Garfield Hts. business owner Weldon Hastings wants action to solve problem of unruly juveniles; seeks city temporary state of emergency order

The problem of juveniles causing havoc on the streets of Garfield Heights took center stage at Monday's meeting of Garfield Heights Council when business owner Weldon Hastings, backed by a contingent of concerned citizens, spoke during the Citizens' Comments portion of the meeting.

May 6th primary roundup

Voters went to the polls last Tuesday, May 6, and overwhelmingly passed Ohio Issue 2, an amendment authorizing the State of Ohio to issue bonds or other obligations to finance or assist in financing public infrastructure capital improvements for local governments and other governmental entities limited to roads and bridges, waste water treatment systems, water supply systems, solid waste disposal facilities, storm water and sanitary collection, storage and treatment facilities.

The amendment limits bond issuance to \$2.5 billion over a 10-year period, with no more than \$250 million in each of the first 10 fiscal years. It takes effect immediately.

Garfield Heights

In Garfield Heights a proposed Charter Amendment, Issue 14, was passed by voters 1123 to 892, in unofficial results from the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections. Issue 14 repeals the requirement that any changes to the existing land uses, or any legislation changing the existing Zoning Map, be submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified electors of the city. It provides that any change to the existing land uses, or any legislation changing the existing Zoning Map, shall be governed by the Planning and Zoning Code of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Garfield Heights.

City leaders pointed out that the amendment was needed to attract investment to the city and eliminate barriers to new construction caused by sometimes waiting months for the next scheduled election to decide a zoning issue.

A proposed tax levy renewing an existing levy for the Garfield Heights City School District went down to defeat by a vote of 986 to 892. School leaders said the levy was needed to keep the schools' educational programming, access to resources and staff all intact for students.

Maple Heights

Voters in Maple Heights gave resounding support to Issue 16, the renewal of a tax levy for current expenses and general operations of the Maple Heights Senior Center, by a vote of 884-381.

City leaders pointed out that this levy costs residents less than \$2 per month for the average homeowner and ensures that Maple Heights residents who need and want the services of the Senior Center will continue to receive them.

Prompted by an incident last week in the parking lot of his computer business, Weldon PC, 5829 Turney Rd., Hastings spoke about the "fire on our streets literally every afternoon." He said groups of 20-50 juveniles "linger, vandalize and intimidate."

On May 6, at 2:32 p.m., according to a GHPD incident report, an officer responded to the back parking lot of Weldon PC for a report of damage to unoccupied vehicles. Prior to that call, GHPD was informed there were about 50 juveniles fighting in that same parking lot. Hastings referenced the incident when speaking to council and said two cars were damaged and one of the cars appeared to be t-boned when one student threw another student head first into one of the cars.

He said police are doing what they can, but when the disperse a group of juvenile troublemakers on one corner, they just move to another corner.

"Meetings and talks are not going to fix the problem," Hastings said. There needs to be immediate action.

Announces Zoom call

Hastings said he will host a Zoom call on Thursday, May 15, at 7 p.m., where "we can put together some kind of plan of action." Anyone needing more information can contact Weldon PC at 216-475-6000.

In the meantime, he said, "I would like council to formally propose a temporary state of emergency to Mayor Burke." He said during that time Garfield Heights leaders can seek a 30-day mutual aid search from other communities, institute a temporary curfew zone and other solutions to the juvenile delinquency in the city.

Council President Avery Johnson told Hastings council would discuss his suggestions and take them under serious consideration. He also said he would get all the school principals together to try to solve the problem.

Mayor Matt Burke explained the city is doing what it can legally do to hold parents and juveniles accountable. He said the GHPD is well staffed, surveillance cameras line Turney Rd. and are monitored for criminal activity, and the city could consider expanding the SRO program in the schools.

"We are going to do what we can legally do," Burke continued.

Law Director Milko Cecez noted that to hold parents responsible for failure to properly supervise a child, there must be proof a crime has been committed. He also pointed out that the Garfield Heights City Schools are run by the school superintendent and school board, and the city is run by the mayor and council.

"Nobody's going to the school board meetings to complain about the kids," Councilman Clifford Kelley commented.

Bedford Heights Council OKs infrastructure repairs

At its meeting on Monday, May 6, Bedford Heights City Council moved forward on several infrastructure and capital improvement projects, including the acceptance of a bid for the 2025 Rockside Road Repairs Project. Set to begin in late spring, the project will include a complete resurfacing of Rockside Road between the I-271/I-480 bridge and Aurora Road. The city was awarded \$250,000 in funding from Cuyahoga County's Local Resurfacing Program to support the project.

Infrastructure & Capital Improvements Chairwoman Danielle Henderson also introduced a series of motions authorizing the city to advertise for bids for several other infrastructure projects, including: Mueti Drive resurfacing, Fargo Avenue resurfacing, and various asphalt, concrete and catch basin repairs.

Also approved at Monday's meeting was an ordinance which authorizes Mayor Phillip Stevens to enter into an agreement with NOPEC, Inc., and take all necessary steps to accept funds from the 2025 NOPEC Energized Community Grant. The Energized Community Grant helps NOPEC member communities implement energy-saving or energy infrastructure measures.

Council also appointed a new assistant clerk of council. Council members Enid Thomas and Michael Willis both expressed concerns about the appointment process, particularly the fact that candidates are not interviewed by all members of council. Both Thomas and Willis called for a more inclusive and transparent selection process moving forward.

Committee Reports

Mayor Phillips celebrated a successful Career Fair at Bedford High School, where city staff shared their work experiences with students and recruited students for summer jobs. Stevens also invited the public to attend the groundbreaking of the new Pre-K - 2 school being constructed behind the existing middle school; the date of the groundbreaking will be announced shortly.

Safety Committee Chairman Lloyd Anderson announced that the city has begun receiving income for temporary inmate housing at the Bedford Heights jail, with approximately \$10,000 received from other communities so far. Anderson also addressed residents' concerns about speeding, particularly on residential streets. Anderson and Mayor Stevens discussed the city's deployment of speed bumps on the streets with the greatest need. Stevens expressed a desire to increase the number of speed bumps installed in the city, but is also considering most cost-effective options, such as flashing caution signs or speed indicators.

Legislation passed

Also at Monday's meeting, council passed the following:

- To participate in the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District programs to secure funding for the Maplerow and E. 126 St. Sewer Separation Project.

- To participate in the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District programs to secure funding for the I-480 Sanitary Sewer Crossing Project which will repair and replace sanitary sewer lines under I-480.

- To approve a Collective Bargaining Agreement between the city and the Fraternal Order of Police, Ohio Labor Council, Inc. - jailers, jail commander and records clerk, for a term beginning on January 1, 2025, and ending on December 31, 2027.

- To approve a Collective Bargaining Agreement between the city and the Fraternal Order of Police, Ohio Labor Council, Inc. - safety dispatchers, for a term beginning on January 1, 2025, and ending on December 31, 2027.

- To apply for and accept a Training and Equipment Grant from the Ohio Department of Public Safety - Division of Emergency Medical Services - for the purchase of necessary firefighting equipment in the amount of approximately \$3000.

- To adopt the Solid Waste Management plan for the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste Management District.

Traffic Offense-OVI

• On May 2, at 11:20 p.m., an officer on routine patrol in the Broadway Ave., Park Dr. area was almost struck head-on by a white GMC truck going left of center on Broadway. The officer activated his lights and sirens as the truck continued to go left of center. It eventually stopped just west of Henry St. The officer told the driver that he had almost hit his patrol vehicle, but the driver said he was not aware of the incident. He was slow in answering the officer's questions and appeared to have red, glossy eyes. He was asked to exit his vehicle but now stated he did not speak English. He was again commanded to step out of his truck but again refused. He finally got out of his truck and the officer could smell alcohol on his person. The driver admitted to drinking a few beers and refused to take a Standard Field Sobriety Test. The officer told him a Spanish-speaking officer was on his way but the suspect said he didn't need him. He was cited for lanes of travel and OVI.

• On May 11, at about 11:22 p.m., an officer on patrol observed a motor vehicle accident involving three cars, a Kia Sorrento, Mercedes GLC 300 and a Chevrolet Captiva. The Kia and Mercedes had hit a telephone pole on Turney and both had severe front damage and airbags deployed. The Captiva was facing west at a stop sign at Lincoln Ave. at Turney Rd., with a female driver inside. EMS was dispatched to check her for injuries. The driver of the Kia started to yell at the driver of the Mercedes and continued to act irate and disorderly, yelling in the face of the officer. She had slurred speech and was having difficulty standing upright without swaying as she continued yelling and arguing. Police got information from the other two drivers and they were sent on their way. The Kia driver, after field sobriety testing, was arrested for OVI without incident.

Menacing

On May 5, shortly before 1:30 p.m., an officer spoke with the manager of Walgreens, 12777 Rockside Rd., who reported a male had come into the store, reloaded a money card and started screaming and yelling at the store staff, saying things like, "You f---- with the wrong person," and "You don't know who you are messing with." He then told the staff he was going to shoot them all and left the store. He was described as a black male, 5'11", wearing a black hat and dark clothing. A photo of the male was attached to the report.

Criminal Damage-Auto

Prior to that call, GHPD was informed there were about 50 juveniles fighting in that same parking lot. The officer met with two complainants whose cars were damaged. A female victim said she had driven her sister's car to work, a black Ford Fusion, which had damage to the rear right passenger door. It had a dent nearly as big as the door and a smaller one on the rear right bumper. A male victim said he had driven his wife's car to work, a Toyota Prius, which had scratches to the rear right passenger door. It was suspected that the damage to both cars was caused by the 50 juveniles who were fighting. At the time of the report there were no known suspects.

• On May 7, at about 8:50 a.m., an officer responded to Platinum Carriers, 12325 Broadway Ave., where the manager said there were three vehicles in the front lot that had broken out windows. The vehicles belong to truck drivers who are on the road and park their cars there while they are gone. The incident occurred between about 1:13 a.m., and 1:25 a.m. The suspect vehicle was a white 2019

Kia Forte captured on the business surveillance system. The Kia was confirmed to be a stolen vehicle which was later used to steal another vehicle. The suspects appear to be males in their late teens or early twenties. After the incident at Platinum Carriers, the Kia parked briefly across the street in the southeastern corner of the parking lot at 12400 Broadway Ave. before leaving. The officer located in that lot a silver 2019 Dodge Ram with the rear right window broken out. It is currently unknown what was taken from each vehicle. The report will be suspended until the suspects' identities are discovered.

Drug Abuse

While enroute, dispatch advised police that a male on scene had an active felony domestic violence warrant with GHPD. Officers arrived and found everyone in the house had been evacuated and was safe. The male with a warrant was detained and was found to have a suspected crack pipe with residue and mini butane torch in his pocket. He was taken to city jail and arrested for his felony domestic violence warrant and charged with drug abuse instruments. Fire department notified dispatch that a suspected meth lab was located in the basement of the house and that the Ohio Fire Marshal's Office had been advised.

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Final Mass at Our Lady of Hope Church in Bedford to be held Sat., May 31st



Last month Bishop Edward Malesic, head of the Cleveland Catholic Diocese, issued a decree declaring that the parish of Our Lady of Hope, 400 Center Rd., Bedford, would be merged in an "extinctive union" with the parish of St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception, 340 Union St., Bedford, meaning that OLH "is extinguished and subsumed into St. Mary Parish."

In the decree the bishop said that a thorough study of the condition of OLH parish had been instituted in 2023 by the pastor, Rev. Joseph Seebauer, who is also pastor at St. Mary's, and it was found that OLH parish had "experienced a significant decline in Mass attendance and celebration of the sacraments, has limited resources and is operating at a yearly financial deficit," and concluding "there is no longer a need for two distinct parishes in close geographical proximity."

The closing Mass at Our Lady of Hope will be on Saturday, May 31, 2025, with Bishop Edward Malesic as the main celebrant. Fr. Seebauer and Associate Fr. Dennis

Mrossi and other priests who have served OLH will also concelebrate the final Mass. There will be light refreshments served in the Social Hall immediately following the Mass. Any graduates of Pius X School who want to tour the school upstairs are welcome to do so.


