2-year-old found in back seat of car after juvenile leads police on high-speed chase

A two-year-old child was rescued unhurt last weekend from the back seat of a car after her father allegedly led Garfield Heights and Maple Heights police on a high speed chase that thankfully did not end tragically.

On Oct. 5, around 2:30 p.m., Garfield Heights dispatch notified GHPD officers that Maple Heights police were in pursuit of a 2024 gray Nissan 4-door, which Garfield Heights officers observed traveling north on Monica Ln., approaching Thraves Rd. in their city. Garfield police attempted to stop the suspect vehicle, but it fled and a pursuit was initiated by both GHPD and MHPD police. On Granger Rd. at Turney Rd., with speeds reaching 90 mph, stop sticks were successfully deployed causing the vehicle to eventually stop in the construction area on Granger Road hill. The driver fled on foot but was apprehended.

Upon checking the vehicle, a two-year old child was found in the back seat, which turned out to be the daughter of the driver of the car involved in the pursuit. The child was uninjured and was taken by squad to the hospital as a precautionary measure.

According to the report, "The actions of the suspect fleeing from officers including the 90 mph speeds, the running of red lights of populated intersections, traveling on the left side of the roadway, overtaking other vehicles with a double yellow marking near the area of E. 119 St. and Granger Rd., willingly operating the vehicle in a heavily marked construction zone, purposely fleeing from officers in a pursuit that lasted over three minutes, all while knowingly having his two-year-old child in the vehicle without proper safety equipment," indicates a substantial risk to the child, the public and officers.

Police learned that the Nissan had been involved in a separate pursuit with Warrensville Heights PD the day before in which the vehicle had struck several pedestrians.

The 17-year old male driver was taken to the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Detention Center and will have pending charges for felony fleeing and eluding, child endangerment, and numerous traffic charges from several cities.

Bedford Council OKs decision to build new juvenile correction facility on Rockside Rd. property

At its meeting Monday night, Bedford Council approved a motion accepting the decision by the city's Planning Commission to allow the Ohio Department of Youth Services (DYS) to relocate a state juvenile correction facility to the 38-acre site of the former US Bank building at 17500 Rockside Rd.

The approval comes more than two years after the DYS made its first request to relocate the facility from Highland Hills to Bedford, and council made the decision at that time to deny it.

Mayor Stan Koci said at a meeting last month that the reason council voted down the initial application in June 2022 was because "at the last minute" the state notified the city that they wanted an "unlimited" capacity at the facility, instead of the previously stated 120-person cap on the number of felony level male juvenile offenders housed there.

This time around several conditions of the city were met. As stated in the motion, the conditions include: "No new construction will exceed one story, that the state will work with the city to establish a buffer where the city feels necessary, that the number of juveniles is restricted to 72, and that the state provide quarterly updates to the city regarding what those numbers are."

Also, approval means that use of the facility "will not be a public nuisance, nor one that would affect the public peace, health, safety, morals or welfare" of city residents, Law Director John Montello stated.

Mallis previously stated that operations will include "administrative offices, support services, educational and vocational training, life skills and college courses. There will also be recreational, behavioral health, healthcare and reentry services, as well." The facility will be a 24-hour, 7-day-a-week operation.

The new facility will be located in the industrial area off Rockside Rd. by Broadway Ave., near the border with Maple Heights. Mallis said it represents a \$90 million construction project, and the facility would employ approximately 294 employees, with payroll taxes going to the city. The current owner of the property is listed as Premier Rockside LLC, 17500 Rockside Rd.

DYS officials had expressed interest in Bedford after coming to the conclusion that the Cuyahoga Hills Juvenile Correctional Facility, formerly known as Indian Hills dating to the 1960s, was "landlocked" and it was not feasible to demolish and rebuild a new complex on that property. Additionally, Bedford is a short distance away from Highland Hills, about eight miles, and the relocation to the Rockside property would minimize the impact on employees and inmates by keeping them in the same general area.

Also, Mallis has stated that Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine had put together a task force in the past few years to look at juvenile correctional facilities throughout the state. The task force had issued a report earlier this year recommending more facilities with less inmates in order to have a higher staff ratio, and relocating to Bedford with a smaller facility fulfilled that proposal.

Homicide on Turney Rd. in Garfield Hts.

On Friday, Oct. 4, at approximately 2:45 a.m., the Garfield Heights police and fire departments responded to the area of Turney and McCracken rds., for multiple reports of shots fired, according to the GHPD Incident News Media Report.

When officers arrived they found a male lying outside Dunkin' Donuts, 5126 Turney Rd., who was unresponsive and appeared to be the victim of a gunshot wound to the head. Two females were detained by police, one of which is thought to have driven the male murder suspect both to and from the scene of the shooting.

The victim was transported to Marymount Hospital where he was pronounced deceased at 3:34 a.m. An investigation into the incident is ongoing. GHPD has not released any further information.

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
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Blackwell reports to council on good things happening in Maple Heights

Mayor Annette Blackwell reported on advancements in Maple Heights, including the city again receiving a prestigious state award, rising home values and increased economic development, at the city council meeting last week.

She said that Finance Director Tinita Tillman and the city's Finance Department received an award from Ohio State Auditor Keith Faber's office for the third straight year, "for exceptional, outstanding finance and accounting practices."

She said a representative of Faber's office will attend a future meeting to formally present the city with its third State of Ohio Auditor's Award, adding, "I think that's a huge accomplishment."

Blackwell, who first announced the news at a State of the City/Schools presentation earlier last week, also stated during her presentation that the other huge takeaway is that the city, formerly almost \$3 million in debt, now has \$9.5 million in its accounts.

Home values are also rising, Blackwell said, with Maple Heights having the second highest value in appreciation in Cuyahoga County at 59%. She said the median home value eight years ago was around \$60,000; it is now \$135,000.

She reported that the most recently sold highest valued home was in the Valley Ranch neighborhood off Turney Rd., in the \$300,000-plus range.

She said that at a previous meeting council members had approved the sale of 15 vacant lots in the city for development to GLH LLC. "These are lots where homes had been torn down, so there's already infrastructure there. That developer will build 15 new homes next year at the beginning of spring."

Blackwell also said that the former Burger King building at Broadway and Libby rds. had been torn down, and developers hope to have a \$1 million Shell gas station up by the first of the year.

She said that two businesses in Maple Heights had each received a 2023 Business of the Year award: Worksmart Clothing Factory in Mapletown and Mr. Wonderful's Chicken and Waffles on Lee Rd.

Blackwell said that the Maple Heights schools were also doing well, with a 3.5 star rating from the state and more than a 95% graduation rate.

Seeking NOACA grant for Stafford Park project

Council passed a resolution authorizing Blackwell and the city administration to apply for a grant from the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) through the Transportation for Livable Communities Initiative (TLCI) Implementation Program, for the Stafford Park Connectivity Project, Phase I.

In correspondence to council, Planning and Development Director Geoff Englebrecht stated that the Southgate Connectivity Study recommends several changes, including improvements of connections to Stafford Park, extension of a multipurpose trail ending at Milkovich Middle School and extending the trail to form a full connection from Warrensville Center Rd. to Stafford Park.

Englebrecht also said that the study called for the creation of an archway at Warrensville Center Rd. and Stockton Ave., while also creating a high visibility crosswalk across Warrensville Center for clear identification of pedestrians crossing.

Also passed at last week's meeting

- Ordinance giving raises to the city's Auxiliary Police Officers. Base wages were raised from \$10.45 an hour for all positions to \$15 an hour; Corporals, \$16; Sergeants, \$17; Lieutenants, \$18; and Captains, \$19.

- Ordinance authorizing Blackwell to purchase a property located at 5391 Lee Rd., adjacent to the police department, at a cost not to exceed \$135,000, plus closing costs, contingent upon the city being awarded a \$100,000 American Rescue Plan Act grant for the purchase. The city plans to use the property to expand municipal parking, and will also share the additional parking with nearby Maple Heights High School, Blackwell said.

- Ordinance entering into a purchase agreement with the Sutphen Corporation, through Sourcewell's Cooperative Purchasing Program, to buy a Sutphen Heavy Duty Custom Pumper on a Monarch Chassis for the fire department at a cost of \$869,861, to be built within 36-38 months.

- Resolution to accept a proposal by AW Farrell of Garfield Heights for repair of the Fire Station No. 2 roof, at a cost not to exceed \$73,300, with the cost covered by \$80,000 in funding awarded to the city from the Cuyahoga County Council District 8's ARPA Community Grant Fund.

Human Services Director Linda Vopat announced there will be a Maple Heights Vaccine Clinic offering COVID-19, pneumonia, influenza, shingles and RSV shots for the entire community, from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 29, at the Maple Heights Senior Center, 15901 Libby Rd. 

Criminal Damage-Auto

A Nissan Sentra had its driver's window smashed out. The footage shows that about 5:06 a.m., the suspect pulled his vehicle near the front of the lot and can be seen loading items into it. The company advised they will contact the Detective Bureau once they have copied all of the security footage.

Recovered Stolen Auto

On Sept. 30, at 2:40 a.m., police observed a vehicle entered stolen out of Cleveland, sitting at the traffic light at E. 86 St. and Garfield Blvd., facing west. Officers set up spike strips at E. 85 St. and Garfield Blvd., and a traffic stop of the vehicle was attempted, but the car took off, hitting one of the spike strips. This caused one of its tires to flatten and the driver to lose control while attempting to turn onto Garfield Blvd. The vehicle struck a concrete barrier and a utility pole, and the driver, a tall, black, younger male, ran from the vehicle and into backyards on E. 85 St. Despite a perimeter being formed and a drone deployed, the suspect was not located.

Assist Other Departments

On Oct. 1, at about 10:54 a.m., a GHPD officer and other units responded to the area of I-480 and Transportation Blvd., regarding a suspicious auto seen headed

west down a dirt path next to the exit ramp. Police observed a substantial amount of black smoke coming from underneath the I-480 bridge. One of the officers parked his vehicle and walked down the dirt path on foot. Once under the bridge he saw a Honda CRV on fire up against one of the support columns of the bridge. Valley View fire and police responded and put the fire out. The only thing found inside or around the Honda was a driver's license. No other identifying information was obtained from the vehicle and two men, one matching the initial description provided of a black man walking east along I-480, were seen by drone operators in the Vista Way area but they were unable to be located.

Police also had dispatch run the plate of the suspect's car, parked on Thornton Ave. next to Bonkers, and found that the plate was expired. Suspect cited and her vehicle was towed.
