative grant achieves an action identified in the county's 2019 Climate Change Action Plan through the annual contribution of \$1 million dollars for five years to revitalize the tree canopy in Cuyahoga County.

Over 4,000 trees will be planted during this second phase, which will bring the total number of trees planted across both rounds to over 5,400.

Local grant recipients in this second phase include:

City of Maple Heights - \$39,937.50 awarded for tree planting as part of the Dunham Road Greenway Tree Planting

Slavic Village Development - \$32,190.39 awarded for planning and tree planting as part of its Reforest Slavic Village Part II initiative.

Tinker's Creek Watershed Partners - \$20,030.00 awarded for the Dunham Park Tree Planting. Dunham Park is a 49.9-acre park in Maple Heights managed by the Cleveland Metroparks.

Village of Newburgh Heights - \$50,000 awarded for planning and tree planting as part of the 2021 Newburgh Heights Reforestation Program.

Maple Heights launches **'Paint The City' program**

Beginning this week, the city of Maple Heights will be accepting applications for its 2021 Paint The City program, as approved by council at a recent meeting. The program supplements the cost residents normally pay to repaint the exterior of their home, by providing free vouchers to obtain paint, tools and other supplies

Mayor Annette Blackwell stated, "This program is an important part of the city's efforts to ensure that the residents' choice to live in Maple Heights is a good investment for their family.

The program provides free vouchers for various tools, such as paint brushes, rollers, scraper, drop cloth and paint; however, no labor is included, city officials stated.

Residents who apply must meet basic eligibility requirements, including income guidelines, and participate in lead (as in lead-based paint) safety training.

Applications will be accepted beginning this week, and awarded on a first come, first serve basis, while funding is available, city officials stated, adding that additional information about the program, the income eligibility guidelines, and the application itself are available on the city'swebsite atwww.citymapleheights.com/paintprogram. only a parent or legal guardian can register a child.



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Maple Hts. mayor plans diversity training for workers

In the wake of several recent high profile cases involving police response to incidents in the area and throughout the country, Mayor Annette Blackwell is planning diversity training to promote "tolerance and inclusion" for employees of the city of Maple Heights, she stated at vacant city-owned lots on Miller Ave. and Grant Ave. to council's teleconference meeting Wednesday, April 21.

Blackwell, in her role as the city's safety director as well as mayor, said, "I will be putting on an in-service for the chiefs and the directors and will continue working closely with Police Chief Todd Hansen and the police department reviewing our policies about high speed chases, and all of those things that have brought so much pain to so many families and have been on the news stations for quite some time.

She said the diversity-advised training, which will be put on by a professional, is going to transfer to various employees that are reporting to Maple Heights directors and chiefs.

"I've heard some things that have been concerning to me, so it's important that I move forward in that discussion and bring that training to the city of Maple Heights, the mayor added.

Blackwell also reported that she and her husband were getting over COVID-19, and gave her deep thanks to all city personnel, officials and residents for their support and assistance.


Paint program passed

Residents of the city can now beautify their properties with the help of the city, after council passed a resolution at the April 21 meeting to approve the 2021 "Paint The City Program," authorizing Blackwell to award funding to eligible applicants.

Blackwell and Economic Development Director Patrick Grogan-Myers proposed the grant program, which starts this Saturday, May 1, "to provide owners who occupy their homes with financial assistance to repaint the exterior of their homes as a way to preserve and promote the curb appeal of homes in the city," according to the legislation.

The source of funding for the paint program is the Housing Reinvestment Grant Account in the city's General Fund. Property owners can purchase painting supplies with the help of the program. However, the application form was amended by Housing Committee Chair Councilwoman Toni Jones during passage of the legisla-tion stating that colors chosen must be conducive to the city, meaning that paint colors used on houses as part of the program cannot be detrimental to the overall appearance of the neighborhood.

Maximum annual income guidelines for program eligibility range from \$42,600 for a one-person family to \$70,550 for a six-person family, and the following docu-



Council also approved two separate resolutions to sell adjacent property owners for use as side yards.

And council also passed a resolution to enter into a purchasing participation agreement with the Ohio Department of Transportation for the cooperative purchase of rock salt for contracts awarded for the 2021 winter season.

Clean up resolution goes on first reading

A resolution introduced by councilmembers Dana Anderson and Richard Trojanski to designate Saturday, May 15, as "Maple Heights Cleanup Day" to prompt individuals to take greater responsibility for their local environment by creating cleaner parks, streetscapes and public spaces through litter removal and elimination, failed to pass on emergency at the meeting, placing it on first reading

Anderson's amendment to the legislation, to make the third weekend of May every year be designated as an annual cleanup event in the city, was approved 5-1 (Councilwoman Edwina Agee dissenting, Councilwoman Tanglyn Madden absent).

Also placed on first reading was a resolution accepting \$475,448 in grant funding from the Cleveland Water Department Suburban Water Main Renewal Project Fund and authorizing City Engineer Ed Hren to prepare plans and go out for bids for the Libby Road Watermain Replacement Project, from Broadway Ave. to Lee Rd.

Another resolution placed on first reading at lastweek's meeting was to accept \$39,937.50 in a funding award from the Cuyahoga County Healthy Tree Canopy Program for the Dunham Road Greenway Tree Planting Project. The city is required to contribute 10%, or \$4,437.50 in local funding, towards the project for a total cost of \$44,375, if the legislation is passed at a future meeting.

An ordinance to help tenants impacted by the economic effects of the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, known as Pay to Stay" legislation, remained in the Housing and Economic Development Committee at Jones' request.

The legislation, which would enact a new chapter of the codified ordinances, would allow tenants to pay past due rent and late fees prior to an eviction filing, in the interest of avoiding homelessness and placing residents at increased risk of COVID-19 exposure. Committee members will discuss the ordinance before taking action on it.

tee presentation at the meeting, CLEC Chairman Councilman Stafford Shenett, Christian Ostenson, Agee and other council members and city officials gave special recognition to two young residents, Ariana Rich of District 1 and Kamryn Clark of District 3, for their outstanding efforts in cleaning up and beautifying their neighborhoods.

"These are our city's future leaders," Blackwell commented.

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

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Statue of eagles installed at Pol-Am Cultural Center symbolizing link of Polish, American/history

A statue of an American bald eagle and Polish eagle was century by century tour of the 1000 years of Polish history. installed at the Polish American Cultural Center on Tuesday, April 27, in the Pope John Paul II Heritage Garden at 6501 Lansing Ave., in Slavic Village, leading up to the celebration last Sunday of Polish Constitution Day at the center.

The garden, dedicated in November 2018, has a circular brick walkway with 27 educational placards providing a

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The statue depicts an American bald eagle and a Polish eagle joined together in flight, representing the historic relationship of the U.S. with that of Poland.

The eagles were sculpted by renowned Polish-American artist Andrzej Pitynski, who passed away just after he completed the piece. The statue was forged locally at Studio Foundry. A future dedication will be planned subject to the Covid pandemic health orders.

Ward 12 Councilman Tony Brancatelli, himself of Polish and Italian heritage, was on hand when the statue arrived.

We are truly fortunate that sculptor Andrzej Pitynski was able to design this amazing piece before he passed and that it was able to be forged locally," said Councilman lunch provided by the Brancatelli. "This is a very symbolic piece for the times we are in, having these two eagles joining wings together."



Bedford High shooting victim dies from injuries

A Bedford High School student, Royce Hamilton, 18, arrested a few hours later with a handgun still in his pants. shot in the head the afternoon of Monday, April 26, on McKinley Ave., died Friday from his injuries, as confirmed by the Cuyahoga County medical examiner and Deputy Chief Rick Suts of the Bedford Police Department.
