GHHS Class of '51 holds 70th Reunion Man accused of 1987 murder of

The Garfield Heights High School Class of 1951 held its 70th Class Reunion - yes, **70th CLASS REUNION!** – last Friday, Sept. 17, at a luncheon at Slyman's restaurant in Independence. Eighteen classmates showed up for the festivities, as well as Bob McVoy, who actually graduated in the 1949 GHHS class, now an energetic 91-year-old.

McVoy is a member of the Garfield Heights High School Athletic Hall of Fame, he said, having played for the Bulldogs' baseball, football and basketball teams.

Local residents of a certain age may remember McVoy from the Turneytown Bowling Alley, which he bought after high school and ran for 40 years.

Several members of the 1951 class got nostalgic as they munched on corned beef sandwiches and talked about hanging out after classes at a "burger joint" called The Campus, which was across the street from the old high school on Turney Rd.


One of the ladies mentioned that, although the high school had a cafeteria, she and her friends always packed their lunches every day, wrapping their sandwiches in old Garfield Height's Leader newspapers, a weekly which had started publishing in 1946, just a handful of years before the Class of 1951 graduated!

All the classmates chatted away happily at Slyman's last Wednesday, catching up on what's been going on in their long lives. By about 2:30 p.m., with lunch over and leftover boxes in hand, as well as red long-stemmed roses for the ladies, the group started leaving the restaurant and promising to keep in touch with their old friends and looking forward to their next reunion.

Garfield Hts. teen Barbie Blatnik dies of cancer a month before trial

A Cleveland man accused in the 1987 murder of a 17year-old Garfield Heights girl whose strangled body was found dumped near Blossom Music Center in Cuyahoga Falls has died of cancer, as reported in the Akron Beacon

James Zastawnik, who lived on Indiana Ave. in Slavic Village at the time of the murder, was scheduled to go on trial for the death of Barbara Blatnik next month, according to media reports.

On Dec. 20, 1987, Cuyahoga Falls Police responded to O'Neil Rd. near Blossom Music Center for a report of a female whose body, later identified as Barbara Blatnik of Garfield Heights, was found in a wooded area. Blatnik was last seen alive the night before when she was dropped off by a friend at the corner of Warner Road and Grand Division in Garfield Heights, around midnight.

Detectives investigated countless leads throughout this 30-year cold case, according to the Cuyahoga Falls Police website.

Last August, the Cuyahoga Falls Police Department asked the Bureau of Criminal Investigation to conduct additional tests on DNA found under Blatnik's fingernails to generate a more complete genetic profile of their suspect.

Zastawnik was arrested in May 2020 for Blatnik's murder based on new evidence provided through advancements in DNA technology.

The Porchlight Project provided funding to the Cuyahoga Falls Police Department to help get the needed DNA testing that was done to close this case.

When a loved one goes missing, friends and neighbors show their support by keeping their porch light on. The Porchlight Project, according to its website, was formed to lend special help to cases of abduction and murder that have gone cold. They provide free private investigative services, funding for DNA testing, and media support for a few

Sewer District helps communities with \$15 million to improve sewer systems

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District's Board of Trustees has awarded 18 Member Community Infrastructure Program (MCIP) grants totaling \$15 million.

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MCIP provides funding to member communities and eligible political subdivisions for sewer infrastructure rehabilitation, replacement and improvement projects that address water quality and quantity issues. These issues adversely impact human health and the environment and are mitigated through cost-effective sewer infrastructure projects.

Since the program's inception in 2016, the Sewer District has awarded \$47,192,996.87 towards 72 public sewer infrastructure improvement projects. MCIP grants in municipalities in The Neighborhood News readership area this funding round include:

Garfield Heights (\$2,339,259.10): Midwest Neighborhood Phase 5

Maple Heights (\$292,320): Southwest Sewer District – Sewer Repairs Phase 2 (design)

Newburgh Heights (\$1,554,348): 20s Neighborhood Sewer Separation

"Failing septic systems, sewer flooding, sanitary sewer overflows and common trench sewers contribute to poor water quality throughout our region," said Frank Greenland, director of Watershed Programs. "This program provides a vital funding mechanism to assist with needed repairs and new sewer infrastructure while protecting and improving the region's water resources.

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
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Cleveland Council votes to use federal funds to develop citywide broadband network

Cleveland City Council held its regular meeting Mon-million from federal funds it will be receiving through the a share of its federal funds from the American Rescue Plan whether additional funding in the future is warranted. Act to develop a city-wide broadband network. The city is committing \$20 million to the project, though additional funds from other sources are needed.

The Covid-19 emergency has highlighted the importance of universally available, high speed, reliable and affordable broadband coverage. People rely on the internet to participate in a variety of activities, including remote education classes, healthcare and employment, down to ordering food or getting tickets for entertainment activi-

Recognizing the need for this connectivity, the U.S. Treasury Department is allowing American Rescue funds to be used to make necessary investments in broadband infrastructure.

Council also authorized the city to enter into agreements with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank to financially assist with the food banks' capital improvements at its new center on Coit Rd. and its existing facility on South Waterloo Rd. The city has committed to paying \$5 Innovation Square mixed-use neighborhood project lo-

A number of economic development projects were authorized including:

- Entering into agreements with Northeast Ohio Hispanic Center for Economic Development to provide assistance - through loans and grants - for the CentroVilla25 Project to develop the W. 25th St. and Clark Ave. area. ČentroVilla25, a collaborative effort between MetroHealth, the Hispanic Business Center, Hispanic Alliance and Metro West Community Development Center, is developing the W. 25th/Clark area as the economic and cultural center of the Latino community in Greater Cleveland. The stretch south of Clark to MetroHealth contains several vacant buildings and empty
- Authorizing the director of Economic Development to enter into a loan agreement with Fairfax Renaissance Development Corp., to provide economic development assistance to partially finance the development of the

The project will consist of 80 units (20 studios, 44 1BRs, and 162BRs). Of those, 56 units (70%) will be market rate and 24 units (30%) will be workforce housing. On Sept. 19, about 4:15 p.m., GHPD units responded to the 7600 block of Jeffries Ave., to assist Cleveland EMS for a report of a 3-year-old boy who fell out of a window. While EMS transported the boy and his mother to MetroHealth Medical Center, GHPD officers spoke with residents and gathered further information. A juvenile female said she was watching her younger siblings while their parents were out and left the toddler in an upstairs bedroom to watch television while she went downstairs to prepare food for the other children. Shortly after she got downstairs, there was a knock on the front door and she saw the little boy crying for help stating he had fallen out of a window and that his stomach hurt. His sister immediately called 911.

It was determined that the toddler had walked out of his mother's bedroom, which has a walk-out porch on the second floor. An officer observed that the door to the house from the porch was open and there were two large gaps in the railing around the porch several feet wide.

Due to the jurisdiction being unclear in this incident, the report was completed for departmental information and will be assigned to the appropriate office pending resolution of jurisdiction.
