Garbage truck crashes into V.V. canal Disgraced Newburgh Hts. mayor has



An empty garbage truck being driven from Canada to a new owner in Ohio ended up in the Ohio & Erie Canal last Thursday, near the intersection of Granger and Canal rds., according to a news release from the Valley View Police Department.

The release said preliminary investigation indicates that this accident was not directly related to Granger Road Hill, notorious for accidents involving heavy vehicles.

VVPD said the driver of the garbage truck appears to have misjudged the clearance between the left side of his truck and struck another truck stopped at the traffic light at the intersection.

Police said video from the truck that was struck shows the impact was substantial and caused the garbage truck to swerve out of control. The garbage truck was reported to be operating normally prior to the impact.

Disgraced Newburgh Hts. mayor has reportedly agreed to accept plea deal

Newburgh Heights Mayor Trevor Elkins, accused of using money from his campaign account for personal use, has agreed to a plea deal, according to various local media outlets.

The plea deal, sources say, has Elkins pleading guilty to one count of attempted theft in office and two counts of attempted election falsification. He also would step down from his position as mayor once he enters his guilty pleas.

It has also been reported that as part of the agreement and to avoid jail time, Elkins will not run for any elected office in Cuyahoga County during the 2024-28 term.

Handling the investigation is G. Gary Tyack, prosecutor for Franklin County, who was brought in by Cuyahoga County to handle the investigation.

Prosecutors accused Elkins of using money from his campaign account in hundreds of instances between 2015 and 2019 for personal use. He reportedly said he always returned the money into his campaign account and was not aware he was doing anything illegal.

He is expected to change his not guilty plea to guilty at April 14th court proceedings in Cleveland

When and if Elkins pleads guilty and resigns as mayor in Newburgh Heights, Village Council Pro-Tempore Gigi Traore would become the new mayor until a successor is elected. Elkins' term of office would have expired in January, 2024.

CLE Council opposes new state gun law

Cleveland City Council held its regular meeting Monday night and passed a resolution opposing the new state gun law and urged its repeal.

The newly adopted state law allows Ohioans 21 years and older to carry concealed handguns without a license and safety training.

The law, passed by the Ohio General Assembly and signed by Governor Mike DeWine last month, goes into effect in June. Current Ohio law requires a license to carry a concealed handgun across Ohio and includes eight hours of necessary safety and firing training, which will now be optional.

Council's resolution notes that, "While Cleveland works to reduce the number of guns that lead to violent crime, the State of Ohio's deregulation of handguns will increase gun ownership and proliferation of unregulated guns in our community."

The resolution was sponsored by Councilman Charles Slife, with all of the council joining as co-sponsors.

The gun bill was passed and signed over objections from law enforcement groups, including the Fraternal Order of Police of Ohio. Council's resolution urges the Ohio General Assembly to repeal the law.

In other action Monday, council approved legislation that would enable the Department of Public Safety to solicit home and business camera footage from areas where criminal activity has occurred, as well as solicit the footage from all vendors that provide similar home camera and security services. Earlier legislation had included only Ring camera footage.

It would allow investigators to get video from home and business cameras by working through whatever security company a business or resident may use for video surveillance. Access from the video would only apply to those residents and businesses who agree to it.

Garfield Hts. Youth Co-Ed Bedford Council authorizes Fabrizi Trucking & Paving to reconstruct water line on Broadway Ave.

Bedford Council passed legislation at its meeting Monday night authorizing City Manager Mike Mallis to enter into a contract with Fabrizi Trucking and Paving, Inc. for work on the Broadway Avenue Waterline Improvements Project, at a cost of \$1,298,791.50.

Fabrizi was the lowest and best bidder for the project, Mallis said, noting that the work will also include needed underground electrical work, curb replacement, miscellaneous sewer repairs and other improvements. He said a public meeting will be held soon for business owners and residents in the construction area, which will include the portion of the street from Five Points in the Broadway/Columbus area to the Wheeling and Lake Erie Railroad line approaching Union Street.

Mallis said the work would also include substantial construction at night, requiring the closing of Broadway from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. each day the work takes place.

"Closing that stretch during regular business hours was just not an option," Mallis said. "It would be very detri-

mental, especially to the downtown businesses, so we are requiring evening work hours. There will be more information that will come out once we hold a preconstruction meeting with the contractor.

Mallis said Fabrizi believes they can have the work completed in 90 days.

The improvements were very much needed, Mallis said. 'But it's also important to have this completed by the end of this year because we'll be on schedule for ODÓT to come through next year. They're planning the \$2.4 million complete resurfacing of Broadway, corp limit to corp limit. Sowewant to make sure that our work underground is done and addressed and buttoned up," he said.



Opioid settlement passed

Council passed two resolutions at the meeting, one regarding the disbursement of \$808 million in opioid litigation settlement proceeds from pharmaceutical companies to the state of Ohio, the other to establish the One Ohio Opioid Settlement Special Revenue Fund to accept the proceeds.

Both pieces of legislation followed council's approval late last year to accept the terms of the settlement with pharmaceutical companies for their role in the opioid

Finance Director Frank Gambosi said the \$808 million awarded to Ohio in the settlement would be distributed to municipalities throughout the state over the course of 18 vears.

Other legislation

Council also passed an ordinance authorizing a contract $to\,accept\,Northeast\,Ohio\,Public\,Energy\,Council (NOPEC)$ 2022 Energized Community Grant funding, which, Mallis stated, could be used for energy related improvement projects in the city.

He said that over the years the grant money has brought the city anywhere from \$33,000 to \$39,000 annually, Mallis said, adding that NOPEC had expanded the program to include more potential improvement projects.

Also passed was an ordinance amending previous legislation to provide for continuing membership in the Ohio

Municipal League Joint Self Insurance Pool, and providing for payment in the amount of \$221,321.

Speeding concerns

Councilwoman Sandy Spinks expressed concern about continued problems of speeding in her ward and the possible consequences, citing a recent incident in which a car went out of control and into a Bedford automobile dealership, damaging several vehicles.

Several residents of Union Street also spoke at the meeting on their own speeding concerns in the wake of another recent accident in which an impaired motorist crashed his van into a house and narrowly missed the residents sleeping inside. "We could have been killed," one of the residents stated.

The residents asked if signage, more guardrails or reflective material on the existing guardrails could be placed in front of their property. Mayor Stan Koci promised the residents that he and other city officials would look into it.

Announcements

Koci said that residents of Ward 4 had until this Friday, April 8, to submit their letters of interest to the city for the position of council representative in that ward, after longtime Councilwoman Paula Mizsak passed away in February.

Shots Fired

Weapon Offense

As officers approached the parking lot, they saw a parked car which appeared to be occupied and several shell casings around the rear of the car. After police removed the gun from his pocket, the suspect was handcuffed and arrested without incident. He told police he was not shooting at a person or vehicle, only straight up in the air. He refused to submit a breath sample. The suspect was found to be a convicted felon of a prior felonious assault with a weapons specification. He was charged with having weapons under disability, carrying concealed weapons, using weapons while intoxicated, discharging a weapon within the city limits.

The passenger in the vehicle was detained briefly and found to have a warrant with Cuyahoga Heights. After a short interview with an officer, he was released and given a courtesy transport to his residence following Cuyahoga Heights advising on the warrant.

Menacing

On Saturday, April 2, shortly after 9 p.m., an officer was dispatched to Marco's Pizza, 4791 Turney Rd., for reports of a customer brandishing a handgun. The on-duty manager said a man had entered the pizza shop and identified himself to an employee as a Doordash driver who was picking up an order. A delivery driver for Marco's stepped in to assist as the man was giving the employee a hard time about showing his phone to confirm that he was picking up an order. The driver said the man was becoming increasingly irate when asked to produce his phone and began swearing at the driver. The suspect then pulled his vehicle up towards the other man and began waving his gun in the air inside his vehicle. He then left the area driving a black Chevrolet hatchback. The driver said he felt threatened by the behavior and he would like to pursue charges. Through Doordash, police were able to find out the suspect's name. The Detective Bureau will follow up.



Program on 'Justice for Cubans' held at Bohemian Hall

The American Nationalities Movement sponsored a discussion on Cuba recently at the Bohemian National Hall in the North Broadway area of Slavic Village, and the quest of the Cuban people for freedom. The program, called "Justice for Cubans," was the first in a series of programs designed to highlight those seeking freedom within their countries.

The main speaker was local musician Justo Saborit, who was born in Ĉuba and emigrated to the United States with his family. They waited five years for the Cuban government to give him and his family final approval to allow them to emigrate to the United States.

Saborit told the audience that they have most necessities like bread, milk and medicine in Cuba, but demand exceeds supplies and lines are long. Yes, they have a fine medical system, he said, but it's mostly for the visitors and the elite in Cuba. The majority of the citizens must wait for medical service or medication. They have the expertise but supplies are limited. And on education, it's free for all up through college but somehow this does not integrate well with the economic system or else Cuba would be better off, he said. Their water and sewer systems are not up to par as well; don't drink the water applies.

The Cuban government blames their economic failures on the American embargoes, Saborit said. However, they are allowed to trade with many other countries for goods and services. So why is their economy so poor? It's their system, Communism, he said. Without an economic engine to produce goods and services there are never enough to fulfill the wants and needs of the people.

One reason that the Cubans demonstrated for freedom recently, Saborit noted, despite extreme consequences for anyone who goes against government policies, is that many Cubans have nothing and, therefore, little to lose. They were hungry and hoped to get outside support. Which didn't come.
