Slavic Village Council Candidate Forum is July 30th

Residents of Slavic Village will get their first formal opportunity next week to meet and question the seven candidates running to represent them in Cleveland City Council. The public meeting will take place Wednesday evening, July 30, at the Polish American Cultural Center, 6501 Lansing Ave., Cleveland. Doors will open at 6 p.m.; the forum will begin at 6:30 p.m.

During last January's redistricting process, when the

number of wards was reduced from 17 to 15 due to population loss, the Broadway area was partitioned into three larger wards encompassing much of southeast Cleveland. The wards and candidates include:

Ward 3 (north of Fleet Ave., east of E. 49 St.): Deborah Gray, Sharon Spruill, Erich Stubbs

Candidates attending the forum will be asked to make brief opening statements after which they will answer questions submitted in writing by audience members.

Officer Involved Shooting

On Sunday, July 20, at 1:56 p.m., officers from the Maple Heights Police Department responded to 5207 Henry St., for a report of a female being attacked by two dogs. When officers arrived the dogs were still actively attacking her. One of the responding officers fired shots from his weapon striking both of the dogs, who both succumbed from their injuries.

Officers then began performing life-saving emergency first aid on the victim, Rhonda Johnson, 62, until paramedics from the Maple Heights Fire Department arrived. She was then transported to MetroHealth Medical Center.

Witnesses on scene advised the officers the female was walking both dogs when they turned on her and began attacking her.

Johnson is in stable condition and has undergone surgery to repair her badly injured right arm. She also sustained injuries to her left arm, left leg, right leg and chest.

Johnson was the primary caregiver of the dogs and walked them several times a day, according to neighbors. Police said it is unclear what caused the dogs to attack her.



Slavic Villagers draft a neighborhood platform

Residents of one of Cleveland's oldest neighborhoods took political matters into their own hands this week by drafting a major platform of policy priorities that they hope will lead the discussion during this year's campaigns for mayor, council and the courts. The platform covers the hot-button topics that have for years dominated talk at civic meetings and across backyard fences, including housing, public safety, main streets, youth and elderly, and general neighborhood development. (See Page 8 of

this newspaper for the platform text).

Organizers said they were prompted to act after last winter's redistricting presented them with entirely new ward lines as well as unfamiliar politicians interested in leading them.

Planks in the platform were gathered at block club meetings, in social media groups and in private conversations. The process demonstrated that Slavic Villagers agree on a lot - but not everything. Organizers concede that residents are likely not in sync with each individual plank. They nevertheless view them as a worthwhile basis for policy talk as the election cycle proceeds, starting with next week's City Council Candidates Forum at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 30, at the Polish American Cultural Center, 6501 Lansing Ave., Cleveland.

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Garfield Heights joins CLE Restoration Society

The city of Garfield Heights has announced that it has joined the Cleveland Restoration Society, marking a significant milestone as the community's first-ever membership with the largest non-governmental regional historic preservation organization in Ohio. This partnership brings multiple new resources to residents, including the Heritage Home Program.

The Heritage Home Program offers free technical assistance and low-interest financing for a variety of home repair and maintenance projects, which can include everything from roof replacements and foundation repairs to window restoration and electrical upgrades.

"Our city is among the oldest First Suburbs, with 97% of its residential structures age 50-years or older," said Mayor Matt Burke. "So our new partnership with the Cleveland Restoration Society can provide options to assist with home repairs associated with older homes."

She tried to speak to him but he was not saying anything, just singing. The woman then called police. The officers walked down Grand Division with the child to see if he could recognize his house. Someone on Grand Division recognized the child and pointed out the house he lived in. There were multiple people on the home's back porch when police arrived who then went inside. The child was handed over to a female and taken inside as well. The child's mother came outside and said she had been busy and the other kids in the house should have seen him leave. She said the child is autistic and the doors should have been locked so he couldn't get out. The mother was charged with child endangering. The report will be forwarded to the prosecutor for review.

Weapon Offense

On Wednesday, July 16, at 12:19 a.m., a police officer responded to the station to take a report from a male victim who said that someone shot four bullet holes into his vehicle. He said around 11:15 p.m., he left the Get Go gas station and was driving his GMC Sierra pick-up truck in the far right lane on Transportation Blvd. towards Antenucci Blvd., when a dark gray sedan pulled up on the left side of his vehicle and shot at his truck four times. Bullets struck his driver's side door and shattered the window. He then started chasing the sedan on Antenucci until they reached Turney Rd., where the sedan turned right and the victim went left.

After talking to the victim the police officer checked the city cameras and located a video with the victim driving off I-480 east onto Transportation Blvd. The sedan was in front of the truck and the truck was following the sedan too close, as if it was road rage. Both vehicles made a right turn onto Vista Way and entered the parking lot of Starbucks. A few moments later, the truck drove out of the parking lot and onto the middle lane of Transportation Blvd. The sedan was traveling right behind the GMC truck until the truck came to a complete stop in the middle of the roadway blocking the sedan from driving forward. The sedan attempted to drive around the truck on the left side, but was stopped by the GMC once again, as the victim positioned his truck in front of the sedan. That is when the sedan possibly shot four rounds at the GMC. The video showed one apparent muzzle flash coming from the sedan. After the shooting the sedan drove around the GMC truck and turned onto Antenucci at a high speed rate with the truck chasing it. When both vehicles approached Turney they went in opposite directions.

After reviewing the camera footage of this incident, the police officer determined that the victim was the aggressor and falsely stated the actual events leading up to the shooting. Police could not identify the sedan driver and no spent casings were found at the scene, but shattered glass from the window of the GMC truck was located on the roadway. The report will be forwarded to the Detective Bureau for follow up.

Traffic Offense-Fleeing

On July 19, at 8:36 a.m., police officers responded to a report of a domestic violence incident in the 13200 block of Havana Rd. The complainant stated that a male with a gun had just "jumped on her" and was fleeing towards Turney Rd. on a black motor bike. The police located a potential suspect between Turney and Woodward Blvd., but as police tried to pull him over he accelerated and led police on a pursuit that lasted over four miles. The suspect failed to stop at multiple stop signs, traffic signals, swerved into the opposite lanes of traffic, rode on the sidewalks and disregarded the safety of pedestrians. He ended up crushing his gas-powered bicycle at the corner of Darlington Ave. and E. 133 St., and kept fleeing on foot. While he was fleeing police observed him reaching into his waist band with his right hand and it looked like he was securing or pulling something out, common gesture of a person trying to remove a firearm. The police and K-9 Creed began a foot pursuit. The suspect was captured in the driveway of a house on Willard Ave. No weapon was found on his person at the time of arrest. He was charged with fleeing and eluding, domestic violence, obstructing official business and issued various traffic citations.

Bedford Hts. Council debates new RV restrictions

Tensions ran high at the July 15th Bedford Heights Council meeting as council members passed several measures to regulate land use, including an ordinance creating new restrictions on recreational vehicle parking and a proposed ban on short-term rentals.

An ordinance was proposed to implement new restrictions on the parking and storage of recreational vehicles in the city.

The ordinance stated that RVs may not be stored on any street, public or private property unless it is registered or leased to the owner of the property. Any vehicle parked outside of a garage must be on a paved surface at the side or rear of the property, no closer than five feet from the side property line and no closer than ten feet from the rear property line. The vehicle may not be used for living, business or housekeeping while being stored.

Sponsor of the legislation, Councilwoman Kathie Kelso-Perez, said the ordinance was created in response to improperly stored RVs that have become a concern in the community. She explained that RVs stored incorrectly in front and back yards can impact the appearance of the community and the quality of life of neighboring residents. She added that the city has also been made aware of individuals living inside RVs parked in residential areas, which violates single-family zoning regulations. She believes the restrictions proposed in the new ordinance will address these violations moving forward.

Her sentiment was not shared by everyone in attendance. Multiple residents who own RVs expressed concern that the ordinance will make storage of their vehicles more difficult and asked that the council consider alternatives that would more directly target problematic RVs.

Council President Alton Tinker also expressed doubt about the proposed legislation and questioned whether the problem is as significant as Kelso-Perez suggests. Tinker said he personally counted just 12 RVs in the city and is unsure of the ordinance's purpose or urgency. Tinker hopes changes can be made before final approval.

Council approved the ordinance as a first reading rather than an emergency measure. Two additional readings will be required before the legislation takes effect.

Legislation passed

- Resolution to authorize the acceptance of a bid from KAM Construction for the reconstruction of the Bedford Heights welcome wall. The estimated cost of the project is \$69,500.

- Two resolutions which accepted bids for the resurfacing projects of Tupelo Dr. and Fargo Ave., respectively. Both projects were awarded to Vandra Brothers Construction for a total cost of \$638,982.

- Council also considered a resolution which proposes a ban on the operation of short-term real estate rentals in Bedford Heights, including Airbnbs. This measure was also presented by Kelso-Perez, who believes short-term rentals are often the source of nuisances and prevent

homes from being rented long-term or sold, potentially creating housing challenges.

Originally proposed as an emergency resolution, the council elected to consider it as a first reading. It passed 6-1, with Kelso-Perez casting a "no" vote in protest of the change from the emergency status.

- An ordinance to amend the Codified Ordinances to add new guidelines for the use of temporary storage containers such as pods was passed as a first reading. According to the proposed guidelines, residents will only be permitted two temporary storage pods per year, with only one granted at a time for a period of 30 days. Residents may apply for an extension of 15 days if necessary. They may not be used for habitation or for business materials.

- Lastly, council considered a resolution to ban the granting of certificates of occupancy or permits for smoke and vape shops in the city. Councilman Paul Bounds said the ban is a proactive measure to avoid potential community decline. The measure passed 6-1, with Councilman Michael Willis casting the only "no" vote.
