Maple Heights Council approves new Planning and Development Director

Despite widespread power outages in the city with severe storms sweeping through the area, Maple Heights Council was able to hold a special legislation-only meeting on Aug. 7, and approved Mayor Annette Blackwell's appointment of Geoffrey Englebrecht as the city's new Planning and Development Director.

Englebrecht, who formerly served as director of Housing and Community Development for the city of University Heights, will replace outgoing Maple Heights Planning and Development Director Joe Duffy.

Also approved at the meeting was a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into a contract with Specialized Construction, Inc., for the 2024 Asphalt Roadway Program in the city, at a cost not to exceed \$1,148,950.

The resolution follows legislation previously passed by council authorizing City Engineer Ed Hren to go out for bids for this year's Pavement Repair Program.

The county Department of Public Works "will reimburse the city for up to \$141,600 in material costs expended on county routes included under a road repair program in the city," the resolution states.

Council also passed an ordinance amending and restating the salary and wage schedule for non-bargaining unit employees for 2024.

As recommended by Blackwell, effective March 1, 2024, the top end of Finance Director Tinita Tillman's salary and wage schedule will be increased by \$60.10; her current vacation allowance will be increased to four weeks until she reaches at least 12 full years of service, at which time it shall be increased to five weeks; and the finance director shall be paid a \$2,500 bonus for each Ohio Auditor of State Audit Award presented to the city, the legislation states.

PACC celebrates 25th anniversary; names museum after center founder

Over 100 blighted properties in Slavic Village to be demolished thanks to state funding; more throughout Cuy. County

The Ohio Department of Development announced last week it is awarding \$67.3 million in funding from the Building Demolition and Site Revitalization Program to tear down 1,277 blighted structures in Butler, Clinton, Cuyahoga, Hamilton, Logan, Lucas, Muskingum, Preble and Richland counties.

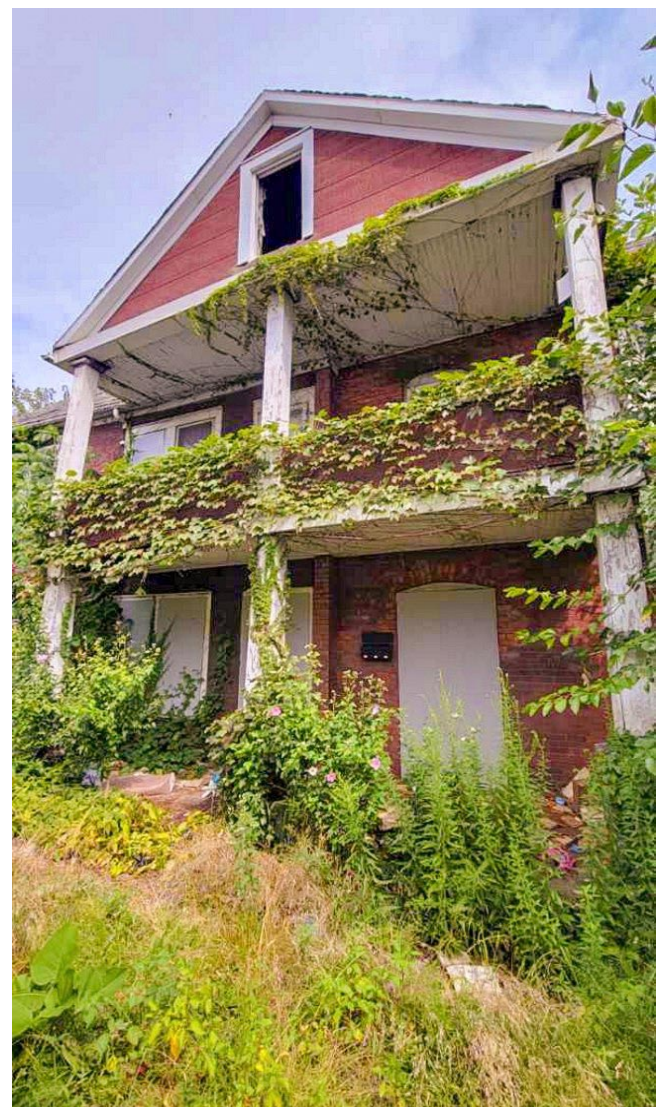
Over a third of that money, \$23 million, will be spent in Cuyahoga County alone. The list of properties scheduled for demolition includes over 100 homes in Slavic Village, as noted by former Ward 12 councilman and civic leader Tony Brancatelli.

He noted that Gus Frangos, who was president and general counsel of the Cuyahoga County Land Reutilization Corporation at the time of his death earlier this month, was instrumental in securing this funding for blight elimination and development in Cuyahoga County.

Governor Mike DeWine launched the Building Demolition and Site Revitalization Program in 2021 to help communities demolish dilapidated commercial and residential buildings and revitalize surrounding properties to attract investments, businesses and jobs.

"The timing of these State funds from Gov. DeWine is critical to our recovery in Slavic Village as plans for building new homes continue," Brancatelli said. "Demolishing blighted properties helps stabilize and improve property values and creates opportunities for new homes, yard expansions and economic development."

The Building Demolition and Site Revitalization Program is funded by the Ohio General Assembly as part of the current operating budget. All of Ohio's 88 counties were eligible for at least \$500,000, with the remaining funds awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Additional grant recipients will be announced in the coming months.

Maple Heights Council approves new director Named to Dean's List at Lawrence Tech University

This ordinance amends legislation passed by council earlier this year which approved 3.5% raises for all full-time and part-time non-bargaining unit employees, effective Jan. 1, 2024.

Also passed was a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into a contract with Dial Electric Ltd., to provide for the Maple Heights Senior Center Emergency Generator Installation Project, at a cost not to exceed \$163,648.40.

The city has received \$140,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds from Cuyahoga County to be used towards the project. The city has also received \$150,000 in Cuyahoga County Community Development Block Grant funding for the project.

Council passed legislation in March authorizing Blackwell to purchase the generator from Cummins Sales and Service, in an amount not to exceed \$35,680, and last week's resolution authorizes the contract for the installation of the generator by Dial Electric.

Council also passed a resolution requesting that the county fiscal officer advance taxes and assessments from the proceeds of tax levies for fiscal year 2025..

Opioid Settlement participation approved

A motion authorizing Law Director Frank Consolo to sign and submit all required documentation for the city to participate in the National Opioid Settlement Agreement with regional supermarket pharmacy Kroger Co., dated March 22, 2024, was unanimously approved ahead of the Aug. 12 deadline.

"A proposed nationwide settlement agreement has been reached that would resolve the legal claims of states and local police subdivisions against regional supermarket pharmacy Kroger, Co., related to alleged misconduct related to opioids," according to a notice on the settle-

ment from implementation administrator Rubris, Inc. that was sent to numerous municipalities, including Maple Heights.

"The settlement requires Kroger Co. to pay over a billion dollars to abate the opioid epidemic," Rubris' notice states. "Of this amount, approximately \$1.2 billion will be used by participating states and subdivisions to remediate and abate the impacts of the opioid crisis. Depending on participation by states and subdivisions, the settlement requires payments over 11 years after its effective date."

Placed on second reading

•Resolution declaring the necessity of assessing the expense of garbage and rubbish collection and disposal in the city, at a monthly rate of \$19.35 per residential unit (\$9.98 per month for qualified residents with a Homestead Exemption as of June 1, 2024) for the year 2025 and certifying the costs due to the city to the county fiscal officer.

•Two separate resolutions certifying to the county fiscal officer the sums due to the city for boarding up houses and for weed control and grass cutting on lots.

Community police reports

Garfield Heights

Robbery

On Aug. 8, at 2:14 p.m., officers were dispatched to Chipotle on Vista Way on a report of a male who had just threatened an employee and stole the money out of their tip jar. The suspect was last seen fleeing in a white Nissan Altima heading towards Transportation Blvd. The employee interviewed by police said she was working the front line when a tall, thin black male began arguing with her about his order. She said the suspect then stated to her, "I will get my friend to come up here and shoot you." The store manager and assistant manager were informed of the situation and asked the suspect to leave the restaurant. He initially refused to leave but moments later reached his hand into the tip jar on the counter and put the money in his pocket and left in the white Altima. Detective Bureau to follow up.

Weapon Offense

On Aug. 9, at 3:20 a.m., officers observed a tan 2008 Mercedes C-300 on E. 131 St. approaching Rexwood Ave., and initiated a traffic stop for a display of registration violation. The driver was identified and found to have a suspended driver's license. The front female passenger was not wearing a seatbelt. An open container of tequila was lying on the floorboard behind the driver's seat. Police found a loaded Hi-Point .45 pistol under the driver's seat, although the driver had told officers he had no weapons. Another open container of liquor was also found under the passenger's seat. Driver charged with failure to inform and having weapons under disability.

On Aug. 15, at 6:34 p.m., police were called to a home in the 5100 block of E. 126 St. The caller said she had just arrived home and discovered her dog dead in the middle of the street with a gunshot wound to his head. The dog's owner said his Bullmastiff somehow broke away from his gated backyard and approached a male and female walking on the sidewalk. He said the male then pulled out a handgun and shot the dog. A security camera showed the male and female walking north past the complainant's driveway and the dog began charging at the couple. A single .22 caliber spent shell casing was located near the dog. Police located the couple at a bus stop in front of Garfield Club Apartments. A gun was recovered from a shopping bag the male was carrying. He told police he shot the dog because it charged at the couple and he feared for their safety. The shooting was determined to be self defense but since the male was under age 21, he was placed under arrest for CCW and taken to city jail and charged without bond.

Felonious Assault

On Aug. 9, at 7:57 a.m., an officer was dispatched to a business on Richmond Rd. in Bedford Heights, for a report of a company employee involved in a traffic altercation on I-480 east near Broadway, in Garfield Heights. The employee said he and the driver of a Honda had been on the freeway rapidly switching lanes with each other and in a road rage incident, the driver of the Honda had swerved toward the lane the employee was in and fired three shots into his driver's side window. The employee chased the Honda to a gas station on Warrensville Center Rd., and was able to report the Honda's license plate number and was advised to stop chasing the Honda. Damage to the employee's vehicle included a shattered driver's window and two bullet holes, one under the driver's side window and another at the very top of the driver's door.

Aggravated Robbery

On Aug. 9, at 10:35 p.m., GHPD units received a radio broadcast of a male who was robbed at gunpoint of his brother's blue 2008 Chevy Impala. Officers observed the stolen car going east on Maplerow Ave. near E. 139 St., at a high rate of speed, and pursued it until the chase was ultimately terminated. Other officers arrived at a home in the 13100 block of Forestdale Ave., and made contact with the victim of the car robbery who was hiding in the bushes behind the house. He told police that evening, around 10:30 p.m., he was working for DoorDash dropping off food in the area of Bartlam Ave., and Dressler Rd. He pulled over to the side of the road on Bartlam to confirm the address of his delivery and out of the darkness was approached by two black males wearing all black clothing and black ski-masks covering their faces while he sat in his car. Both suspects pointed 9mm semi-automatic handguns at him and demanded that he get out of the vehicle, leave his keys and personal belongings inside and if he did not, they would shoot him. The suspects then grabbed the victim and forced him out of the car. He was then struck in the head with a gun, causing a large knot to appear. He was able to break free and ran

west on Dressler to Forestdale Ave., then hid behind some houses and called police for help. He saw the suspects get into the Impala and drive away. Police took the victim to Marymount Hospital for treatment. Report forwarded to the Detective Bureau for follow-up.

Theft of a Motor Vehicle

On Aug. 13, at 5:28 p.m., an officer was dispatched to the 9600 block of Garfield Blvd. for a vehicle being stolen. The victim said she had parked her 2015 Hyundai Elantra in the parking lot and when she returned to it at 4:40 p.m., it was gone and she called police. Surveillance cameras revealed that at 3:30 p.m., a gray Hyundai SUV entered the lot and parked next to her vehicle and dropped off five individuals then left the area. The five suspects then lingered in the area of the football field for about an hour then got inside the Hyundai and drove away. The last hit on Flock was at the intersection of E. 131 St., and Broadway Ave., at 4:48 p.m. The suspects appeared to be juveniles and all were wearing dark clothing. Vehicle entered into LEADS.

County alots additional funds for emergency food assistance

Cuyahoga County has increased funding for emergency food assistance by \$250,000 due to a significant increase in calls for service stemming from recent power outages.

Storm systems swept through Northeast Ohio on Aug. 6, leaving thousands of county residents without power for multiple days, resulting in the loss of refrigerators and freezers full of food. Cuyahoga County will work with the Greater Cleveland Food Bank to replenish food lost in the outages.

"We understand that many of our residents with low or no income were severely affected by the storms, losing a significant amount of food, and that efforts to mitigate the loss were further compounded by limited power and cell service," said David Merriman, the county's Director of Health and Human Services. "This funding will allow us to speed up relief efforts and get families back on their feet."

Additional County levy dollars were approved by the Board of Control for the United Way of Greater Cleveland Emergency Food Purchase contract. The emergency request is supported by data provided by the United Way Services of Greater Cleveland showing an upwards of 300% increase in food service requests because of the storms.

"We appreciate our partnership with Cuyahoga County," said Kristin Warzocha, president and CEO, Greater Cleveland Food Bank. "These funds will help struggling families and seniors after the recent storms and power outages and be used to purchase and distribute additional healthy protein and dairy items, along with other nutritious food, to help our neighbors restock their refrigerators and freezers."

1. As of August 1, 2024, the GHCS is almost to FULL CAPACITY with its hiring, requiring *only 4 more positions* to fill, several at the MS and several at the HS.
2. ALL ELEMENTARY POSITIONS have been filled over the summer.
3. The GHCS experienced only 29 teacher resignations after last school year, far less than has been reported.
4. A NEW STAFF EVENT held during the week 7.15.2024 welcomed approximately 50 new hires.
5. Incidences involving student behavior have DECREASED 25% in the last school year alone, despite what has been reported.
6. There are currently 5 security officers at the Middle School, and the GHCS is hiring 1 more for a total of 6.
7. There are currently 6 security officers at the High School, and also 1 School Resource Officer.
8. Each of the three elementary buildings have 1 security officer employed.
9. There is one Dean of Culture at each building who is responsible for student discipline, creating ways to de-escalate situations, and conflict resolution.
10. The GHCS has intensified its Progressive Discipline Policy, strengthening standards for conduct and behavior to deter problems before they happen.
11. Yondr Bags at the Middle School will be required this year for ALL students, to house their cell phones during the school day, lessening distractions and increasing concentration on schoolwork.
12. On Thursday, August 22nd, the GHCS will host its community Back to School rally at 4 p.m. at the High School.
13. Each building will be hosting a Parent Orientation in order to establish expectations and standards of conduct.
14. The Garfield Heights City Schools treats any and all threats of violence seriously, implementing discipline on all offenders swiftly and fairly, have added personnel, security equipment, and resources at all buildings.

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District's Board of Trustees recently awarded 27 Member Community Infrastructure Program (MCIP) grants totaling \$24,945,396.94. Local municipalities receiving funding include the Village of Cuyahoga Heights, Garfield Heights, Maple Heights and the Village of Newburgh Heights.

MCIP provides funding to member communities and eligible political subdivisions for sewer infrastructure rehabilitation, replacement and improvement projects that address water quality and quantity issues. These issues adversely impact human health and the environment and are mitigated through cost-effective sewer infrastructure projects.

Since the program's inception in 2016, the Sewer District has awarded \$102.3 million towards 134 publicly-owned infrastructure improvement projects, leveraging an additional \$104.1 million in member community sewer infrastructure investments.

"Failing septic systems, sewer flooding, sanitary sewer overflows and common trench sewers contribute to poor water quality throughout our region," said Matt Scharver, director of Watershed Programs. "This program provides a vital funding mechanism to assist with needed repairs and new sewer infrastructure while protecting and improving the region's water resources."

Cuyahoga Heights (\$230,240.00)

The Courts Sewer Separation Project (design)

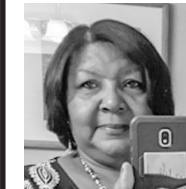
