Garfield Hts. mayor announces major funding for his city



Hello, Garfield Heights! Today I bring you great news thanks to President Joe Biden, Vice President Kamala Harris and our wonderful Congresswoman Shontel Brown, who works tirelessly for our region. Garfield Heights is set to receive part of \$129 million in grant funding for clean energy, a significant boost for our city and region. This funding is made available through Climate Pollution Reduction Grants.

The EPA CPRG funding will enable an unprecedented amount of brownfield and landfill solar to be developed in Northeast Ohio, some of it right in our own backyard.

Out of over 300 applications, our region was one of only 25 in the nation to be awarded this grant, highlighting the impact of our community's efforts.

I would like to express my gratitude to Cuyahoga County Executive Chris Ronayne and his team for their role in securing a historic \$1 billion investment in Garfield Heights, the largest ever in our city's history. This investment, which will build the Cuyahoga County Central Services Campus on the site of the old Bridgeview property, demonstrates the commitment to our city's growth and development.

Additionally, I want to thank the county for awarding \$250,000 for the reconstruction of McCracken Road, further enhancing our city's infrastructure. This funding is a testament to the progress and forward momentum of Garfield Heights. I am grateful for the dedication of my leadership team and particularly commend Assistant Economic Development Director Janice Tubbs for her tireless efforts in seeing these projects through.

It is a momentous time for Garfield Heights, for me as mayor and for all the residents who have eagerly awaited this progress.

Library program draws 'Shawshank' fans

Fans of "The Shawshank Redemption" movie were in for a treat last Tuesday, July 30, when author and Largely Literary cofounder Mark Dawidziak visited the Independence Branch Library to present a program based on his 2019 book "The Shawshank Redemption Revealed," which was published on the 25th anniversary of director Frank Darabont's film adaptation of Stephen King's novella.

Filmed in Ohio largely at the old Mansfield Reformatory and starring Tim Robbins and Morgan Freeman, "The Shawshank Redemption" has risen in popularity since its release in 1994, reaching No. 1 on IMDB's list of most-loved movies. Dawidziak conducted more than 70 interviews for the book, talking to King, Darabont, Robbins and Freeman, as well as extras, supporting players and behind-the-scenes talent.

Dawidziak, a theater, film and television reviewer for more than 43 years at newspapers including the Akron Beacon Journal and Plain Dealer, he delighted the library audience last week with all sorts of interesting "Shawshank" trivia. Listeners were astounded to hear that Tom Cruise and Harrison Ford were the A-listers first sought after for the parts that eventually went to Robbins and Freeman respectively.

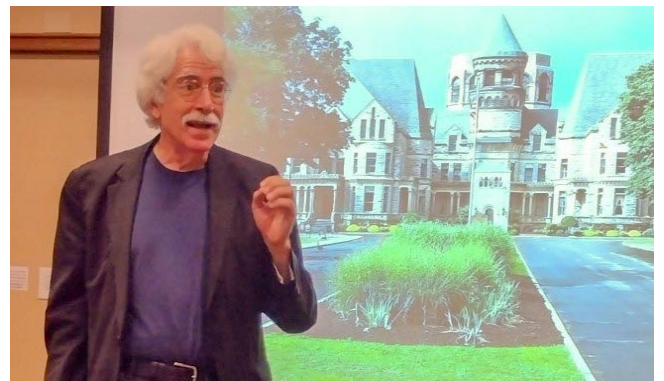
Dawidziak is the author or editor of about 25 books, including three studies of landmark television series: "The Columbo Phile: A Casebook," "The Night Stalker Companion" and "Everything I Need to Know I Learned in The Twilight Zone."

He also is an internationally recognized Mark Twain scholar, and five of his books are about the iconic American writer. His work on the horror side of the street also includes the novel "Grave Secrets," "The Bedside, Bath tub & Armchair Companion to Dracula," short stories, and comic book scripts. He lives in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio.

Dawidziak travels the country giving talks on his books and will be sure to be in Mansfield for The Shawshank Redemption 30th Anniversary Celebration (shawshank30.com) coming up this weekend, August 9-11.

Olympian Stella Walsh still inspires in community she called home

As someone of Polish descent living in Cleveland, Stella (Walasiewicz) Walsh's story feels deeply personal and incredibly inspiring. Growing up, I heard tales of her remarkable achievements, not just from history books but from the thriving Polish community around me. The Stella Walsh Recreation Center, not far from my home, stands as a testament to her legacy and triumph.

Additionally, the plaque in her memory at my local public library serves as a constant reminder of her incredible journey and the profound impact she had both locally and internationally and shows that she was always willing to help her community.

Born Stanislawa Wala-siewicz on April 3, 1911, in Wierzchnia, Poland, Walsh appears as one of the most celebrated athletes in the annals of Polish sports history. Her family emigrated to the United States when she was just a child, settling in Cleveland, Ohio, where I call home. Despite her new surroundings, Walsh's Polish heritage stayed a cornerstone of her identity, fueling her drive to stand for Poland on the international stage, and it was not too hard with all the support from the Polish community found here in Cleveland. Walsh's athletic abilities became clear early on. By her teenage years, she had already made a name for herself in local track events, showing her blend of speed and endurance that would soon be shown to the world.

Stella Walsh's career is proven by several victories and records, both in the national and international arenas. One of her defining moments came during the 1932 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. Competing under the Polish flag, Walsh won the gold medal in the 100 meters with a time of 11.9 seconds, tying the world record. This victory not only marked Poland's first Olympic gold medal in the 100-meter race but also set up Walsh as a trailblazer in women's athletics. Throughout the 1930s and 1940s, Walsh continued to dominate out on the track. She won an impressive collection of titles, including multiple European championships. She set over 100 national records in Poland and more than 50 U.S. records. Her versatility and abilities extended beyond sprinting; she excelled in long jump and discus throw. One of Walsh's most remarkable achievements was setting the world record for the 100 yards, clocking in at 10.5 seconds in 1943 — a record that stood for over a decade. Her athletic career is a testament to her relentless dedication, breaking barriers and setting up new standards for female athletes worldwide.

Stella Walsh's legacy goes beyond her athletic accomplishments. Her journey from a small village in Poland to Olympic glory serves as a powerful story of perseverance, resilience and unwavering commitment. For today's world and my generation, including many others in our community, Walsh's story offers vital lessons that we can all learn from. She faced many challenges, from facing financial hardships and the complexities of dual-national identity to arriving in a new country and starting a new life, always remaining focused on her goals. Her ability to overcome personal difficulties and obstacles that society threw at her highlights the power of her determination. As one of the first women to succeed in international athletics, Walsh broke gender barriers and challenged societal norms. Her achievements paved the way for future generations of female athletes, proving that excellence knows no gender or culture.

Despite her life in the United States, Walsh's pride in her Polish heritage highlights the importance of cultural identity. She balanced her dual-national identity with grace, proudly standing for Poland and contributing to American sports. Her many records and medals serve as a reminder of what can be achieved with dedication and hard work and her legacy encourages young people to strive for excellence and to believe in their potential, regardless of what obstacles get thrown at them.

Walsh faced controversy on her gender identity following her sudden death in 1980 when she was struck in the crossfire of an armed robbery. Despite all of this she lived her life as a woman and was always wanting to help her community for the better, and this is clear as in her last moments she was buying ribbons for a welcoming ceremony of Polish basketball players.

Stella Walsh's story is not just one of athletic triumph but a narrative rich with lessons in perseverance, resilience and the pursuit of excellence. Her legacy spires young athletes like me to dream big, work hard and embrace their identities. Living in Cleveland, where her memory is cherished and celebrated, I feel a connection to her story.

As we celebrate the 100th anniversary of Poland's inaugural Olympic victory, Stella Walsh stands as a beacon of what can be achieved with dedication and a pioneering spirit. Her life and achievements are a timeless source of inspiration for me and countless others in our community.

(Editor's Note: Gustav applied for a scholarship from the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America and wrote this article on Stella Walsh as the essay requirement for scholarship consideration. Applicants were asked to choose a Polish Olympian (past or present), state their background and sports victories and describe how their success could serve as a source of inspiration for the current generation. We received word yesterday that Gustav had been awarded the scholarship.)

Traffic Offense-OVI

On July 30, at 2:47 p.m., police were dispatched to the 4800 block of E. 88 St. for a hit-skip accident. The complainant said her vehicle was struck by a 2016 maroon Chevy and the driver, after a brief conversation with her, left the scene without providing any information as required. The victim followed the driver to a home in the 4500 block of E. 88 St., where he had pulled into the rear of the driveway and exited. Police found him sitting on a chair on the rear porch. Police said he had slurred and mumbled speech and was unable to maintain his balance. He failed the Sobriety Field Test and admitted to officers he was involved in the accident. He was taken to city jail and cited for OVI, hit-skip, improper turning and refusal to submit to breath test.

Robbery

An officer was called to the police station on July 29, to take a robbery report. A woman said her son was robbed of his phone that day at 3:10 p.m., as he was walking to the bus stop. She said the phone was worth about \$1200. Her son told police he was walking on E. 136 St., from his home on Maplerow Ave., and headed to the #19 bus stop on Miles Ave. As he approached Cranwood Dr., he saw a juvenile walking the same direction but on the opposite sidewalk.

The suspect male crossed the street, approached the victim and asked him if he had a cell phone. When the victim answered "yes," the suspect pulled a black semiautomatic handgun from his jacket and pointed it at the victim and said, "I'll shoot you if you don't unlock your phone and give it to me." The victim gave him the phone and ran home. The suspect was described as a 16-year-old black male, 5'10" to 6' feet tall, thin build and black dreads.

Animal Complaint

On July 30, at 8:56 p.m., officers responded to a home in the 4900 block of Edgepark Dr., for a report that several ducks were in a small cage on the front lawn of the home. Police found several larger adult ducks in a small in width but tall cage on the front lawn. The animal warden was contacted and said he had recently taken calls about the ducks. He advised that residents were allowed to have female birds within the city limits but it was unknown if the ducks were male or female. Animal warden will follow up.

Weapon Turned In

On July 31, about 9:30 a.m., an officer was called to the station in regards to a found firearm. A woman there told the officer that contractors were working on her house and had found a firearm inside a wall of the residence and she wished to turn it in for safekeeping. The firearm is a U.S. Army issued revolver with five rounds of .38 special ammo. The gun was taken and logged into an evidence locker.

Arson

On Aug. 1, at about 3:40 p.m., a woman living in the 13300 block of Shady Oak Blvd., went to the station to report that in March the vinyl siding on her home was damaged when juveniles lit a pizza box on fire which spread to the siding. She said the juveniles had been cutting through her yard when the incident occurred. Her insurance company covered the damage but said a report to police was needed.

Theft of Motor Vehicle

On Aug. 2, at about 6:57 p.m., officers were dispatched to the 13800 block of Christine Ave., for the theft of a dirt bike. The bike's owner said he had made arrangements to sell the dirt bike on Facebook Marketplace and met two males who wanted to see the bike. One of them got on the bike to "test drive" it and never returned. The other male got in a silver Volkswagen SUV and fled the area. A cell phone belonging to one of the males and 40 counterfeit \$100 bills were recovered from the bike's owner, who said they gave him the counterfeit money prior to the "test drive." Dirt bike entered into LEADS as stolen.

Recovered Stolen Vehicle

On Aug. 3, at about 8:43 p.m., an officer on patrol in the area of Johnston Parkway and Neo Parkway saw a red and white Honda dirt bike which matched the description of a dirt bike that had just been stolen in Garfield Heights.

With lights and sirens activated, a traffic stop was initiated but the vehicle did not stop. Police followed it to a Sunoco station at Harvard and E. 175 St., where the driver met up with about six other dirt bike and 4-wheeler riders. He drove in circles in the parking lot while the other riders taunted police. Eventually he fell off the bike and jumped onto the back of another rider's dirt bike and they fled south on E. 175 St. The officer stayed with the stolen bike and called for backup as he was surrounded by the other dirt bike drivers at this point. When other units arrived the riders left but eventually came back to taunt police some more. The dirt bike was found to be stolen out of Cleveland and was not the bike stolen out of Garfield Heights, although both were similar.

Shakira was right when she said our hips don't lie. Hip pain can interfere with activities and hobbies we enjoy. The number of younger patients — those ages 45 to 54 — who need hip replacement surgery has significantly increased.

"When patients suffer from severe joint conditions that limit their activities, they should not be denied hip replacement based on their young age. For many, hip replacement is the only way to maintain or return to an active lifestyle," says Daniel Harmon, DO, an orthopaedic surgeon at

Cleveland Clinic Marymount Hospital and Solon and Twinsburg family health centers.

Advances make hip replacements safer.

Like almost everything in the world, technology has improved hip replacement surgery and made it safer.

"Updated materials mean that implants used in hip replacements now last 20 years or more," says Dr. Harmon.

And once these implants have reached their limit, revisions now are usually simple modular exchanges. Dr. Harmon says that many patients who were told they were too young for hip replacement may benefit from these advances in technology and be able to have surgery.

Hospital stays and recovery times have greatly decreased due to advanced therapy protocols with most young patients being able to go home on the same day of surgery. Additionally, most patients are able to walk without assistive devices in two to three weeks and often can return to work in the same time frame, depending on their job requirements and motivation.

"After hip replacement, it's possible for most younger patients to get back to their favorite activities, including sports and exercise," says Dr. Harmon.

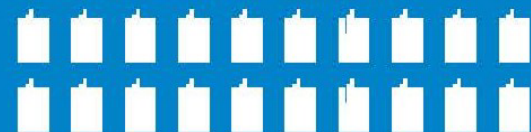

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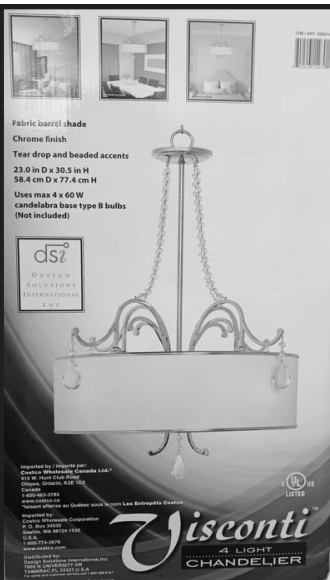
