Mound School to merge with A.B. Hart; Dike School of Arts relocates to Mound



Mound Elementary School will close and become Dike School of The Arts under the new CMSD plan.

The Cleveland Metropolitan School District recently announced school closings to accommodate lower student enrollment and revenue shortages to operate. The Building Brighter Futures initiative will result in Mound Elementary in Slavic Village merging with A.B. Hart next year.

"The positive news is that CMSD will relocate the highly acclaimed Dike School of The Arts to the Mound School site," said former councilman and civic leader Tony Brancatelli.

The mission of Dike School of the Arts is to meet all students' academic, social and emotional needs while promoting expression through rigorous study of the arts.

What makes Dike stand out? According to its website, "At DSA, art isn't just another class — it's a core part of our every day. From the early years in Pre-K through third grade, our students dive into drama, dance, visual art and band every single week. It's all about exploring and having a blast with creativity."

As students progress to grades 4 through 8, they choose an art form they love and dive deep into it. And teachers bring the arts into all kinds of lessons, mixing creativity with things like math, science, ELA, and social studies.

"I am excited that with the relocation of this specialty school, along with the Warner Girls' Leadership Academy and award-winning Cleveland Central Catholic High School, many more high quality educational opportunities will be created for residents in the Broadway Slavic Village neighborhood," Brancatelli said.

Bedford Mayor Stan Koci announces death of Councilman Jeff Asbury at Monday's city council meeting

Bedford Mayor Stan Koci began Monday night's meeting of council with a heavy heart, announcing the death of Ward 5 Councilman Jeff Asbury.

His voice filled with emotion, Koci praised Asbury for his civic involvement, not only as a council member, but as a community volunteer, auxiliary police officer and the lasting impact he made in the city of Bedford as he "tirelessly sought to improve the lives of our residents."

Asbury had run for reelection in the Nov. 4th primary, but was defeated in a close race by challenger Cory Berry, whose term will begin Jan. 1, 2026, as confirmed by Clerk of Council Tracy M. Simons.

Legislation passed

- Three ordinances to amend chapters of the codified ordinances, all dealing with stormwater quality control, were enacted after three readings in order that the city comply with Environmental Protection Agency standards. The ordinances dealt with Stormwater Management and Site Development, Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan and Site Development, and Illicit Discharge and Illegal Connection Control.

- Ordinance authorizing the city manager to enter into a contract with Simplex IT to purchase a new server for City Hall at a cost not to exceed \$51,741.31.

- Motion to accept the Planning Commission's decision approving a request of Jesse Mashak of Kaizen Companies LLC to build a prefabricated modular structure at 132 Greencroft Ave., was passed.

- Motion passed to accept the Planning Commission's decision to approve another request of Jesse Mashak of Kaizen Companies LLC to build a prefabricated modular structure at 158 Flora Dr.

Legislation pending

A motion to join with the Planning Commission to deny the opening of a short-term rental at 345 Turney Rd., ended in a 3 to 3 tie in the council vote. The law director will look into the protocol to handle this situation and get back to the interested parties.

An ordinance to make appropriations for current expenses and expenditures for the city for 2026 was passed for a third and final reading.

Heating help available as winter looms

As temperatures start to drop across Ohio, the state is stepping in to help families keep the heat on by easing the burden of high energy bills.

Effective Nov. 1, income-eligible Ohioans can receive one-time assistance with their home energy bill through the Ohio Department of Development's Home Energy Assistance Winter Crisis Program.

“We’re proud to show up for Ohioans when they need us most, especially when Ohio winters create challenges for individuals and families,” said Lydia Mihalik, director of the Department of Development. “The Winter Crisis Program is here to provide critical support so people can stay safe, healthy and warm through our coldest time of the year.”

The Winter Crisis Program assists Ohioans facing service disconnection, those who have already been disconnected, individuals needing to establish new service, and those required to pay for a service transfer. It also supports households with 25% or less of bulk fuel in their tank to maintain service. Qualifying households must have a gross annual income at or below 175% of the federal poverty level. For a family of four, that is \$56,262.50.

Households serviced by a Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO)-regulated utility must sign up for PIPP or another payment plan if there is still an outstanding balance on the utility bill after receiving assistance.

Ohioans can start their application online but must schedule an appointment with their local energy assistance provider to complete the application. Depending on the agency, the appointment may be in person, on the phone, or remotely. The application and list of providers can be found online at energyhelp.ohio.gov.

Clients need to bring copies of the following documents to their appointment: Most recent energy bills, if available. A list of all household members and proof of income for the last 30 days or 12 months for each member. Proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members. Proof of disability, if applicable.

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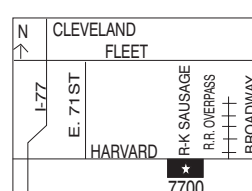

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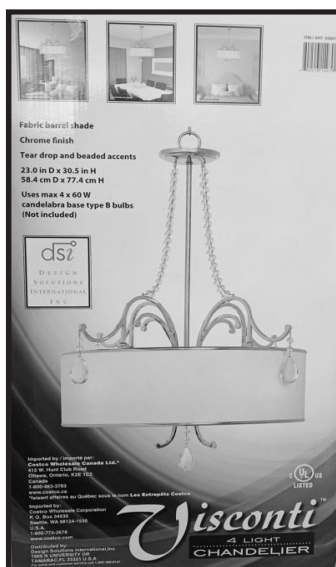

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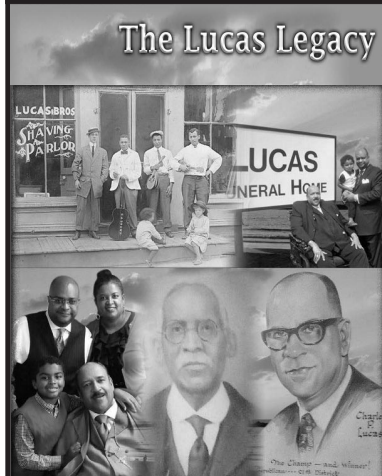

New life for Slavic Village's Worley Park

MVA Hit Skip

On Nov. 2, an officer responded to a call on E. 90 St., near Garfield Blvd., for a male involved in a hit skip crash. Police met with the victim who stated that after delivering a Door Dash order on E. 85 St., a red SUV pulled up next to him and the driver (a middle-aged white female) asked him where to buy alcohol. The victim rolled up his window while the suspect driver turned around in a driveway and upon reentering the roadway, struck the rear bumper of the victim's car. After the victim confronted the women about the crash she denied hitting the vehicle and fled the scene. He drove around the area while speaking to Dispatch.

While officers interviewed the victim, the given plate number of the suspect vehicle hit a Flock camera south-bound on Turney Rd., near Sladden. The vehicle was located at a Shell gas station at 5095 Turney Rd. Officers gave the victim the report number and headed to Shell to interview the suspect. The officer checked the front bumper of the suspect vehicle at the Shell station and small scratches appearing to be fresh were located on the front bumper. When the officer tried to speak with the suspect she was uncooperative and did not acknowledge any questions about her identity. Meanwhile the victim was driving past the gas station and yelling out of his window that it was her and her vehicle that hit him. She was placed under arrest, taken to city jail and issued a citation for hit-skip and held with no bond.

Theft of Motor Vehicle

On Nov. 7, at 8:35 p.m., police responded to a complaint of a stolen vehicle. The victim was selling his red 2015 Toyota Scion on Facebook marketplace. He met with the vehicle buyer at his residence on Nov. 6, and the buyer agreed to purchase the vehicle the next day. The vehicle buyer provided the victim with a meeting address on McCracken Rd., and they met at 7 p.m. on Nov. 7. The vehicle buyer and the victim agreed on a purchase price of \$9,000 for the vehicle and 4 spare wheels and tires. After the buyer counted the money out in front of the victim on the hood of the car in the dark, the victim took the envelope containing the money, but while driving home he noticed the money was fake. The money was in \$100 dollar bills which stated "FOR MOTION PICTURE PURPOSES." The victim drove to the police station and gave officers a description of the suspect, a dark-skinned male about 5'7, around 200 lbs., in his late 20s, average build. The victim's wife went to message the suspect on Facebook, but the account was either blocked or the account was deleted. Dispatch was able to find a

male that met the description but was unable to determine if it was the suspect at the time. The case was forwarded to the Detective Bureau.

Animal Complaint

On Nov. 8, at 7:01 p.m., an officer was dispatched to the 9600 block of McCracken Rd., for a reported dog bite. Upon police arrival they met with the victim, owner of Tails (a male brown English bulldog). The victim told police he had taken his dog out on a leash into his backyard. The neighbor's dog later came into their yard and attacked Tails, biting him on the left side of his face. The officer noticed blood coming from the driveway of the victim's residence. The suspect's son and the victim were able to separate the dogs. The victim provided proof of recent vet visits, while the owner of the other dog, a grey bull terrier, couldn't provide proof of vet visits. The suspect explained to police that her son had let her dog out without it being on a leash. The suspect was issued a summons for animal at large which was forwarded to the animal warden.

Traffic Offense

On Nov. 9, at 1:36 a.m., an officer was stationed at St. John Lutheran Church at the intersection of Granger Rd. and Turney Rd. He observed a black Jeep SUV traveling south on Turney Rd. at high speeds. The officer followed the vehicle in attempt to catch up and saw the vehicle pass through a solid red light. The officer activated his lights to conduct a traffic stop. The vehicle failed to stop and continued going at high speeds. The vehicle then began to slow down and came to a complete stop at the intersections of Turney Rd. and Orme Rd. The driver was detained and police observed a handgun on the driver's side floorboard.

The suspect was placed into the police cruiser, and the firearm was made safe by removing the magazine. It was run through LEADS but was not reported stolen. As the officer approached the vehicle a second time he noticed an open bottle of Tequila and conducted a search, but there was no further evidence discovered. The officer spoke to the passenger and she stated she and the driver had left the Ultra Lounge, 4912 Turney Rd., and the suspect had been driving erratically. He was released from custody and issued citations for speeding, red lights, and reckless operation and summons for an open container. The firearm was turned back over to the driver.

Animal Cruelty

On Nov. 11, at about 11 a.m., an officer responded to a home in the 10800 block of Plymouth Ave., about a dog that was outside for the last two days and the renters had already moved out. When the officer arrived he saw a small white dog running loose in the front yard of the home. The wind chill temperature outside was about 21 degrees with light snow. The officer observed a sun room with a broken back door in the rear of the house where the dog appeared to be living. Another small brown poodle-like dog was found in a cage in the same room. They did not have any food or water and little shelter being locked out of the main house. Officers were able to secure the broken door to the sunroom by placing an old mattress against it to contain the dogs from getting out. The animal warden had been at the residence a few days prior about the same white dog running loose. The renters had not moved out yet and the animal warden advised them to call the APL to take custody of the dogs if they didn't want them. Animal warden to follow up. Report forwarded to the prosecutor for pending charges.

Traffic Offense-Fleeing

On Nov. 12, shortly before 11 p.m., police were notified by dispatch that Parma PD was currently pursuing a black sedan that fled a traffic stop, occupied by at least three people and currently exiting I-480 and heading north on Transportation Blvd. GHPD found the suspect vehicle going north on E. 86 St., passing Reed at a high rate of speed with its lights off. Legal Aid may be able to help domestic violence survivors

Even though financial, emotional and mental abuse can be considered domestic violence, when interacting with the legal system it is important to understand what the legal definition is, especially if you are seeking a protection order.

“The law defines domestic violence as causing physical harm to a current or former romantic partner, parent of one of your children, or a family or household member,” said Lindsey Grdina, Senior Attorney in the Family Law Practice Group at The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland. “This includes threats to harm someone and stalking them.”

Abusers will often isolate their target from friends and family. They will seek to control the other party’s finances and question them about all their social interactions. When the victim speaks up for themselves, the abuser will gaslight them or become emotionally unstable.

“What starts as just some bad fights can quickly turn into physical violence. This is when most survivors will seek the assistance of the police or will try to get a protection order,” said Lindsey.

There are ways that survivors can protect themselves against their abusers including obtaining a Temporary Protection Order (TPO) or a Domestic Violence Civil Protection Order (DVCPO).

“If an abuser has been charged with a crime of domestic violence, menacing by stalking or criminal trespass, you may qualify for a TPO through the criminal court.

It can cover your children and anyone who lives in your house. The judge in the criminal case will issue the temporary protection order usually at the time that the abuser is being arraigned and it can have an additional penalty for violating it,” Lindsey said.

The guidelines for a DVCPO are a little different.

“To obtain a DVCPO, the abuser has to be a family or household member, a current or former dating partner, or the parent of one of your children,” said Lindsey. “The applicant must file paperwork at the Domestic Relations Court. If you are asking for an emergency order because there is an immediate safety concern, you can be heard by a magistrate that day and obtain an emergency protection order.

Within two weeks, a full hearing will be held so that both parties have an opportunity to tell their side of the situation to the magistrate. After a hearing, it’s up to the magistrate to decide if a DVCPO should be issued, who should be protected in the order and how long the order should last.”

While a TPO ends at the conclusion of a criminal case, a DVCPO can last up to five years and can be renewed.
