## Ohio School Report Cards attempt to measure schools' performance levels

2023-2024 Ohio School Report Cards were issued last week for each school district and each school within each school district accredited with the state. They are required by law to provide parents, caregivers, community members, educators and policymakers information about district and school performance — to celebrate successes and identify areas for improvement.

Districts and schools receive an overall rating of 1 to 5 stars in half-star increments. Star ratings are received for achievement, progress, gap closing, graduation and early literacy. Report cards also include student-level proficiency rates based on the results of Ohio's State Tests in English language arts, math, science, and social studies.

**Achievement:** Represents whether student performance on state tests met established thresholds and how well students performed on tests overall.

**Progress:** Looks closely at the growth all students are making based on their past performances.

**Gap Closing:** Measure of the reduction in educational gaps for student groups.

**Graduation:** Measure of the four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate and the five-year adjusted cohort graduation rate.

**Early Literacy:** Measures reading improvement and proficiency for students in kindergarten through third grade.

The following are star ratings for the school districts in The Neighborhood News readership area, listed in alphabetical order. These are overall star ratings for the districts, not the individual schools within that district.

The star ratings are an average of the stars received in each district for achievement, progress, gap closing, graduation and early literacy.

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## Maple Hts. Council puts legislation to raise some salaries on first reading

An ordinance to raise the annual salary of the safety director, a position that is currently held by Mayor Annette Blackwell, and another to raise the salaries of the council president and city council members, all retroactive to Sept. 1, 2024, were placed on first reading for further discussion by Maple Heights Council at their meeting last week.

The first piece of legislation proposes raising the safety director's salary from \$20,279.54 to \$30,000 annually. According to the city charter, the mayor also serves as safety director and is paid a separate salary for that position.

The second piece of legislation proposes raising the salary of council president, an office currently held by Ron Jackson, from \$18,750 to \$21,750 annually. Also proposed is raising the salaries of all seven council members from \$15,000 to \$18,000.

In the November 2021 General Election, Maple Heights voters passed a Charter Amendment to eliminate the requirement that elected officials' salaries be fixed at least 120 days prior to the date set for the municipal election for the terms beginning the next January.

Law Director Frank Consolo issued his opinion on the amendment in December 2021, stating, "Council may increase the pay for the council president and all councilpersons, regardless of whether such pay increase occurs before or during their term of office, without violating the laws of the state of Ohio."



### THE IRON WARD NEWS

Iron Ward is the nineteenth century nickname for the Broadway Avenue neighborhood around which Cleveland's great iron and steel industry flourished. Originally known as Newburgh Township, it was annexed by Cleveland in 1878. It has used the tagline Slavic Village since 1978.

Historic maps as late as 1900 show many prominent waterways coursing through the old neighborhood. These brooks and streams were sourced from the higher land of Cleveland's eastern suburbs and travel west toward the Cuyahoga River and Lake Erie. They helped shape the regional landscape and delineate neighborhood boundaries.

While most of these water features have disappeared, they continue to flow underground in deeply buried culverts. They are an essential part of the city's natural and cultural legacy.

Among them:

**Kingsbury Run**--it carved the deep valley that is the northern boundary of Slavic Village and became a site of major industry in the nineteenth century.

**Morgana Run**--prominent bridges at East 65th Street and Broadway Avenue once spanned this waterway. The stream can still be heard at a manhole in front of the new Mound School.

**Burke Creek**--flowed down Worley hill, defined the dropoff behind Ottawa Road, and fed a large pond on the Isaac Reed farm where Harvard Grove Cemetery now lies.

**Mill Creek**--this stream feeds the largest waterfall in Cuyahoga County at Warner Road. It winds its way through Goosetown toward the Ohio and Erie Canal.

# Community police reports

## Garfield Heights

### Burglary

On Sept. 17, at 10:47 a.m., police were dispatched to a home in the 12400 block of Woodward Ave., for a report of a juvenile male who broke into the residence and was sleeping in the complainant's daughter's bedroom. The mom told police that when she returned home about 11 a.m., her daughter found the suspect sleeping in her bed. When police arrived the suspect was gone. They found prints on a window of the home where he had presumably entered. Police found the suspect running west on Woodward then north through backyards. He was eventually taken into custody next to a garage on Shady Oak Blvd. and taken to city jail. The complainant also told police she had found the same juvenile sleeping on a couch in her garage when she arrived home on Sept. 13, around

midnight. A rear window of the garage was found broken out. GHPD has dealt with the suspect on 24 different occasions since April 13, 2024. The incidents range from missing juvenile, criminal damaging, breaking and entering, trespassing, arson and burglary. Charges for burglary are pending through the Youth Detective Bureau.

On Sept. 20, about 10 a.m., an officer was dispatched to a home in the 10200 block of McCracken Rd., for a burglary report. The homeowner said that about 4:30 p.m., on Sept. 19, she went to work and at 9:10 a.m. the next day her brother observed her front door to be partially open and the house ransacked with no one inside. Missing were two Playstation PS5 consoles, 32" television and 60" Samsung television. Several rooms had their contents scattered, dressers tipped over and beds flipped. There were no signs of forced entry on the door itself. The victim can think of no one who could be responsible. Report forwarded to Detective Bureau.

### Suspicious Activity

On Sept. 18, at 5:13 p.m., GHPD dispatch broadcast that a man had just been robbed of his 2012 white Ford truck at Boulevard Convenient, 8808 Garfield Blvd. The victim told police he had been sitting in his truck in the parking lot directly in front of Convenient's main doors when a man approached him and asked him for a lighter. The man was described as a black male wearing a black

baseball cap, black t-shirt, jean shorts and a black face mask. He said the man then pointed a black firearm at the victim, who got out of his truck. He said the suspect then got into the driver's seat and fled south on E. 88 St. Police then learned that the man whose truck was supposedly stolen also had a gray Toyota parked on E. 90 St., near Reed. Police asked him why he parked his Toyota on E. 90 St., and how he got his truck to the store. He said he lives on E. 131 St., and drove his Toyota from his home and parked it on E. 90 St. He said he then walked to his friend's house on Rosewood in Cleveland, where he keeps his truck parked. He said he then drove the truck to Boulevard Convenient where he was meeting "AJ" to sell the truck. The store's camera shows the truck coming from E. 90 St., not Rosewood. Police also noted the truck hit on Flock cameras at Canal and Warner Rds. just 17 minutes prior to it being reported stolen. He said he didn't know how his truck would have hit on that camera. An officer advised him his statements seemed inconsistent and based on footage the direction of travel was off, but the truck owner was adamant in sticking to his story. He told police he wished to pursue charges and said he has Progressive Insurance on the truck. A GHPD detective spoke with the truck owner as he walked back to get his parked Toyota, and he admitted to the detective that the incident was false and he was trying to get money from his insurance company. Report forwarded to the city prosecutor for review of charges against the truck owner.

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

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## Maple Heights Council puts legislation to raise some salaries on first reading

A resident at the meeting questioned when the salaries were last raised, and how council's Finance Committee arrived at the figures.

District 1 Councilman Stafford Shenett, who serves as chair of the Finance Committee, explained that when the committee met recently the amount of salary increases was proposed to committee members by Finance Director Tinita Tillman.

"I believe we do have an excellent finance director who gives us the information and rationale for that information. Based on that discussion, which was public record, we decided that it was fair," Shenett said.

Shenett stated that based on information that he received, "what we're currently making now goes back about 20 years."

### Passed at last week's meeting

- Resolution authorizing a third Change Order for Eclipse Co., LLC, increasing the contract by \$20,121.14 for the Schreiber Road Sewer Improvement Project. The city has received funding and assistance from the Northeast Ohio Sewer District (NEORSD) and from state and county entities towards the repairs of storm and sanitary sewers in the area.

- Resolution authorizing Blackwell to execute a Quit-Claim Deed to transfer a vacant lot on Kohout Street from the Maple Heights Land Reutilization Program to U.S. Bank to resolve a title issue.

- Resolution accepting the amounts and rates as determined by the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission and authorizing the necessary tax levies and certifying them to the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer.

- Ordinance providing for a second amendment to the city's Fiscal Year 2024 budget, dated Sept. 18, 2024, "to account for certain additional expenditures."

### Also on agenda

- An ordinance to approve the plan of operation and governance for the Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC) Opt-In Gas Aggregation Program, for the purpose of jointly establishing and implementing an Opt-In Gas Aggregation Program as a NOPEC member, was placed on first reading.

A NOPEC representative who spoke at council's caucus before last week's meeting explained that NOPEC wishes to simplify the opt-in process for gas customers in the city and improve customer service. Two public hearings on the program will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 8, at 11 a.m. at the Maple Heights Senior Center, 15901 Libby Rd., and 5 p.m. at Maple Heights City Hall, 5353 Lee Rd.

- An ordinance authorizing Blackwell to enter into a purchase agreement with the Sutphen Corporation to buy a Heavy Duty Custom Pumper on a Sutphen Monarch Chassis for the Fire Department, at a cost of \$869,861 through the Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Program, was also placed on first reading. The legislation will go to the Finance Committee for further review, Jackson stated.

- An ordinance authorizing Blackwell to enter into an agreement to purchase property located at 5391 Lee Rd., adjacent to the Maple Heights Police Department and City Hall, at a cost not to exceed \$135,000 plus closing costs, was placed on second reading. If council approves the legislation at a future meeting, the city will use the property to provide additional space to be used by the police and municipal departments. Blackwell has applied for \$100,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funding from the county to be used towards the purchase, the legislation states.

- A resolution for a contract between the city and Cats Construction, Inc., for the 2024 Concrete Roadway Repair Program, at a cost not to exceed \$195,780, was withdrawn from the agenda.

### Announcements

Shenett announced that a District 1 Block Watch meeting will be held from 12:30-1:30 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 28, at St. Martin of Tours Church, 14600 Turney Rd.

The Maple Heights Fall Festival will also be held on Saturday, Sept. 28, from 12:30-4 p.m. at Stafford Park. Music by Kevin Conwell and the Footprints, Jungle Terry's Animal Show, a Pumpkin Patch and decorating and other activities will be featured.

The city will be holding a "Restaurant Week" the week of Sept. 30-Oct. 4, with about eight restaurants participating, Jackson said.

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## Garfield Council update

The following ordinances were passed by Garfield Heights Council at its meeting Monday night:

- To apply for and accept the Bureau of Workers' Compensation Firefighter Exposure to Environmental Elements Grant to be used to purchase safety equipment. The city is eligible to receive up to \$15,000 within a 3-year cycle and a match requirement of 20% by the city. The funding would be used to purchase 45 pair of flame gloves and 45 BarriAire Gold complete coverage hoods.

- To apply for, accept and utilize the 2024 Department of Justice Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant. The city is eligible to receive up to \$14,901 in support of criminal justice or civil proceedings.

- Establishing a section of the codified ordinances of the city entitled "Interment of the Dead."

In September 2023, council imposed a moratorium on family cemeteries on residential property in the city. The new codified ordinance would prohibit interment of the dead except in cemeteries registered with the Division of Real Estate of the Ohio Department of Commerce as of the date of passage of this ordinance.

- Amending appropriations for current expenditures during the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2024.

Passed on first reading was an ordinance establishing an Opt-in Natural Gas Program in the city, jointly through the Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council as a NOPEC member, to expand the natural gas supply options available to residents, businesses and other consumers in the city by allowing them to act jointly with any other city, village, municipality, county or other political subdivision in the State of Ohio.


Also passed on first reading was an ordinance approving the plan of operation and governance for the NOPEC Opt-in Aggregation Program which jointly establishes and implements an Opt-in Gas Aggregation Program as a NOPEC member. Two public hearings will be held on Oct. 15, 2024, regarding this plan.

Both the NOPEC bills will be voted on for a second reading at a coming council meeting.

Also passed was a resolution of support by the mayor and council for Issue 50, a renewal levy proposed by the Garfield Heights City School District Board of Education to maintain funding levels for normal and routine district operations for the next 10 years.
