Suspect still at large in homicide on Raymond St.

A man was shot to death last Saturday, Dec. 3, on Raymond St., in Maple Heights, according to a press release from the Maple Heights Police Department.

On Saturday, Dec. 3, at approximately 2:20 a.m., MHPD responded to the area of the 18600 block of Raymond St., regarding two suspicious males in the area knocking on doors. Officers arrived in the area and found a male laying on the ground in the 19000 block of Raymond St., with two gunshot wounds. The victim was immediately given first aid and transported to the hospital where he died of his injuries.

Officers located two males in the area that were initially taken into custody and taken to the Maple Heights police station. During the investigation, it was discovered the two were actually with the victim at the time of the shooting and were released later that morning.

The third male reported to have been involved fled on foot and is still at large and unidentified. The shooting suspect has not been identified at this time.

Career consortium to expand programming to 10 new Cuy. County school districts, including Bedford, Garfield Heights, Maple Heights

The Greater Cleveland Career Consortium (GCCC) announced Monday the invitation to 10 new Cuyahoga County school districts to join its network. The Bedford, Maple Heights and Garfield Heights city schools are among the districts where the GCCC network will expand its programming.

Since its launch in March 2022, GCCC has supported the Cleveland Metropolitan School District with implementation of the Planning and Career Exploration (PACE) Framework. Through PACE, students in grades 6-12 participate in high-quality, career-focused experiences through a continuum of embedded, in-school curriculum, out-of-school engagements and career advising that will result in every student graduating high school with a career vision and plan that prepares them for family-sustaining wage careers in the region.

GCCC's work and this expansion effort is made possible by generous funding from Cuyahoga County, The Cleveland Foundation, Deaconess Foundation, and JP Morgan Chase Foundation.

This expansion will increase the number of students served from 19,000 in CMSD to approximately 33,000.

Maple Hts. awarded Storybook Trail Grant

The city of Maple Heights has been awarded a \$6000+ Storybook Trail Grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, in partnership with Governor Mike DeWine's Imagination Library.

ODNR launched the Storybook Trail program in 2019 and partnered with the Ohio Governor's Imagination Library and Dolly Parton's Imagination Library in 2020.

The Maple Heights Storybook Trail will be located within Stafford Park and will become part of a larger system of established Storybook Trails throughout the State of Ohio.

There are currently 19 half-mile Storybook Trails located at state parks and library districts throughout the state, each with 16 child-height panels featuring pages of a children's book and an activity relating to the text found within the book.

Children, along with their families and caregivers, will be able to enjoy the outdoors together, while experiencing more opportunities for literacy engagement.

City officials said this is a wonderful opportunity for all of the residents of Maple Heights, and they will share more details on when the Storybook Trail will be opening, tentatively slated for 2023.

Cohort II, launching in 2024:

- Bedford City Schools

- Brooklyn City Schools
- Fairview Park City Schools
- Richmond Heights Local Schools
- Shaker Heights City Schools

Charlie Keenan, superintendent of Maple Heights City Schools, said, "This partnership will create amazing opportunities for our students which we could not do alone. GCCC is opening doors to work- and career-based learning experiences with employers across the region that our students simply could not otherwise have access to in our community."

GCCC staff and the Consortium's expansive network of employers, youth-serving nonprofits, educators and civic partners will work with each district to design a unique implementation plan customized to the districts' specific needs and provide ongoing support throughout implementation.

Community Police Commissioners approved

Cleveland's new Community Police Commission was officially approved on Monday, following the adoption of a resolution by Cleveland City Council appointing all 13 nominees at its December 5th meeting.

They are: Dr. John Adams, Shandra Benito, James M. Chura, Charles Donaldson, Jr., Pastor Kyle Earley, Alana Garrett-Ferguson, Cait Kennedy, Gregory Reaves, Jan Ridgeway, Piet van Lier, Audrianna Rodriguez, Teri Wang and Sharena Zayed. To ensure fairness, all nominees were randomly allocated either two or four-year terms.

Unlike the previous commission, according to Charter Section 115-5, the newly established commission will now serve as the overarching authority in conjunction with the Civilian Police Review Board to conduct investigations and hand down decisions, rather than recommendations on police misconduct.

Established just over a year after residents voted in favor of Issue 24, the new commission is unlike any other in the country. It replaces the existing commission as a permanent, independent oversight body with increased resources and authority to make tough decisions on police training, policies and discipline, city officials said.

"This is an historic moment in our city's long journey towards police reform. While Cleveland's Community Police Commission first emerged out of the consent decree, this commission will live beyond it with greater powers and real independence to truly make a difference," Mayor Justin M. Bibb stated. "This commission is destined to leave a legacy of progress. With the changes implemented by the charter amendment, it's strong enough to deliver real accountability and make lasting change," the mayor added.

Commissioners were selected by the community follow-

ing an extensive public engagement process involving over 25 community leaders, including the original framers of Issue 24, police union representatives and others. Together they determined the shortlist of applicants and guided the interview process.

In addition to undergoing interviews by a five-member Selection Advisory Panel and background checks, all nominees were subject to extensive interviews by the Mayor's Appointments Committee (MAC).

After responding directly to questions about their personal experiences with law enforcement, motivations for serving on the commission and commitment to Cleveland, the MAC recommended that the full Council approve all nominees for appointment.

City leaders said the new members of the commission broadly represent the racial, social, economic and cultural diversity of the city including members who represent immigrant/refugee, LGBTQ+, youth, faith and business communities. Several of the appointed commissioners are also members from civil rights organizations, one commissioner is a designated police association representative, and many have personal experiences that city leaders said fulfil the intent of Charter Section 115-5.

Broadway street resurfacing in Bedford expected to start in spring, 2023

After discussions and negotiations with representatives from the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) on the projected cost, the resurfacing of Broadway Ave. in Bedford is expected to start next spring, City Manager Mike Mallis reported at the city council meeting Monday night.

Mallis said that the city was notified by ODOT at the beginning of 2022, that the cost of the project was just under \$3 million. A couple of months ago it spiked up to \$5.9 million, with ODOT telling the city that it would have to absorb the difference in cost.

"We went back and had some constructive discussions with them, and obviously, we modified the plans a little bit," Mallis said. "But we're at a spot where ODOT is accepting the modifications. I think we've worked through the budget items, and there's a very good possibility that what we've accomplished will ensure that the project happens in 2023."

He said traffic would be maintained during the course of the project, which extends the entire length of Broadway in Bedford.

At Monday's council meeting, also relating to the ongoing work on Broadway in the city, council passed a resolution declaring the intent of Bedford, on behalf of the state, to reimburse the city's Capital Projects Fund for the year 2022, for "Broadway Avenue Roadway and Waterline Improvements," with the proceeds of tax-exempt debt of the state.

The resolution states that the city is expecting to receive a reimbursement of \$300,000 for the project, with the proceeds of bonds to be issued by the state.

Finance Director Jennifer Howland explained, "This is a loan from the Ohio Public Works Commission, and in order to receive the funds and reimbursement, they require this resolution. We're already approved for funding, we just need to ask for reimbursement."

Other legislation passed

Also passed at Monday's meeting was an ordinance to make appropriations for expenses and expenditures for the city of Bedford's operations and services for 2023, in the amount of \$41,436,261.

Council passed a resolution in support of the Cuyahoga County 2022-2027 All-Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan and submitted for approval a plan to outline processes for identifying "natural hazards, risks and vulnerabilities," which is required to receive post-disaster Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funds.

Also passed was an ordinance to enter into a contract with Nick's Tree Service to handle trees that are too large for city crews and equipment to handle, at a cost of \$11,225. Mallis said the contract would cover removal of trees, grinding of stumps and cleaning of debris.

A resolution to enter into an agreement with the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA), to participate in the Regional Council of Governments for administration and collection of municipal income taxes in Bedford, and potentially gain more revenue for the city through increased collections, was placed on second reading.

Mayor Stan Koci stated, "To clarify, we've done two readings, and if we need a third reading (on the legislation), it will be next Monday, Dec. 12, at 6 p.m. here, to

do the third reading, and of course, we'll take the vote. Whether or not it happens, I wanted to give advance notice. We have to move it up because if it gets passed, we have some deadlines with RITA. And if it gets shot down, then we don't have to worry about anything. So I just wanted to put that out. If we need that meeting, it will be next Monday, due to time constraints."

Residents who spoke at the meeting expressed concerns about any potential costs if the city joined RITA, as well as a loss of services. Councilman Walter Genutis, who acknowledged he was aware of the concerns, said, "There will be no additional costs to the residents." The city's tax department would also be retained, he said.

Announcements

Councilwoman Sandy Spinks announced there will be a "Kris Kringle Market" to be held this Saturday, Dec. 10, from 11 a.m.-4 p.m. at the Bedford Historical Society Museum Store. Several vendors will be featured, she said.

Councilman Jeff Asbury said the Bedford Downtown Alliance "Mitten Tree" was on the wrought iron fence between Gionino's and Apotheosis on Broadway Ave., and residents were welcome to donate new or gently used, clean hats, scarves and gloves for anyone who might need them during the holiday season and beyond.

Councilman Frank Smith stated that he was part of an organization that would be hosting a Community Holiday Extravaganza this Saturday, Dec. 10, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., at 13512 Kinsman Rd., Cleveland. New coats, boots and other items will be given away. All Bedford residents were welcome. Smith will hold a similar event in Bedford next year, he stated.
