# **Garfield Heights names** Juneteenth as permanent recognized holiday in city

At its Monday, Sept. 27th meeting this week, Garfield Heights Council declared June 19th, known as Juneteenth, to be a permanent holiday in the city, and mandating all city buildings be closed and all administrative and AFSCME union employees to receive a paid holiday.

Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865, the date many of those enslaved African-Americans in Texas learned they had been emancipated following the Civil War. On June 18, 2021, President Joe Biden declared June 19th to be a recognized federal holiday.

In Mayor Matt Burke's report to council, he mentioned there will be a Safeguard Our Kids event concerning missing children on Thursday, Oct. 7, at 6 p.m. in the Red Oak Picnic Shelter in Garfield Park Reservation, hosted by Burke, GHPD Juvenile Detective Seawright, Barbie West, Abundant Love Community Outreach and Queen IAM Youth Empowerment.

Discussed will be prevention tips, red flags, characteristics, social media tips, child ID packets, community resources and how the GHPD handles missing kids and how the public can help.

Other ordinances and resolutions passed by council Monday included:

- Entering into an agreement with the city engineers, OHM Advisors, for the Midwest Neighborhood Storm/ Sanitary Sewer System Reconstruction Project – Phase 4, and authorizing payment of costs through funding by the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District.
- Amending a section of the city's codified ordinances titled "Location and Capacity." In Chapter 307 it states that the city shall contract with at least two agencies located within the city for the purpose of towing and storage of vehicles for the Garfield Heights Police Department. Currently the city has only one towing company that meets city requirements. The amendment passed will permit the city to contract with towing and storage facilities that are located no further than five miles from Garfield Heights.
- Directing the city engineer to prepare the necessary plans and specs and go out for competitive bids for the authorizing payment of costs for this project.
- Directing the city engineer to prepare the necessary plans and specs and go out for competitive bids for projects improving roadway conditions for Transportation Blvd. and Vista Way, approximately between Antenucci Blvd and Giant Éagle.
- •Applying for grant funding for Title III grant funds through the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging to expand these services in 2022-23.

The next scheduled meeting of council will be Tuesday, Oct. 12, as Monday, Oct. 11th, is Columbus Day, a federal holiday.

# Judge Weiler Independence City Council passes amended 'Keeping Chickens' ordinance

Independence Council met in regular session Tuesday, Sept. 14, and passed an ordinance to add a new section to the codified ordinance of the city regarding the

The legislation passed stipulates that a maximum of six female chickens may be kept on a residential lot up to 20,000 square feet in area and no roosters are permitted. Chickens must be kept in an enclosed or fenced area in the rear yard only, not visible from the right-of-way, with a variety of minimum restrictions based on the chicken coop's proximity from side yard lot lines, rear lot lines and from adjoining dwellings, based on the width of the lots.

Several stipulations are made in the legislation for the design of the chicken coops and their upkeep. Council removed from the original legislation a stipulation that those wishing to keep chickens on their property must receive a permit from the Building Department.

The amended ordinance will take effect and be in full force 90 days following the signature by the mayor to allow all existing owners of chickens in the city time to comply with the provisions of the new legislation.

- •Accepting the bid of Liberty Ford, Inc. to supply Ford passenger, police and commercial vehicle repairs, parts and labor on an as-needed basis through May 31, 2022, in an amount not to exceed \$35,000;
- Accepting the bid of Car Parts Warehouse for various automotive and light truck parts on an as-needed basis for the Service Department through Aug. 31, 2022, in an amount not to exceed \$45,000;
- Declaring the vehicles parked at 9114 Bramley Dr. in the city to be junk motor vehicles and therefore a public nuisance and authorizing the law director to notify their
- •Accepting the proposal of Luminous Harmony to design and enhance the city's current holiday lighting display in Elmwood Park in phases over the next two years and the purchase of additional lighting, electrical components, controllers, support structures and static and animated displays, in an amount not to exceed \$75,577, for a total amount not to exceed \$81,577.00, with partial reimbursement by NOPEC.

Before that he worked for the Cleveland Heights Police Department for 10 years, where he rose through the ranks from officer to sergeant to lieutenant. He is also a part-time law enforcement instructor at Cuyahoga maintain the current level of services for seniors and to Community, Lorain Community and Lakeland Community colleges.

# Facing eviction? Legal Aid can help!

On August 26, the Supreme Court's decision not to extend the federal eviction **Ohioans over** moratorium has left many tenants who lost income due to the COVID-19 pandemic fearful of losing their housing. Northeast Ohioans at risk of eviction can get help through the new Free Eviction Help program, a collaboration between The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland and United Way's 2-1-1 service. Free Eviction Help provides free legal representation to tenants facing eviction.

The program has already helped many people in this region stay in their current housing or find new living accommodations. Another benefit is that children can remain in school without worrying about disruptions caused by displacement and

People who contact Free Eviction Help may also qualify for Cleveland's Right to Counsel (RTC) program, which applies to households with at least one child and incomes at or below the federal poverty guideline. Through RTC, eligible tenants now have the explicit legal right to free legal representation in their eviction cases

Hazel G. Remesch, Legal Aid's managing attorney in the housing law practice group, has been able to help many clients from being evicted.

"There is a lot of trauma that comes with facing eviction," said Remesch. "The uncertainty causes stress. We help our clients by putting dignity into the process. They know that they have an advocate by their side, helping them make informed decisions. We are able to give them a softer landing than they would have without an attorney.'

Remesch reflected on a recent eviction case, saying, "The client had a history of acute seizures, was a rape survivor and suffered from PTSD. She was not able to pay her rent for a year, but because of her (Legal Aid) attorney, she was able to get rent assistance and stay in her unit. She ended up getting approved for \$12,000 in rent assistance, which covered three months of future rent.

Resources are also available through United Way's 2-1-1 and also the Cleveland Housing Network (CHN) Housing Partners Family Stability Initiative. CHN provides assistance with eviction cases, helps homeowners avoid foreclosure and assists with

# Maple Heights Council increases prohibited street parking hours

#### By Judith Goldsworth

After addressing many complaints from residents on the issue of overnight street parking in the city, Maple Heights Council passed an ordinance to increase the hours vehicles are prohibited from parking on streets at its meeting Sept. 15.

Prohibited parking hours, previously from 4 a.m.-6 a.m. daily, were changed to from 2 a.m.-6 a.m. daily. Introduced by Councilman Christian Ostenson, the legislation was passed by a unanimous vote of council.

Also addressing complaints on parking issues in the city described as "nuisances," another ordinance, which allows for towing of offending vehicles, was placed on first

Law Director Frank Consolo stated, "The purpose of this is not to punish, the purpose is to get the cars off the

#### Other legislation passed

Council passed an ordinance authorizing Mayor Annette Blackwell to enter into a one-year service agreement with Online Solutions LLC (CitizenServe) for five users to utilize CitizenServe's service in the Building Department, at cost of \$26,500. Each additional year fee after the first year is \$12,000, according to the order form accompanying the legislation.

The cost of the service, recommended by Blackwell and Economic Development Director Patrick Grogan-Myers, includes set-up, training, implementation and data migration, with the intent to streamline and increase effi-Myers stated. Initial components to be implemented include rental registration and citizens' access pages, but the scope of the services may expand over time, he said.

Passed by unanimous consent were the following pieces of legislation:

title to six parcels of vacant land in the city owned by the Cuyahoga County Land Bank on Thomas Street, Hansen Road, Broadway Avenue, Grasmere Avenue, Fairway Avenue and South Boulevard.

•Authorizing Blackwell to apply to the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging for funding under the Older Americans Act to continue providing meals and transportation services to residents served by the Maple Heights Senior Center. If the two-year grant is approved, beginning Jan. 1, 2022, the funding will provide for congregate meals, home delivered meals, transportation and related programs and activities.

- •An ordinance to amend the city's 2021 budget to account for certain additional expenditures. As stated in exhibit documents supplied by Finance Director Tinita Tillman, the city's 2021 appropriations are listed at \$34.6 million, with 2021 estimated receipts of \$40.2 million.
- A resolution to accept the amounts and rates as determined by the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission and authorizing the necessary tax levies and certifying them to the county fiscal officer.
- •An ordinance to enact a cost sharing program with private property owners for removal of dead, diseased or damaged trees and trees whose roots have affected sidewalks and sewers, remains in the Finance Committee for further discussion. Blackwell said that taking trees down was costly, and the city was looking into obtaining grants to help fund the process.

#### **Criminal Damage**

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
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# Cuyahoga Heights High senior, Holden Taylor, named National Merit Scholarship semifinalist Death Notices


