## Police arrest 3 in Langton Ave. shootings

Three males, all age 22, were each charged with three counts of felonious assault in connection with an incident on Langton Ave., near E. 111 St., in Garfield Heights, last Thursday afternoon in which a father and his six-month old baby girl were shot.

Last word was that the father and daughter were both hospitalized in stable condition.

Charged in the shootings were Khayree Sullivan, Marvin Bell and Kameron White, all of Garfield Heights. They were bound over to the county with bond set at \$2 million each.

Garfield Heights Chief of Staff Jeff Jerome spoke of the shootings at Monday night's council meeting in response to concerns of a resident and stressed the incident wasn't random and that all suspects were in custody.

He said a man and woman were walking down Langton about 4:45 p.m., on Sept. 21, with the dad holding the baby, when a car with three men pulled up to them and an argument ensued.

Jerome said there had been a longstanding disagreement between the man shot and one or more of the individuals in the car since their high school days. He said both the victim and the suspects believed all were armed and shots were fired from the car and hit the victim in the left hip and his daughter in an unspecified location.

The male victim was transported to Marymount Hospital, along with his baby. The male victim was treated for his injury and the baby was LifeFlighted to MetroHealth Medical Center and is currently hospitalized.

Jerome said the situation was contained almost immediately by Garfield Heights police. They surrounded a house where the suspects were said to be located and they all came out and were arrested without incident.

## G.H. Council passes more legislation on transformation of Garfield Boulevard

An emergency ordinance was passed at Monday night's meeting of Garfield Heights Council to enter into a Project Development Agreement with Cuyahoga County and the Cleveland Metroparks for the rehabilitation and maintenance of Garfield Blvd.

The proposed rehabilitation project would transform Garfield Blvd. into a "Complete Street" by removing excess roadway which would allow for space for stormwater management infrastructure, green infrastructure and a multi-use trail connecting the Metroparks' Towpath Trail from Warner Rd. to the Garfield Park Reservation down Garfield Blvd.

Also at the meeting was an official with Kokosing Materials, Inc., David Gregg, (pictured in photo at right with Council President Tom Vaughn) who presented the city with a check for \$6300 for the city's Food Bank. Each year Kokosing participates in a food drive for various pantries throughout the state to provide for those in need. This is their 15th annual event.

The following legislation was also passed at Monday's meeting:

- Amending the codified ordinances of the city in order to raise the registration fee for city contractors from \$75 to \$125, effective Jan. 1, 2024.

- Purchasing a 2023 single axle snow and ice control equipment package (dump body) from Henderson Products, Inc. to complete a new salt truck for the Service Department, at a cost not to exceed \$101,000.

- Purchasing and having installed one chiller (cooling water circulation device) for the Garfield Heights Justice Center from Carrier Commercial Service at a cost not to exceed \$140,000.

# Community Police reports

## Traffic Offense-Fleeing

On Aug. 28, at about 10:30 p.m., officers were advised that a white Kia sedan was traveling south on Turney Rd. near Granger Rd., and was stolen out of Cleveland. An officer pulled behind the Kia on Turney Rd., as it turned west onto Bradwell Rd., and began to accelerate. The officer activated his emergency lights and sirens to conduct a traffic stop but the Kia sped away. The vehicle was occupied by 4-5 individuals who were wearing ski masks. The Kia got onto I-480 west and continued north on I-77. The pursuit was terminated on I-77 north near the Opportunity Corridor.

## Recovered Stolen Auto

On Aug. 31, at about 2:17 a.m., police were radioed that a stolen white Kia Sportage was seen on Flock entering Garfield Heights westbound on Rockside Rd., from Maple Heights. MHPD informed GHPD officers that the Kia was last seen taking a northbound turn onto Monica Ln. Police found the car parked on Eastwood Blvd., with

a black male wearing a red hoodie and blue jeans walking away from it. Police turned around to check on the vehicle, which was confirmed stolen out of Independence, but once they returned to the area, the black male was gone. Independence police arrived on scene to process the vehicle and decided to attempt to track the suspect, but with no success.

## Drug Abuse

On Sept. 17, about 6:11 a.m., police responded to I-480 West near Transportation Blvd., for a report of a disabled vehicle in the median. They found a Jeep Patriot with heavy front end damage in the grassy area off the roadway. Then they saw a man run across the highway back towards the vehicle. The man told officers he was driving the Jeep on I-480 East and fell asleep at the wheel causing him to run off the road on the left and strike a light pole. Police did not notice any signs of impairment and let him get some things out of his car and wait for his ride to come. When police conducted an inventory of the car they found two glass pipes commonly used to smoke meth and another one used for smoking marijuana and about eight grams of suspected marijuana. At this time the driver was placed in handcuffs and put in the rear of the cruiser. He admitted to having taken a gun out of his car when getting his possessions. Police also found 2.5 grams of a substance they believed to be meth. The suspect was placed under arrest for drug possession and drug abuse instruments, and issued a traffic citation for failure to control.

# Proposed bond issue on Nov. ballot in Bedford for new school buildings

If approved by voters in the Bedford City School District, a bond issue on the November ballot will raise more than \$161 million towards new construction and upgrades to school facilities over the next several years, a district official said at the Bedford Council meeting on Sept. 18.

Tad Ellsworth, Executive Director of Operations for the school district, said that if the 9.9-mill bond issue is approved on Tuesday, Nov. 7, property owners in the school district, which includes the communities of Bedford, Bedford Heights, Walton Hills and Oakwood Village, would pay about 95 cents a day per every \$100,000 worth of appraised valuation of their home.

Ellsworth made a presentation at the meeting to provide information on the bond issue. He stated that the oldest building in the district is Central School on Washington St., which is 114 years old, and the newest building is Heskett School on Perkins Rd., in Bedford Heights, which is 58 years old. The average age of buildings in the district is 74 years old.

The results of a state facilities study, which was released by the district, estimated that \$174 million would have to be spent in the next 10 years just to keep the doors open, and the same study estimated that the cost of bringing the aging school buildings up to date to accommodate advancements in education and technology would be about \$224 million.

To address the problem of aging school buildings, the new Building a Brighter Future Community Committee was started, comprising about 50 people in the district, including parents, staff, business owners and other interested individuals.

Ellsworth said the committee, with the assistance of the architectural firm the GPD Group, came up with a Master Plan, which includes building a new high school on the site of the present Bedford High School on Northfield Rd., with expanded career and technical education opportunities, including cosmetology, visual communication, graphic design, engineering and biotechnology.

A new 6th-8th grade school would be built on the site of the former St. Peter Chanel High School (now demolished) on Northfield Rd. There are plans to build the new Administration facilities on the Chanel site as well; building a new Pre-K-2nd grade school with expanded preschool opportunities on the Heskett site; and repurposing the existing Heskett School for 3rd-5th grade students. In this way, the six current buildings in the district will be reduced to four, Ellsworth stated.

The Bedford School Board met over the summer months and reviewed the Master Plan, and subsequently voted to place the 9.9-mill bond issue on the November ballot, Ellsworth said, explaining that if it passes, the district would be eligible for 21% in state funding towards the plan, a little over \$32 million of state money, in addition to the school money. However, this is a limited time opportunity offered by the state necessitating the accelerated timeline, he said.

The proceeds of the bond issue can only be used for the construction of new facilities

and preparation of sites, Ellsworth said. "It cannot be used for salary and benefits. It is not an operating levy. This is purely for the construction of new facilities."

## Legislation

Council passed an ordinance at the meeting authorizing City Manager Mike Mallis to enter into a contract with Assured Partners Ohio, LLC, for CyberRisk liability insurance provided by Travelers Bond and Specialty Insurance "to mitigate any cyber attacks the city may experience," at a cost of \$31,638 for a one-year policy. Finance Director Jennifer Howland said this is a renewal of the city's existing policy and has increased 1 1/2% from the previous year.

An ordinance to enact a new chapter of the codified ordinances, "Video Surveillance Systems for Apartment Complexes," would require apartment complexes to install video surveillance systems and provide access to the videos to Bedford Police. It was placed on first reading for further discussion.

A motion to rename and dedicate the current Interstate Park in the city as "Bill Cosgrove Park" was also placed on first reading.

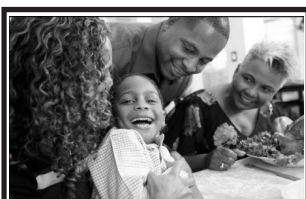

•A Final Resolution enacted by the city of Garfield Heights, in cooperation with the Ohio Department of Transportation, for the improvements to Antenucci Blvd., with the city assuming 100% of the entire cost of the improvements within the city limits, less the amount of federal aid funds set aside by the Director of Transportation for the financing of this improvement from funds allocated by the Federal Highway Administration, U.S. Department of Transportation.

The city's ultimate share of the cost will be calculated when final actual costs and allocations are determined.

•Placing a temporary moratorium on the establishment of family cemeteries within the city. The city currently has no established zoning regulations or codified regulations regarding family cemeteries. Council wishes to consider if family cemeteries should be permitted in Garfield Heights, and, if so, the proper zoning and codified regulations to put in place.

•Applying for grant funding for Title III grant funds through the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging for the Senior Center's congregate and home-delivered meals for the years 2024 and 2025.

The next regular council meeting will be held on Monday, Oct. 9.

# Cavaliers to build sports performance center downtown which would house its training facility

Cleveland Council President Blaine A. Griffin and Councilman Kerry McCormack are celebrating the announcement from the Cleveland Cavaliers last Thursday about creating the first-of-its-kind sports performance center and training facility in downtown Cleveland.

For many years the current training center for the Cavaliers has been on Brecksville Rd. in Independence.

"The creation of the Cleveland Clinic Global Peak Performance Center downtown is exciting, and putting it at the Cuyahoga Riverfront helps anchor it as it transitions into an energized Cleveland neighborhood," said Griffin. "It builds on the city's great strength in having the esteemed Cleveland Clinic as a partner as well as incorporating the city and Bedrock's vision for the river front."

Councilman McCormack, who represents the neighborhood, said the location is superb and builds additional energy in downtown, which has become more than the

business center of the city but a residential neighborhood.

Independence Mayor Greg Kurtz said in last week's Mayor's Update email that, "I value the working relationship we have developed over the years and the significant investment the organization has made in the City of Independence. The team's decision to invest in our community and establish its training facility on Brecksville Road has enriched our community."

He said the city of Independence looks forward to maintaining its collaborative, long-standing relationship with the Cleveland Cavaliers for the foreseeable future.

"The Cavs strategic plan for this global project will require several years of planning and construction. It also presents new opportunities for the city to consider," Kurtz concluded.

## Internet coming for CLE residents at \$18 a month

Cleveland City Council passed legislation Monday night allowing the city to enter into agreements with DigitalC for the deployment of a citywide broadband network and to provide related equipment and services to Cleveland residents.

Council members, including Utilities Chair Brian Kazy, had amended the legislation to ensure that the funding is only approved based on performance. DigitalC must meet annual performance-based metrics in signing up customers and keeping them before receiving funding each year.

Council had set aside \$20 million in revenue recovery funding about two years ago to tackle the digital divide in Cleveland.
