Cuy. County Treasury Dept. extends payment deadline for property tax bills

The Cuyahoga County Treasury Department has extended the deadline for residents to pay property taxes without penalty from Thursday, Jan 26, 2023, to Thursday, Feb.

It is important to note, said county officials, that residents will see a payment deadline of Thursday, Jan. 26, 2023, on the bills they received in the mail. However, the last day to pay without penalty has officially been extended to Thursday, Feb. 9, 2023.

The bills were mailed to more than 300,000 county residents. The funds collected from property taxes provide revenue for local schools, cities, villages, townships, libraries and vital public services.

Taxpayers can utilize the following methods of payment:

Indicted in death of woman found in vacant S.V. home

Kenneth Banville, 33, of Cleveland, has been indicted by a grand jury in the Cuyahoga County Court of Commons Pleas on one count of involuntary manslaughter in the death of Anastasia Hamilton, found deceased in an abandoned home on E. 54 St., in Slavic Village, on May

Hamilton, 25, of Medina, was last seen in the Tower City Parking Garage on Saturday, May 21, 2022, and was found dead four days later when Cleveland police officers responded to 3662 E. 54 St., in connection with a deceased female inside the vacant home. Officers arrived on scene and found Hamilton dead on a couch with lacerations, abrasions to the head, torso and extremities.

In indicting Banville for manslaughter in Hamilton's death, the grand jury, as recorded in court documents, stated that Banville "unlawfully did cause the death of Anastasia Hamilton and such death was the proximate result of Kenneth Banville committing or attempting to commit the felony offense of corrupting another with drugs/aggravated trafficking in drugs/possessing criminal tools/drug possession/permitting drug abuse.

Banville was indicted on a total of 16 counts and pleaded not guilty at his arraignment on Jan. 3, 2023. Bondwas set at \$100,000. He first pre-trial was scheduled for Jan. 11.

Grand jury indicts G.H. man for child exploitation

A Cuyahoga County grand jury has returned an indictment charging Christopher West, 34, and five others for child exploitation in separate incidents, County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley announced last week

From July 4, 2022, to November 10, 2022, it is alleged that West possessed child exploitation material. In response to a Cybertip from the National Center of Missing and Exploited Children, a search warrant was executed by the Ohio Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force with assistance from Homeland Security Investigations - Independence Cleveland, the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation, and the Garfield Heights Police Department at West's residence in Garfield Heights on November 10, 2022.

Investigators obtained child exploitation materials associated with West's account on a popular website applica- 800-REDCROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Cleveland City Council approves street improvement projects, appoints new Ward 11 councilman

Cleveland City Council returned from its winter recess on Jan. 9, holding its first meeting since December 9, 2022. During the meeting, Council accepted the resignation of Ward 11 Councilman Brian Mooney and voted to appoint well-known community member Danny Kelly to replace him effective Jan. 12, 2023.

At the Jan. 9 meeting, Council approved the Superior Avenue Midway Bikeway project, which entails construction of a separated bikeway and enhancements along the center of Superior Ave. from Public Square to E. 55 St., approximately 2.5 miles.

Called the "Superior Midway," the project includes a 10-foot wide separated bikeway within a new 26-foot wide median in the center of Superior Ave. Eight-foot buffers on both sides of the all-purpose path will protect users from car traffic. The median also functions as a traffic calming measure.

The improvements also include resurfacing, curb ramps, landscaping, pavement markings and signage. The project is expected to cost more than \$24 million with federal funds picking up about three-fourths of the cost.

Council also approved the city's reconstruction plan for Lorain Ave., from W. 65 St. to W. 20 St., 1.8 miles.

The improvements include new pavement, curb, walk and driveway aprons, upgrade catch basins, ADA compliant ramps at all locations, new water line, traffic signal improvements, and new pavement markings. A new separated bikeway will be installed next to the sidewalk with a buffer from car traffic. The construction costs are estimated at more than \$30 million. There is a current funding shortfall, and the city hopes to receive federal grants from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to make up the remainder.


Introduced

Council also introduced 30 pieces of legislation at the meeting. Summaries for each piece of legislation is available at www.clevelandcitycouncil.org. An overview of a few key pieces of legislation follows.

Funding Support for Say Yes Cleveland: Council heard legislation that would allocate \$600,000 in funding to Say Yes Cleveland for Family Support Specialists. Say Yes Cleveland provides wrap-around services to Cleveland Metropolitan School District students and families to assist them in achieving in their schools and in college and/ or work. The legislation will go to directors of Finance and Law and then to Council Committees on Workforce Education Training and Youth Development, Finance Diversity Equity and Inclusion before going to a full vote of council.

Authorizing purchase of future police HQ: Council received legislation requesting approval for the Mayor's Administration to purchase the building and land of the future police headquarters, located at 2350-2570 Superior Ave. The cost of the headquarters is not to exceed \$90 million. This legislation will go to the directors of Capital Projects, Public Safety, Public Works, City Planning Commission, Finance and Law and then go to Council Committees on Municipal Services and Properties, Safety, Development Planning and Sustainability, Finance Diversity Equity and Inclusion before going to full vote of council.

Airport and Port Control Maintenance: Seven pieces of legislation were introduced for the regular maintenance and operation of Hopkins and Burke Lakefront airports.

Recovered Stolen Auto

On Jan. 8, shortly before 2 p.m., police arrived in the area of the 10800 block of Park Hts. Ave. in reference to a possible stolen auto that two juveniles were seen jumping out of and then fleeing on foot east through back yards. Police saw that the 2016 Hyundai Tucson SUV was stopped sideways in the street with the driver's side rear window broken out and the steering column peeled. The vehicle was reported stolen earlier that day out of Cleveland.

After the vehicle was towed an officer saw two juvenile gunshot wounds occurring in the 3500 block of E. 82 St. males in dark hoodies come from a back yard looking They were taken to MetroHealth Medical Center for around and quickly walking toward Wallingford and running into backyards south until police lost sight of

them. A drone was deployed and police saw the two walking in the parking lot at St. John's School on Granger Rd. When they saw police they again fled on foot, with one of them jumping into a dumpster to hide. The other fled across Turney Rd., toward the Sunoco station. The juvenile in the dumpster was apprehended. The second juvenile was found hiding behind a garage on Danbury, where he was taken into custody. Both were taken to city jail. Charges are pending through the Youth Bureau.

Fleeing and Eluding

On Jan. 9, at 1:55 p.m., officers were attempting to locate a 20-year-old male at the Rockside Place Apartments in Garfield Heights. He had numerous felony and misdemeanor warrants with GHPD and surrounding agencies. When the suspect saw officers, he fled on foot , jumping off a third story balcony at the apartment complex. He then fled east over a fence at which point the gun he was carrying discharged and the bullet struck him in the left shin. He was taken into custody, rendered first aid and taken to MetroHealth Medical Center for his injuries. Charges were pending at the time of the report.

Weapon Offense

On Jan. 11, at 12:37 a.m., an officer was patrolling on Turney Rd., and stopped a vehicle near Sladden Ave., for not having a readable temporary tag in the car's back window. The driver stopped the car and as police talked to him a faint smell of raw marijuana was detected. A probable cause search of the car revealed a Glock handgun under the driver's seat. The suspect, who was standing on the sidewalk during the search, was asked by police to put his hands behind his back, at which point he took off on foot. An officer pointed his service weapon at the man and ordered him to stop running. After ditching a bag he was carrying, the man gave up and was secured in the police cruiser. Inside the bag the man had been carrying also found that the neighbor's house had been shot was suspected marijuana and a Glock extended magazine matching the Glock in the vehicle. The suspect was transported to city jail. ACCH was run on him but he was disqualified from possessing a firearm due to an involuntary manslaughter conviction. He was charged with weapons under disability, improper handling of a firearm in a motor vehicle and cited for no valid license, display of plates and issued a court summons for obstructing official

Shots Fired

On Jan. 12, shortly before $3\,\mathrm{p.m.}$, police heard numerous gunshots coming from across the street from the police station, and several officers said they saw three males shooting at a house on Hempstead. They saw the three males run east and cut through the alley behind Family Dollar and get into a silver car parked on Darlington. A witness said the car was a Nissan Maxima and she saw it flee east on Darlington towards Turney Rd. A police sergeant called in that he had found numerous shell casings on Hempstead, and then closed the street. Members of the Detective Bureau arrived and began marking evidence.

Officers found the home that had been targeted in the 11400 block of Hempstead with a Volkwagen parked in the driveway that had been shot numerous times. They numerous times. Officers canvassed the neighborhood for homes with cameras on them and found one that showed three males run up to the house. One of them was carrying a rifle and two others were carrying handguns. They all began shooting and then ran back east on Hempstead.

In total 38 rounds were collected with four different caliber casings collected. Detectives continue to investigate.






