New member appointed to Zoning Appeals Board in Bedford Hts.; debate at council meeting over candidate selection process

Bedford Heights City Council held its first regular council meeting of the month on Tuesday evening and passed a resolution appointing Ethel Robitson to the city's Board of Zoning Appeals. Although all members of council expressed confidence in Robitson's ability to fulfill her duties on the board, there was some debate over the transparency and effectiveness of the candidate selection process.

Councilman Michael Willis, the only member to vote "no" on the 6-1 appointment of Robitson, explained his vote was due to concerns about the selection process and not Robitson's qualifications. This view was shared by Councilwoman Enid Thomas, who believes the process to appoint Ms. Robitson was rushed and lacked foresight. She also raised concerns about the transparency of the process and noted that council did not interview Robitson for the position.

In response, Councilman Alton Tinker assured the council that the city charter does not require interviews for Board of Zoning Appeals appointments. Additionally, Councilwoman Kathie Kelso-Perez stated that the selection process followed established city practices. Despite these assurances, Councilwoman Thomas maintained that "the process should be changed" in response to these concerns.

Reducing youth marijuana usage

Councilman Lloyd Anderson, chairman of the Safety Committee, announced that he is collaborating with Police Chief Michael Marotta and Assistant Chief Ken Hatcher, Jr. to research educational programs aimed at reducing youth marijuana usage.

'We have to find another place!' GHMC Judge Deborah Nicastro tells Garfield Hts. Council

Judge Deborah Nicastro, presiding judge in the Garfield Heights Municipal Court, spoke to Garfield Heights Council at its meeting Monday night and detailed the reasons why the Justice Center building, at 5555 Turney Rd., which houses the courts as well as the jail and police department, is a hazard to employees and the public and alternative facilities must be found.

She said the building has been deteriorating for many years, which city leaders have known, but have said the city does not have the financial resources to address the problem.

Nicastro said the urgency of the situation was brought to a head recently when she and the other Garfield Heights Municipal Court Judge, Sergio DiGeronimo, were away and a fire alarm went off in the clerk of courts' office. "No one vacated the building because two-thirds of the building does not have fire alarms," Nicastro said. It could have been a tragic situation caused by just one of the many hazards at the Justice Center, which she said included black mold, no internal ventilation and non-ADA compliant restrooms for the disabled.

"We have to find another place," she said.

Although it is located in the city of Garfield Heights and is called the Garfield Heights Municipal Court, the court has geographic jurisdiction over cases in Brecksville, Cuyahoga Heights, Garfield Heights, Independence, Maple Heights, Metroparks, Newburgh Heights, Valley View and Walton Hills, according to the GHMC website.

Nicastro said the Newburgh Heights Village Council and its mayor, Trevor Elkins, have said the court would be welcome to move from its present location to a facility in Newburgh Heights. She said that would mean the village would provide the venue, be responsible for maintaining the building and other expenses now being incurred by the city of Garfield Heights.

She said since Newburgh Heights has 80% of the cases coming before the Municipal Court because of the traffic cameras there, and only 8% are from Garfield Heights, it would make sense to move the court to Newburgh Heights.

"I think the move to Newburgh Heights is the best option but it's not up to me," the judge said. She said the decision would be in the hands of Mayor Matt Burke and Garfield Heights City Council.

Nicastro said Judge DiGeronimo has been exploring getting funding from the State of Ohio for a new courthouse in Garfield Heights, but she said she has never heard of the state providing 100% of the money for a building.

"The city has no money to contribute," the judge said. "Everybody's willing but not able."

In the meantime, Nicastro said, starting next week the court will conduct everything it can remotely, which would exclude jury trials, but still drastically cut down on in-person court appearances.

City Council President Avery Johnson said a work session with council members and Judges Nicastro and DiGeronimo will be called within the next two weeks to make plans for the court going forward.

The following ordinances were passed at Monday night's meeting:

- To continue the city's agreement with Anago Cleaning Systems to provide regular cleaning of the Garfield Heights Civic Center and Police Department for the year 2025, for a total annual cost of \$30,432.00.

- To enter into an agreement with the Hunger Network of Greater Cleveland to allow the Garfield Heights Senior Center to receive and distribute pantry foods as part of the Food Bank. The city will only incur a cost for pantry foods if the cost of the food being purchased exceeds the monthly allocation provided by the Hunger Network.

- To prepare plans and specifications, per the OHM Advisors' proposal, and to go out for competitive bids for

the Thornhurst Avenue Reconstruction Project and authorizing payment of costs through funding by the NEORSD MCIP.

The purpose of the project is to eliminate residential basement flooding and property damage, reduce flows to the district's infrastructure for treatment of removing storm water from the currently combined sewer system and improve water quality in area waterways.

- To enter into an agreement with Breezelne for the lease of a dark fiber network which is currently used to connect all the city's buildings to both the internet and its phone system. Under the terms of the new agreement, the city will contract with Breezelne for a period of 60 months at a monthly cost of \$1,375.00, totaling \$82,500 for the duration of the 5-year agreement.

- To adjust the disbursement of funds through the 2% local tax collected by the city to provide for a total of 78% deposited into the city's General Fund and 4% into the city's Debt Amortization Fund, both effective July 1, 2024, with the percentages for all other funds remaining unchanged.

- A resolution was passed recognizing February as Black History Month in the city of Garfield Heights, to honor and celebrate the rich cultural heritage, achievements and immeasurable contributions of African Americans in the United States.

The next council meeting is scheduled for Monday, Feb. 24, at 7 p.m.

Slavic Village wants to grow its population, but it needs the right housing to do it.

Local residents are invited to help plan a major new development just south of Fleet Avenue, at a public meeting:

Thurs February 13th at 6pm 5001 Fleet Avenue (across from Fleet Bike Shop)

Fullerton Elementary School was closed five years ago and replaced with a new school about one mile away. Its buildings were cleared and the resulting multi-acre site just east of East 57th Street between Fullerton and Gertrude Avenues was pinpointed by local leaders as a future residential construction site. Columbus OH developer, Woda Cooper, submitted a proposal in response. They're now gathering public input to inform their design.

Various housing styles are being talked about:

- apartments
- townhouses

- one-story or multi-story
- affordable units

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Lady Mustangs honored for two championship seasons by Maple Hts. Council

The Lady Mustangs of Milkovich Middle School in Maple Heights and their coaches made an appearance at last week's council meeting and were honored with a proclamation from Mayor Annette Blackwell for winning two consecutive Lake Erie League Championships, in the 2023-2024 and the 2024-2025 seasons.

"Maple Heights recognizes these significant achievements," Blackwell said, noting that in 2023-24, the team had a 15-0 overall record, and in 2024-25, a 14-0 overall record.

"I also want to acknowledge your outstanding coaches," Blackwell said to team members. "Thank you for taking a moment to give recognition to this amazing team, and let's give their parents and support system a round of applause."

Maple Heights City Schools Superintendent Olympia Della Flora said, "I'm very proud of you and the city of Maple Heights equally is proud of you and your accomplishments. We continue to look forward to all the things you do, not just on the court, but also in your community and in your lives."

Smoke shop moratorium extended

A 180-day moratorium on "smoke shops" in the city, first approved by council in September 2024 to address concerns about appearances, potential criminal activity and health hazards, was extended another 180 days, after council approved the legislation at last week's meeting.

The extension of the moratorium period, from March 3, 2025 to Oct. 30, 2025, continues the temporary suspension on permitting new establishments in the city that sell or distribute "tobacco products, vapor products, alternative nicotine products, and/or electronic smoking devices," according to the ordinance.

The city will continue to study the impact of having these establishments in Maple Heights. The city's Building Department will not accept applications from businesses seeking to sell or distribute tobacco and vapor products; and the Planning and Zoning Commission will not grant use permits or zoning variances for these businesses.

"The city has a legitimate, substantial and compelling interest in encouraging economic investment in the city

while protecting residents from criminal activity and health risk," the legislation states. "Council believes that the operation of businesses that sell or distribute tobacco and vapor products may have an inappropriate impact on minors, and the location of businesses that sell or distribute tobacco and vapor products near schools, playgrounds, parks, residential neighborhoods and small businesses may be inappropriate and have an adverse impact on property values, health, safety and welfare in the city."

Extending the moratorium period will enable the city "to consider the need to enact reasonable regulations as to the size, number and location of businesses that sell or distribute tobacco and vapor products in the city," according to the ordinance.

Also passed:

- Resolution authorizing City Engineer Ed Hren to begin preparing plans and specifications and to advertise for bids for the Summit and James Avenue Pavement Repair Project. The city has been awarded \$1.4 million from the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District for the Southwest Sewer District Sewer Repairs Phase 2 Project, which includes repairs of storm and sanitary sewers on Dunham, Turney, Carol, Summit, Rochelle, Lisa, Janet, James, Wheeler, E. 146, Mustang, Thunderbird and adjacent areas.

The Ohio Department of Public Works has committed to pay up to \$625,000 to complete the sewer work and pavement repairs on those streets, and resurfacing Summit and James at the completion of the sewer work was included within the scope of the Ohio Public Works Commission grant agreement.

- Resolution authorizing the city, through its Planning and Development Department, to expend public funds and accept private donations to organize and run the following 2025 community events: Easter Fest, Music in the Park, Fall Fest and Holiday Lighting Event "to promote goodwill, civic pride, harmony and understanding throughout the entire Maple Heights community."

- Ordinance authorizing Blackwell and Planning and Development Director Geoff Englebrecht to provide a forgivable loan through the Maple Heights-SBA Small Business Performance Grant Program, to Levels Barber and Beauty College, in the amount of \$2,775 from the

city, and \$8,325 from Cuyahoga County for a total loan amount of \$11,100 to allow the business to make enhancements to its location at 20880 Southgate Park Blvd.

- Resolution authorizing Blackwell to accept a quote and enter into a purchase agreement with Southeastern Equipment Company Inc., through the Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Program, for the purchase of a 2024 Case front wheel loader at a cost of \$173,694.56.

- At the request of District 4 Councilwoman Dana Anderson, who serves as chair of the Community Life and Education Committee, council unanimously approved the appointments of District 5 Councilwoman Tanglyn Madden and District 7 Councilwoman Edwina Agee to fill two vacancies on the committee.

- Placed on first reading was a resolution authorizing Blackwell to enter into a Professional Services Contract with Strategic Health Care Company, to provide lobbyist services for the period from Feb. 15, 2025, to Dec. 31, 2025, at a cost of \$5,000 per month. If council approves the legislation at a future meeting, Strategic Health Care will lobby for funding from the State of Ohio in 2025 for community projects, such as youth engagement/playgrounds, infant mortality health care, senior care housing and affordable housing and home repairs.

Blackwell announced she had received a letter from Cleveland Heights Fire Chief James Harry, thanking the Maple Heights Fire Department for their mutual aid in helping to fight a massive fire on Cedar Rd. in Cleveland Heights during the frigid weather last month. "Please let them know that we appreciate them," Harry's letter stated.

Blackwell also said the city has received two grants. One is from the Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works County Road Preventive Maintenance Program, in the amount of \$183,000, to be used for crack sealing, restriping and joint repair on Dunham, Granger, Lee, Schreiber, Turney and Warrensville Center rds.

The other grant is for \$624,000 from Ohio Public Works funds to cover \$298,000 of the Southwest Phase 3 Construction Project, for the specific streets of Ramage, Dunbury, Evening Star, Morning Star, Steinway, Walvern and Longvale.

Human Services Director Jaimie Hasenohrl stated the city will be introducing a new Senior Hour at the Food Pantry on Wednesday, March 5, from 9-10 a.m. for residents aged 60 and older.

CLE City Council stands united in wake of attacks on immigrant families

Cleveland City Council is committed to ensuring Cleveland's residents, visitors and businesses enjoy safety, freedom and resources to improve their economic status, as announced in a press release by council last week. The recent, deliberate targeting of Latino residents nationwide - and in our region - is a direct threat to these goals, said council.

"We are in constant communication and partnership with our mayor, police chief and leaders from the business, nonprofit and community sectors to address the needs of our residents and provide vocal and active support for our residents and families," council stated.

Cleveland's first settler, Moses Cleaveland, was an immigrant to America. Every ward, neighborhood and community in Cleveland is impacted by immigrants, with arguably the wards represented by Ward 7 Councilwoman

Stephanie Howse-Jones and Ward 14's Jasmin Santana having the largest immigrant communities. Both council members have been vocal in their opposition to the inhumane separation of working families in the region.

Councilwoman Santana shared, "These detainments, sometimes without legal warrants, directly impact families in our city. What affects one, affects all. We cannot and will not idly sit by as our neighbors, friends and families face these threats. These migrants must be given due process and access to adequate legal representation."

Council President Blaine A. Griffin, Ward 6, said that Cleveland truly is a melting pot, with thousands of immigrants from Latin America, Africa, Asia and Europe contributing to our healthcare, arts, culture and economy. 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

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
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Pickup crashes into Maple Hts. business
