Holy Name parishioners say farewell to Monsignor Richard Antall as he takes helm at new parish on west side

Monsignor Richard Antall, pastor of Holy Name Church in Slavic Village for the last 14 years, has been transferred by Cleveland Diocese Bishop Edward C. Malesic to a new post on Cleveland's west side, La Sagrada Familia Parish at 7719 Detroit Ave.

Msgr. will say his first Masses this week at La Sagrada Saturday at 5 p.m. in Spanish, and Sunday at 10 a.m. in English and 12 noon in Spanish. He is very fluent in Spanish as he spent many years serving the missions church in El Salvador.

Fr. Robert Jasany, longtime pastor of St. John Nepomucene Parish on Fleet Ave., in Slavic Village, has now been assigned as pastor of Holy Name Parish in addition to his pastoral assignment at St. John's.

Msgr. gave his final message to Holy Name parishioners in his homily last Sunday and the following excerpts he wrote in last Sunday's bulletin:

"I love Holy Name and I love all of you... I want to thank God, first, and all of you for the years I spent here. I thought I would retire from here but our God is a God of surprises. Pray for me in my new assignment. I take so many memories with me, I must concentrate on the new community I am called to serve. At my age, I am a lot less flexible than I was when I landed here from El Salvador..."

"I just celebrated Mass at my new parish and I know I will love that church as much as I loved and love our beautiful parish church at Holy Name. Still, I will miss celebrating the sacrifice in the beauty and history of this parish church."

Cleveland announces first-ever Carl B. Stokes Day

The city of Cleveland hosted the first official Carl B. Stokes Day to honor the life and celebrate the legacy of Carl B. Stokes, the 51st Mayor of Cleveland and the first Black mayor of a major American city. Elected officials, community leaders, members of the Stokes family and others gathered at City Hall Monday to commemorate one of the most influential public figures in the city's history.

"Most folks in this country look at places like Montgomery and Selma as the birthplace of Black political power and the Civil Rights Movement, but I think it's time, starting today, that Cleveland is mentioned in that conversation as well," said Mayor Justin M. Bibb. "Because without Mayor Stokes creating the blueprint, many great Black political leaders would likely not have been elected," Bibb continued. "In Cleveland, we uplift our history and recognize the incredible contributions of those who have made our city a better place – and that's exactly what this day is about."

Mayor Stokes was elected in 1967 during the height of the Civil Rights Movement, breaking historic barriers and setting a powerful national precedent for Black politicians in America. His leadership redefined public service with a bold commitment to equity, justice and community-centered governance. He challenged long-standing racial injustices in housing, education, employment and public safety, and brought the voices of historically underrepresented communities to the center of civic decision-making.

Mayor Stokes was also a pioneer in the fight for environmental justice, raising national awareness about the harmful effects of urban pollution on low-income and Black communities. He understood that environmental quality and social equity must go hand in hand. That legacy continues to shape Cleveland's current work, including the city's updated Climate Action Plan – which centers health, justice, and sustainability for all residents, city leaders pointed out.

Stokes also believed deeply in the power of economic opportunity. His commitment to inclusion helped establish the foundation for the city's ongoing efforts to support minority-owned businesses and ensure fair access to jobs and public contracts. These values remain central to the work of the Office of Equal Opportunity and reflect the vision of a city that works for everyone.

His contributions and lifelong dedication to public service have been memorialized through the naming of multiple civic institutions – like the Carl B. Stokes Federal Courthouse and the Stokes Wing of the Cleveland Public Library – and serve as a reminder of the progress, resilience and impact he left on Cleveland.

Monday's recognition – following a resolution introduced by Mayor Bibb and passed by Cleveland City Council – marks the first-ever Carl B. Stokes Day in the city's history and memorializes his trailblazing leadership every year hereafter on June 30th to ensure his legacy continues to inspire future generations.



Cleveland Councilwoman Rebecca Maurer lays out roadmap for next steps in city's Lead Safe program

Ward 12 Councilwoman Rebecca Maurer released a new report last Thursday titled "Lead Safe Housing at a Crossroads," which lays out a road map for next steps in realizing the dream of Cleveland's 2019 lead law.

The report comes on the heels of multiple Cleveland City Council hearings, news stories and a recent meeting of the Lead Safe Advisory Board that highlighted both progress and challenges. Councilwoman Maurer, who serves as co-chair of the Lead Safe Advisory Board and vice chair of the Health and Human Services Committee, agrees: "We have come a long way, but we haven't gone nearly far enough."

She added, "That's why this report highlights the need to iterate on the program and especially speed up spending on the physical improvements to Cleveland properties. We need to focus on measurable outcomes like replacing old wood windows and doors. Those types of replacements are how we can create generational changes, not just create more paperwork and red tape."

The report outlines three key recommendations:

Simplify - Cut red tape to speed up how funds are disbursed for lead-safe repairs

Focus - Target the highest-risk properties and components, such as old windows.

Coordinate - Improve transparency and coordination across the public and private sides of the lead-safe ecosystem.

"At the end of the day, we need to measure what really matters, whether homes are being made safer," Maurer said. "And then we hope in the years to come that those investment will drive a decrease in our high number of lead poisoning cases. That is complex work, and that's why I'm releasing a report with details recommendations about next steps."



- Property taxes must be current.
- Proof of Homestead Exemption tax credit required.

- Applicant must provide proof of roof replacement need.
- Grant funds cannot be used to address open/current Point-of-Sale violations.
- Applicant must provide proof of current homeowner's insurance policy on property.
- A homeowner contribution of 1% of the project cost is required.

Felonious Assault

GHPD, OIU collaboration nets drug bust

Garfield Heights police officers, working an undercover operation with Ohio Investigative Unit (OIU) agents on Friday, June 27, witnessed a drug transaction on Garfield Blvd. around 5:20 p.m. Officers attempted to box the vehicle in at which time the driver rammed an OIU vehicle and fled the scene.

Officers pursued the vehicle where it ultimately lost control and crashed into a sign post on Ottawa Rd. in Cleveland. Both the driver and passenger were arrested after fleeing on foot.

Found in the vehicle were the following:

- 38 grams of suspected crack

The driver is on parole and has pending cases for drug trafficking and fleeing and eluding. The passenger is on probation for weapons charges.

Free Solar Farm 'Lunch and Learn'

Please join the South East Cleveland Kiwanis and Slavic Village Development for a Solar Farm "Lunch and Learn" event at the Polish American Cultural Center and Museum, 6501 Lansing Ave., Cleveland, on Thursday, July 10, from noon to 1:30 p.m.

Cuyahoga County was awarded a Climate Pollution Reduction Grant by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency last year. The grant will fund the deployment of 63 megawatts (MW) of solar installations on five brownfield and previous landfill sites and 10 MW of battery storage. The grant funds will also support the restoration of natural habitats and expand tree coverage on a blighted brownfield site along the shoreline of Lake Erie and create pollinator habitats at the Cleveland and Cuyahoga solar sites.

"This is a huge win for the Broadway/Slavic Village Community to help reclaim and reuse a portion of the closed Harvard Road landfill and put it back to productive use," said former Ward 12 Councilman Tony Brancatelli. A portion of the landfill will be topped with solar panels to generate about 4 megawatts with a proposed goal to sell its power to Cleveland Public Power.

"Slavic Village Development and local officials have been planning on reuse strategies for the past decade and this federal grant will help realize this creative land use and create a more sustainable environment and help reduce global warming," Brancatelli noted.

CEP Renewables Senior Project Development Manager Kurt Princic will give a presentation on the solar farm development and Slavic Village Development Director of Neighborhood Planning, Krystal Sierra, will speak on the CDC's role and community engagement. 
