Man found guilty of murdering four in Slavic Village; could face death penalty

Armond Johnson, Sr. was found guilty by a Cuyahoga County jury last week of the quadruple murders in July, 2019, of his ex-girlfriend, their 6-year-old son, her 2-year-old daughter and a neighbor, David Cousin, Jr., who accidentally encountered Johnson as he was either entering or leaving the girlfriend's Slavic Village home.

Media sources confirm that Johnson, 29, was found guilty of 14 counts of aggravated murder and eight other charges in the deaths of Cousin, Jr., 35; Takeyra Collins, 25; Armond Johnson, Jr., 6; and Aubree Stone, 2. Johnson could face the death penalty.

On Tuesday, July 9, 2019, officers responded to the 3700 block of E. 63 St., for a report of a man lying in a field, according to police. While on scene, officers located the mother and two children deceased inside of the home next to the field. The home had also been set on fire.

The woman had been shot multiple times, and the children died from smoke inhalation, the medical examiner's office later determined.

Johnson was taken into custody the same day on an unrelated aggravated robbery warrant. Further investigation revealed him to be the suspect in the murders.

A Cleveland police spokesperson at the time confirmed that Cousins, who lived in a home in front of Collins, appeared to have accidentally encountered the suspect at the crime scene. Investigators said Johnson and girlfriend Takeyra Collins had a domestic violence history.

Since 2005, thanks to Cleveland's large community of music makers and music lovers, the Iron Ward Festival has been able to offer free outdoor performances each Monday evening in summer, under the evening sky.

New impacts of bridge construction

The ongoing I-480 Valley View Bridge Deck Replacement Project will necessitate the following new traffic impacts this week:

- Transportation Blvd. to I-480 westbound will be closed beginning Friday, Sept. 9, at 7 p.m., through Saturday, Sept. 10, at 10 a.m.

Detour will be I-480 eastbound to Granger Rd. to I-480 westbound.

G.H. School District announces new rules for home varsity football games

In light of the disturbances at the Garfield Heights High School varsity football home game on Friday, Aug. 26, Schools Superintendent Dr. Richard Reynolds last Tuesday announced that the Thursday, Sept. 1, game against Lutheran East would begin at 4 p.m.

Start times for the remaining home football games will be changed to 4 p.m. versus Shaker Heights on Sept. 23, and 5 p.m. versus Shaw on Oct. 7.

Other immediate changes

- Ticket restrictions will be implemented so that they are passcode protected.

- Home participants will have a limit of five tickets each, but can be increased if needed.

- Visiting participants will have a limit of five tickets each.

- Home students have a one-ticket limit with a 200-ticket maximum capacity.

- Garfield Heights High students must show student ID at the gate.

- Garfield Heights Middle School students must be accompanied by a parent or guardian to enter.

- The Garfield Heights City Schools will increase administrative presence at all home games with the addition of the Middle School principal.

- Football players entrance/exit will be roped off for security when they are entering or exiting the field.

- Additional portable parking lot lights will be rented to increase visibility.

Garfield Heights High School and Athletic Department officials will share additional information and details relative to these immediate changes.

Possible future changes

- The district is planning for a newly constructed outdoor athletic complex that will improve participation, safety, fan access and security and examining the hiring of additional security from a private company.

- The increased use of metal detectors at the home gate, to as many as two if personnel allows, is being actively considered.

- The district will analyze the addition of another garage door to the concession stand for the home fans and will increase temporary and permanent fencing in the concession stand area.

- Additional security cameras on and around the football field will be installed.

- Additional lights will be installed at the E. 97 St./Garfield Blvd. area as well as near the Performing Arts area.

Supt. Reynolds said that these possible future changes will continue to be analyzed for cost, timelines and needed resources to accomplish. As always, ongoing communications will continue with the public in a timely manner, he said.

"The Garfield Heights City Schools is dedicated to the highest standards of safety throughout our campus and is making these changes to help enhance and secure our fan experience at home football games," Reynolds said.

ALS Association hosts Northeast Ohio Walk to Defeat ALS® at Beacon Place in Independence

The ALS Association Northern Ohio Chapter will host the Northeast Ohio Walk to Defeat ALS on Sunday, Sept. 11, at Beacon Place, located at 6055 Rockside Woods Blvd. North in Independence. This is the Chapter's 23rd annual Walk in the Cleveland area.

Registration opens at Beacon Place on Sept. 11, at 9:30 a.m., and the opening ceremony begins at 10:45 a.m. Participants will enjoy live entertainment provided by Razing the Bar, family activities, Kid Zone, food trucks and the camaraderie of those united in the fight to defeat ALS.

For more information visit <https://www.als.org/northern-ohio>. The Northern Ohio Chapter expects more than 800 participants and hopes to raise \$512,500 at the Northeast Ohio Walk to Defeat ALS.

The Walk to Defeat ALS events are the Northern Ohio Chapter's largest fundraisers, with a combined goal of \$615,000 across the region; in addition to Cleveland-Akron, events are held in Toledo and Tiffin. Proceeds from the Walk to Defeat ALS benefit the Chapter's local care programs, including support groups, in-home and phone/email support, a durable medical and communication device equipment loan closet, and financial assistance through the Chapter's care and respite grant programs. Top performing teams, as of today, include Team Polito, Team Bolzan, Sonny's Hero and Team Shelley.

Walk officials have announced that Michael G. Polito, Esq., Polito Burke Rodstrom Szep, LLP, is serving as this year's Honorary Chair for the 2022 Northeast Ohio Walk to Defeat ALS.

"On behalf of my brother and best friend, Dr. Anthony "Tony" Polito, who lost his battle to ALS last year, as well my friend and colleague Andy Natale, who has been battling ALS since 2016—whose shoes I humbly attempt to fill as Honorary Chairman of the 2022 Northeast Ohio Walk to Defeat ALS—I am proud to fight for all families of a loved one afflicted with ALS," said Michael Polito. "We hope that our work will ensure that those afflicted, and their families, will be able to overcome the financial burdens of this terrible disease."

There is no fee to participate in the Walk to Defeat ALS. Participants raising \$90 or more will receive the official 2022 Walk to Defeat ALS t-shirt. All participants will receive a free Unlock ALS lanyard and Walk to Defeat ALS key. Participants are encouraged to bring photos of their loved ones who have battled ALS to share in the Celebration area.

2022 marks eight years after the ALS Ice Bucket Chal-

lenge changed the fight against ALS forever, and The ALS Association is recognizing the global viral media movement that swept the country in 2014. The Challenge inspired 17 million people to drench themselves in ice water and raised more than \$200 million worldwide for the fight against ALS, putting researchers closer than ever to a cure. Over the past eight years, the research community has discovered five new ALS genes to help narrow targets for treatments and a cure. Several new global research collaborations have been funded, and for the first time, scientists believe a cure is within reach.

ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis) is a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and the spinal cord. Eventually, people with ALS lose the ability to initiate and control muscle movement, which often leads to total paralysis and death within two to five years of diagnosis. ORDINANCE NO.: 62-2022 (AMENDED)
SPONSORED BY: MAYOR MATTHEW A. BURKE

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE ELECTORATE OF AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 41 OF THE GARFIELD HEIGHTS CHARTER, PROVIDING FOR THE MAYOR TO SERVE AS THE PUBLIC SAFETY DIRECTOR

WHEREAS, Section 52 of the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights permits this Council to submit proposed Charter amendments to the electors of the City upon a Council vote of two-thirds in favor of said change, and

WHEREAS, an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of Council members present shall result in this amendment to be presented to the electors of the City on the November 8, 2022, General Election, and

WHEREAS, the Garfield Heights Charter Review Committee, pursuant to Section 57 of the Garfield Heights Charter, has reviewed the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio, has recommended to Council amending Section 41 of the Garfield Heights Charter providing for the Mayor to serve as the Public Safety Director, and

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to provide for said amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio that

SECTION 1. Section 41 of the Garfield Heights Charter shall be amended as follows:

The Department of Public Safety shall be in the charge of the Safety Director. There shall be in the Department of Public Safety a Police Division and a Fire Division. There shall be in the Department of Public Safety a Division of Building, Engineering and Inspection. **The Mayor shall serve as Safety Director.**

41-A Annual rate of pay to be paid members of the police division. The annual rate of compensation for the members of the police division, Department of Public Safety, shall be no less than the average that is paid to members of police divisions in the suburban cities with a population of ten thousand (10,000) or more whose boundary lines are contiguous to the City of Cleveland.

On or about the first day of April of each year, the Council shall cause a survey to be made as to the rate of compensation paid to members of the police divisions of suburban cities whose population is ten thousand (10,000) or more, whose boundary lines are contiguous to the City of Cleveland, based upon the latest federal decennial census. Not later than the first day of June of each year, Council shall enact legislation providing for the payment of a rate of compensation for the members of the police division not less than the average compensation paid to the aforementioned suburban cities, which such rate of compensation shall become effective on and shall be paid from the first day of June of that year.

The expression "rate of compensation" or pay, as used in this section, shall apply only to a basic amount of wages and does not include such benefits as might be set up by any city by way of holidays, vacations, other permitted absences, overtime, longevity, night or split shifts, pay for specialized service within a classification or rank, or other premium pay differentials or any type whatsoever. The foregoing enumeration is not exclusive; it is the intent of this section that nothing other than a basic amount of wages, with included range scales, be included within the meaning of "rate of compensation" or pay.

Upon passage of this Charter Amendment, a special survey shall be made in accordance with the hereinbefore stated provisions, and the new rate shall be paid beginning January 1, 1973.

For the purpose of this section, the pay ranges of 1971 shall be considered as a base. Such additional funds as shall be required by the operation of this Section in addition to the 1971 base, shall be generated by an increase in the limitation on the rate of taxation as provided in Section 21 of this Charter.

Council is hereby authorized to increase the limitation on the rate of taxation by such millage as shall be needed to realize the funds required.

41-B Annual rate of pay to be paid members of the fire division. The annual rate of compensation for members of the fire division, Department of Public Safety, shall be no less than the average that is paid to members of the fire divisions in the suburban cities with a population of ten thousand (10,000) or more whose boundary lines are contiguous to the City of Cleveland.

On or about the first day of April of each year, the Council shall cause a survey to be made as to the rate of compensation paid to members of the fire divisions of suburban cities whose population is ten thousand (10,000) or more, whose boundary lines are contiguous to the City of Cleveland, based upon the latest Federal decennial census. Not later than the first day of June of each year, Council shall enact legislation providing for the payment of a rate of compensation for the members of the fire department not less than the average compensation paid to the aforementioned suburban cities, which such rate of compensation shall become effective on and shall be paid from the first day of June of that year.

The expression "rate of compensation" or pay, as used in this section, shall apply only to a basic amount of wages and does not include such benefits as might be set up by any city by way of holidays, vacations, other permitted absences, overtime, longevity, night or split shifts, pay for specialized service within a classification or rank, or other premium pay differentials or any type whatsoever. The foregoing enumeration is not exclusive; it is the intent of this section that nothing other than a basic amount of wages, with included range scales, be included within the meaning of "rate of compensation" or pay.

Upon passage of this Charter Amendment, a special survey shall be made in accordance with the hereinbefore stated provisions, and the new rate shall be paid beginning January 1, 1973.

For purposes of this section, the pay ranges of 1971 shall be considered as a base. Such additional funds as shall be required by the operation of this section in addition to the 1971 base, shall be generated by an increase in the limitation on the rate of taxation as provided in Section 21 of this Charter.

Council is hereby authorized to increase the limitation on the rate of taxation by such millage as shall be needed to realize the funds required.

SECTION 2. The proposed amendment to Section 41 of the Garfield Heights Charter shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the City of Garfield Heights at an election to be held November 8, 2022 during the regular hours of voting permitted as prescribed by law, where a majority affirmative vote is required for passage.

SECTION 3. The Law Director is hereby directed to transmit by certified mail a certified copy of this Ordinance and the following ballot language to the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections, c/o the Director's Office, located at 2925 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio 44115 and/or to hand-deliver the same to the Issues Department located on the Third Floor of the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections and obtain a written and dated receipt therefore and he is further directed to make the necessary arrangements with the Board of Elections, Cuyahoga County, for giving notice of the proposed amendment of the municipal Charter and for compliance with other regulations including but not limited to appropriate ballot language in accordance with the Ohio Revised Code.

WHEREAS, Section 52 of the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights permits this Council to submit proposed Charter amendments to the electors of the City upon a Council vote of two-thirds in favor of said change, and

WHEREAS, an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of Council members present shall result in this amendment to be presented to the electors of the City on the November 8, 2022, General Election, and

WHEREAS, the Garfield Heights Charter Review Committee, pursuant to Section 57 of the Garfield Heights Charter, has reviewed the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio, has recommended to Council amending Section 12 of the Garfield Heights Charter relating to the qualifications of the President of Council, and

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to provide for said amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio that

SECTION 1. Section 12 of the Garfield Heights Charter shall be amended to include the following language:

The Council shall elect one of its members President of Council at the first meeting in November following the General Election. The President of Council shall preside at all regular and special meetings of Council and perform such duties as presiding officer as may be imposed upon him or her by the Council. Council has the power to establish rules for the removal of President of Council during his or her term as they see fit. If the office of President of Council becomes vacant, or the President of Council is removed by Council, or the President of Council is absent from a regular or special meeting, Council shall elect a President pro tem. The President of Council shall be elected for a term commensurate with his or her duties as a councilperson and shall meet all of the qualifications as proscribed by the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights. **No Councilmember shall be elected President of Council until that member has completed one full term in office. In the event no member of Council has completed one full term in office at the time the President is to be elected, all members of Council shall be eligible to be elected.**

Section 12 of the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights shall go into effect concurrent with the expiration of the term of the Council President elected in the November 3, 2009 General Election, which will be midnight of Sunday, November 13, 2011.

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to provide for said amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio that:

SECTION 1. Section 59 of the Garfield Heights Charter relating to traffic photo-monitoring devices shall be repealed in its entirety:

~~59-1. — The City, including its various Boards, agencies and departments, shall not use any traffic law photo-monitoring device for the enforcement of a qualified traffic law violation, unless a law enforcement officer is present at the location of the device and personally issues the ticket to the alleged violator at the time and location of the violation.~~

~~59-2. Definitions. As used in this Section 59:~~

~~a.) "Law enforcement officer" means any law enforcement officer employed by the City or any other political jurisdiction in Ohio, including the State. The City may from time to time and in its discretion, by ordinance or resolution, designate which City employees are, "law enforcement officers" for purposes of this Section 59.~~

~~b.) "Qualified law traffic violation" means a violation of any of the following: (1) any state or local law relating to complying with a traffic control signal or railroad crossing sign or signal; or~~

~~(2) any state or local law limiting the speed of a motor vehicle.~~

~~c.) "Ticket" means any traffic ticket, citation, summons, or other notice of liability (whether civil or criminal) issued in response to an alleged qualified traffic law violation detected by a traffic law photo-monitoring device.~~

~~d.) "Traffic law photo-monitoring device" means an electronic system consisting of a photographic, video, or electronic camera and a means of sensing the presence of a motor vehicle that automatically produces photographs, videotape, or digital images of the vehicle, its license plate or its operator.~~

~~59-3. — Any ordinance enacted prior to the passage of this Amendment that contravenes any of the foregoing is void. After the enactment of this Amendment, the City shall not enact or enforce any ordinance that contravenes any of the foregoing. In the event that any provision of this Section 59 is found to be unconstitutional or impermissible in conflict with state or federal law, only such provision found to be unconstitutional or impermissible will be stricken, and the remainder of this Section 59 will remain in full force and effect.~~



At 10:03 a.m., four hijackers crashed United Airlines Flight 93 into a field in Stonycreek Township near Shanksville, Pennsylvania.

Members of the WAA family, including staff, volunteers, Gold Star and Blue Star Families, and veterans, will join to share in the patriotic act of waving the flag, and sharing the stories of those who raised their hand to serve following the events of that fateful day. The flag waving will start at 8:46 a.m. ET, when the first plane crashed in New York City, and end at 10:03 a.m. ET, when the last plane crashed in Shanksville.

You too can join by tuning in to the organization's Official Facebook page, to share pictures and videos from your own community flag waving. Participants are encouraged to take video and pictures of their participation in the national flag waving and share them with WAA, their family, and their friends to help REMEMBER, HONOR and TEACH the generation born after 9/11, how hard times can strengthen us as a nation. Please use the hashtag #FlagsAcrossTheCountry and #AmericaStrong when

posting on social media and tag the Wreaths Across America Official Facebook page.

WAA waves the American Flag every Tuesday morning between 9-10 a.m. ET, and encourages the public to join them. 



AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REPLACING GARFIELD HEIGHTS ORDINANCE 63-2022 AND PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE ELECTORATE OF AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 58 OF THE GARFIELD HEIGHTS CHARTER REGARDING THE TIME AND METHOD FOR SUBMITTING ZONING CHANGES TO THE ELECTORS

WHEREAS, Section 52 of the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights permits this Council to submit proposed Charter amendments to the electors of the City upon a Council vote of two-thirds in favor of said change, and

WHEREAS, an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of Council members present shall result in this amendment to be presented to the electors of the City on the November 8, 2022, General Election, and

WHEREAS, the Garfield Heights Charter Review Committee, pursuant to Section 57 of the Garfield Heights Charter, has reviewed the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio, has recommended to Council amending Section 58 of the Garfield Heights Charter regarding the time and method for submitting zoning changes to the electors of the City.

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to provide for said amendment, and

WHEREAS, this matter was previously passed through Council in Ordinance 63-2022 with a sixty (60) day requirement; this piece is being brought forth to Council to repeal and replace 63-2022 following a request from Cuyahoga County Board of Elections to extend that time frame to ninety (90) days.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio that:

SECTION 1. Section 58 of the Charter of the City of Garfield Heights, Ohio shall be amended as follows:

Notwithstanding anything in the Charter or laws of this City to the contrary, any change to the existing land uses, or any legislation changing the existing Zoning Map, shall not be approved or passed by the declaration of an emergency and shall not become finally effective without approval of the electors of Notwithstanding anything in the Charter or laws of this City to the contrary, any change to the existing land uses, or any legislation changing the existing Zoning Map, shall not be approved or passed by the declaration of an emergency and shall not become finally effective without approval of the electors of Garfield Heights:

Approval shall require a majority favorable vote of all votes cast by qualified electors at any regular Municipal election.

Upon failure to receive approval, the proposed change shall not be presented again for one year.

September 30 Last day an individual requesting a zoning change may address a letter to the Mayor requesting a change in zoning.

Prior to this date, the letter must be addressed to the President of Council fourteen (14) days before the next regularly scheduled Planning Commission meeting.

October 14-21 Last Planning Commission meeting which may recommend the proposed zoning change to Council and to the Ways and Means Committee (meets the third Wednesday of October).

October 31 Last day for zoning legislation to be introduced at a Council meeting. The proposed legislation must be immediately referred to the Ways and Means Committee for a minimum of fifteen (15) days. A public hearing must be held fifteen (15) days after the Council meeting at which zoning legislation is introduced.

November 1 Last day for notice of a public hearing to be given.

November 15 Public hearing must be held by this date.

November 30 Legislation must be passed in Council by this date.

December 3 The ordinance must be advertised in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Garfield Heights three (3) consecutive weeks by this date.

December 18 The Board of Elections must be notified of the ordinance. The ordinance and ballot language must be submitted to the Board of Elections by this date.

January 2 One (1) copy of the proposed ordinance must be posted in each of five (5) public places by this date.

SECTION 2. The proposed amendment to Section 58 of the Garfield Heights Charter shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the City of Garfield Heights at an election to be held November 8, 2022 during the regular hours of voting permitted as prescribed by law, where a majority affirmative vote is required for passage.

SECTION 3. The Law Director is hereby directed to transmit by certified mail a certified copy of this Ordinance and the following ballot language to the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections, c/o the Director's Office, located at 2925 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio 44115 and/or to hand-deliver the same to the Issues Department located on the Third Floor of the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections and obtain a written and dated receipt therefore and he is further directed to make the necessary arrangements with the Board of Elections, Cuyahoga County, for giving notice of the proposed amendment of the municipal Charter and for compliance with other regulations including but not limited to appropriate ballot language in accordance with the Ohio Revised Code.



SECTION 4. This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure for the best interest of the citizens of Garfield Heights and for the further reason that publication requirements of Ohio law pertaining to Charter amendments necessitates passage without undue delay, therefore this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its adoption by this Council and approval by the Mayor, otherwise from and after the earliest period allowed by law.







Cuyahoga County Board of Elections urges voters to utilize secretary of state's Vote-By-Mail application

Ohio Secretary of State (SOS) Frank LaRose is conducting a statewide Vote-by-Mail Ballot Application mailing. The Cuyahoga County Board of Elections is encouraging voters to use the ballot application to request their Vote-by-Mail ballots for the Nov. 8, 2022 General Election.

The appearance of the SOS Vote-by-Mail Ballot Application differs from those issued by the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections. However, the required information collected on both styles of the application is the same.

"We want to make sure that voters know the SOS document is an official Vote-by-Mail Ballot Application and they should not hesitate to use it," said Anthony Perlatti, the director of the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections.

The Ohio SOS mails voters Vote-by-Mail Ballot Applications during the Presidential and Gubernatorial General Elections. Using this application is a convenient way to request a Vote-by-Mail ballot as it saves voters the first step of requesting an application to be mailed to their residence. It facilitates a more streamlined application process, said Board officials.

The secretary of state will conduct a second ballot application mailing following the Oct. 11, 2022 voter registration deadline. The second mailing will reach first time registered voters who are not part of the initial mailing that is now underway.
