Free wheel locking clubs for Hyundai, Kia owners

"Thank you to Hyundai Motors of America! Yesterday we received wheel locking clubs, specifically for Hyundai and Kia vehicles. These are for KEYED ignitions only, NOT push button start. There are a limited amount of locks available. To ensure that our residents are receiving these locks you must bring BOTH with you:

1. Drivers license or any document with your Garfield Heights address on it.

2. Your vehicle registration for your Hyundai or Kia between the years 2011-2021.

"Please come to the Garfield Heights Police Department lobby and see the Records Department between the hours of 8 a.m.-4 p.m., Monday - Friday. If you need assistance outside of these hours, please email bmccuneghpd@outlook.com or call GHPD at 216-475-1234 and ask to speak with Officer B. Crespo.

"We are aware that there are ways around these locks. However, these wheel locks are a good deterrent and beneficial to have. Hyundai is set to release an upcoming software update in March to help their customers with the rise in thefts. Remember to lock your vehicles and remove all personal belongings!"

CLE City Council votes \$4 million to revamp 3-1-1

Cleveland City Council held its regular meeting Monday night and approved spending \$4 million to revamp, expand and reconstruct 3-1-1 to manage citizen requests for non-emergency services.

The 3-1-1 service should be a one stop shop for all non-emergency city services, from pothole reports, building violations, animal issues and tree-trimming requests, among others. Its goal is to secure a new platform that can: expand access to 3-1-1 with the launch of new channels to submit and track requests, collect resident contact information, complaints and inquiries, and allow residents to check the status of requests by tracking number or calling 3-1-1.

Resident will be able to contact 3-1-1 either online or through a phone call. The software will capture the requests from the public (via phone, internet, etc.), manage the response to each request, solicit feedback from the public after addressing a request, and monitor the resolution of non-emergency requests.

Other legislation also passed at Monday night's meeting included:

Say Yes to Education Cleveland Funding Gap: Current year funding for Say Yes to Education Cleveland faced a funding gap that needed to be filled quickly or SYC Family Support Specialists would have to be laid off. Council approved spending \$600,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funding to help address the funding gap and keep Family Support Specialists serving Cleveland's kids.

Say Yes support services are designed to help students stay on track throughout their school careers, so they are ready to take full

advantage of Say Yes Cleveland scholarships after high school for four-year or two-year college and other certificate programs. After a four-year ramp up since launch in 2019, SYC has specialists for all 104 CMSD and partner charter schools.

Growing the Workforce Pipeline: Council approved using \$10 million in American Rescue Plan Act funding to grow the workforce pipeline for current and anticipated demand in residential and commercial construction, infrastructure and transit, green infrastructure, broadband and lead and brownfield remediation. The major federal investments provided for in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, CHIPS Act, and Inflation Reduction Act are anticipated to create many jobs.

Two teens shot in Bedford; 13-year-old dies at hospital

Last Sunday, Jan. 29, at approximately 6:52 p.m., Bedford police officers and fire medics were dispatched to the area of Corkhill and Lee Rd. South for a report of a male that had been shot.

Officers learned two males, ages 13 and 15, suffered gunshot wounds. Both were transported to MetroHealth Medical Center for treatment. The 13-year-old male died as a result of his injuries. Police have no further information to release on the incident at the present time because it is an ongoing investigation.

Weapon Offense.

On Jan. 23, at about 4:54 a.m., officers were dispatched to the 6000 block of Monica Ln. for a report of shots fired. As officers approached the residence to check on those

inside, a man came out of the home with an extended magazine belonging to a semi-automatic pistol sticking out of his pants pocket. When officers commanded him to show his hands, he reached into his pocket and pulled out the weapon and threw it on the ground in front of him. The suspect was told at gunpoint to get to his knees, which he did. Officers placed him in handcuffs, patted him down and secured him in a cruiser. Members of the suspect's family inside the residence told police he had just been in an argument with his girlfriend, but she had since left. The family members said they were not aware that the suspect had fired his weapon. Officers found spent casings outside the front door of the home. Police said the suspect was visibly intoxicated. He was taken to GHPD jail and denied ever shooting his firearm. He was tested for gun residue on his hands. The report will be forwarded to the Detective Bureau for review.

Traffic Offense – Fleeing

On Jan. 24, at 9:36 p.m., an officer observing traffic on Granger Rd., saw a Pontiac G6 with no working headlights headed east on Granger. It sparked his attention because he had seen the same exact make and model vehicle fleeing from him the day before. Roland Dr. and pursued the car through Garfield Heights and then into Cleveland on E. 57 St. Stop sticks were deployed and the car was disabled on E. 57 St. The driver then fled the vehicle on foot into backyards. A passenger remained inside the car with his hands in the air. Police pursued the fleeing suspect to E. 54 St., where they saw him get into a Ford Fusion operated by a female who seemed to be very confused as to what was going on. The suspect layed on the back seat of the car and as police were trying to get him out of the car, the suspect ordered the woman to drive away. She refused and remained in the driver's seat. After a short struggle, the suspect was removed from the car and handcuffed. The female drove away from the scene and did not return. The passenger in the car was found to have an active warrant with the Newburgh Heights Police Department. The driver suspect was run through LEADS and found to be suspended for driving with no warrants. It also showed he was on parole. Both men were taken into custody. The suspect driver was issued a traffic citation for headlights required, red light, fleeing and eluding, reckless operation and driving under suspension and charged with obstructing official business.

Theft of Motor Vehicle

On Jan. 25, at 3:36 a.m., an officer was dispatched to the 9300 block of Park Heights Ave., for the theft of a 2019 Kia Optima parked in the back of the owner's driveway near his garage. The complainant said he woke up at 3 a.m. and realized his car was gone. He told police he had seen headlights in his driveway around midnight but didn't think anything of it at the time. He said his shotgun and .357 Magnum were in the trunk of the car. He was advised to call GHPD when he has more information regarding serial numbers for the firearms. Vehicle entered into LEADS.

Shots Fired

On Jan. 25, shortly before 1 a.m., police were dis-

patched to the 4600 block of E. 86 St., for a report of shots fired. The complainant told police she had heard gunshots outside her home prior to police arrival. She found her front window broken and police found two rounds on her porch, one casing and one live. They also observed her front picture window was broken and appeared to have an egg thrown at it. There was also a Ford Escape in the driveway backed in by the side of the home that was also hit with eggs on the windshield, but there was no damage to the vehicle. No further shell casings were found. Police noted there were several bullet holes in the residence but the complainant said that it was old damage from a previous incident.

On Jan. 27, about 2 p.m., an officer arrived to take the report of a stolen 2016 Chevy Silverado from the street in the 13700 block of North Dr. The complainant said he was working inside a home on North Dr. and did remove the keys from the vehicle. When he came back outside his truck and concrete buggy belonging to ABC rental were missing from the street. Vehicle entered into LEADS as stolen.

Obstructing Official Business

On Jan. 27, shortly after 9:30 p.m., police responded to a call that a suspicious vehicle was parked on the street in the area of the 12400 block of Willard Ave. The vehicle, a dark red Kia Sorento, was running and occupied. Officers made contact with the driver of the car and he was found to have a warrant for his arrest through Brook Park PD, and also showed cautions for being armed and dangerous with violent tendencies.

Police removed the suspect from the car and while he was being taken into custody, he pulled away from an officer's grasp and fled west down the street. Both officers gave chase with one of them deploying a Taser, which was unsuccessful in stopping him. The suspect then fled north into a driveway in the 12300 block of Bangor Rd., where he got on the ground and gave himself up. He was held at gunpoint until taken into custody.

Menacing

On Jan. 29, about 12:45 p.m., an officer was dispatched to Walgreens, 5090 Turney Rd., where the manager stated that a black male juvenile wearing a black coat and red sweatpants had a gun in his hand and pointed it at the manager's head while he was walking down the aisle of the store. The manager said that when he first encountered the suspect he said the gun was fake. As the manager walked away he looked up at the mirrors on the ceiling of the store and saw the suspect raise the firearm to the manager's head and pull the trigger. The manager said he could hear the gun "click" as he walked away, making him believe that the gun was indeed fake. Police could not locate the suspect.

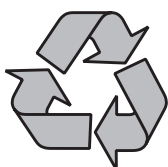

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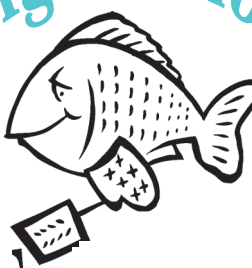

On Wednesday, Jan. 25, the Southeast League of Women Voters hosted its first Community Forum featuring the area's new representative on the State Board of Education, Tom Jackson. The forum was co-sponsored by the Twinsburg League of Women Voters, Friends of the Bedford Library and the Bedford Council of PTAs.

Jackson, of Solon, was elected in November in the newly-defined District 10, which for the first time includes all four municipalities within the Bedford City School District. Four members of the local school board attended the forum, which drew residents of the Bedford, Brecksville-Broadview Heights, Solon and Twinsburg school districts.

The dialogue covered a range of topics including student testing, the ongoing search for a State Superintendent to fill a two-year vacancy, attempts to reduce the authority of the mostly-elected State Board of Education, school vouchers, and pressures on local school boards.

The Southeast Chapter is a nonpartisan resource for voters in the southeastern Cuyahoga County communities of Bedford, Bedford Heights, Oakwood Village and Walton Hills, which together make up the Bedford City School District.

These projects are on the horizon, and workforce is currently a limiting factor.

This initiative creates the structure and mechanisms for workers to connect to training, and ultimately employers and projects. It also leverages the operating structure of Ohio Means Jobs Cuyahoga County by funding existing training programs tailored to meet employer needs and adaptable as new projects emerge.

Collective Bargaining Agreements Passed: Council approved the collective bargaining agreement with the Cleveland Building and Construction Trades Council. Council also approved the collective bargaining agreement with the Machinists District 54, Local No. 439 and an amendment of an earlier ordinance relating to compensation for various classifications.
