Historic locomotives at Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad to be electrified

Ohio EPA is partnering with the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad (CVSR) to repower two historic diesel-powered locomotives with electric engines. The project will preserve Ohio's railroad heritage while reducing emissions in one of the state's treasured natural areas.

The approximately \$3.5 million project will modernize locomotives that have served generations of visitors traveling through Cuyahoga Valley National Park (CVNP). Ohio EPA's Diesel Emission Reduction Act and Diesel Mitigation Trust Fund grants will support \$2.1 million of the total project cost.

"By repowering these historic machines with electric engines, it's helping to keep Ohio heritage on the tracks, while not having to worry about diesel emissions," Ohio EPA Director John Logue said. "Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad provides such a unique opportunity for Ohioans to explore some of the most picturesque landscapes in the Midwest, and it's an honor to contribute to that cause for generations to come."

The two locomotives currently contain 1959 Alco FPA4 diesel engines and operate as primary power for CVSR's scenic excursion trains. Both units are in daily seasonal service, logging more than 1,500 hours annually and pulling 4-8 passenger cars along the 26-mile route between Cuyahoga and Summit counties. Each trip carries more than 300 riders, offering a scenic rail experience.

These legacy engines consume approximately 12,800 gallons of diesel each year and collectively emit more than 700 tons of carbon dioxide. This directly impacts air quality in the national park that is visited by more than two million people annually.

"This grant from Ohio EPA marks an important milestone for Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad," CVSR President and CEP Larry Stevenson said. "Repowering our heritage locomotives from diesel to electric improves efficiency, supports our mission within Cuyahoga Valley National Park, and, most importantly, allows us to preserve the legacy of railroad travel by keeping these historic locomotives on the rails for future generations. We are grateful to Ohio EPA for their partnership and support."

"Building a strong partnership with Ohio EPA has been both productive and energizing," CVSR Director of Development and Community Relations Michele Savoldi said. "Our shared excitement in pioneering this historic initiative within a national park right here in Ohio demonstrates what collaboration can achieve."

The grants were funded with dollars allocated to Ohio from the settlement of an enforcement action taken against Volkswagen and its affiliated companies by the U.S. EPA and the state of California for violations under the Clean Air Act. The grant program invested \$75 million over a 10-year period to reduce nitrogen oxide pollution in Ohio.

A settlement filed in federal court allocated funds to states based on the number of vehicles with the illegal devices that were registered in each state.

Burke announces Garfield Hts. named to Top 10 in nation for best markets for first time homebuyers

Garfield Heights Council met Monday and heard Mayor Matt Burke, with obvious pride, announce during his Mayor's Report that Garfield Heights was named to the 10th spot for best markets for first time homebuyers in 2026 by the National Association of Realtors (NAR).

Cities named in NAR's Top Ten, starting with #1, were: Rochester, New York; Harrisburg, Pennsylvania; Granite City, Illinois; Birmingham, Alabama; North Little Rock, Arkansas; Syracuse, New York; Baltimore, Maryland; St. Louis Park, Minnesota; Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Garfield Heights, Ohio.

In the NAR ranking, Garfield Heights was shown to have a medium home listing price of \$140,000.

"Lower mortgage rates and larger inventory will attract buyers back to the market in 2026," said NAR Chief Economist Lawrence Yun.

"The top 10 housing hot spots for 2026 have a combination of strong demand potential, projected improvements in affordability, and, most critically, a housing stock that matches the budgets of the buyers who are returning to the market."

Legislation passed

The following legislation was passed by council at its Monday meeting:

- Adopting a new Planning and Zoning Code for the city, and repealing the existing Planning and Zoning Code, effective Feb. 16, 2026.

The city's current Planning and Zoning Code was originally adopted 63 years ago in 1962, and has been subject to countless unsystematic amendments and modifications over the decades, resulting in a cumbersome, often contradictory, and overly complicated set of regulations, the legislation states.

"There is an urgent municipal necessity to replace the antiquated code with a new, comprehensive and modern Planning and Zoning Code that incorporates clear definitions, illustrative graphics and an effective organizational structure," according to the ordinance that was adopted.

"The adoption of a new, easily usable code is directly linked to supporting the community's vision to facilitate increased business investment, encourage new housing opportunities and promote predictable development standards."

- Directing authorized city leaders to advertise for proposals for various materials, services and supplies for the year ending Dec. 31, 2026.

- Establishing a maximum amount for blanket certification for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 2026.

- Imposing a moratorium on the issuance and processing of all licenses, permits and certificates that would enable the cultivation, processing, distribution or sale of adult-use cannabis in the city for a period not to exceed six months.

Council has determined that a temporary moratorium on adult-use cannabis activities is necessary and appropriate to allow the city sufficient time to review, update and adopt zoning and land-use regulations consistent with state regulations and the city's ongoing Zoning Code Update Project.

- Renewing an agreement with the Cuyahoga Soil and Water Conservation District to participate in the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Program in 2026 and 2027.

Pursuant to the agreement, the city will continue to receive on-site technical assistance, storm water pollution prevention reviews, monthly inspections and related services for calendar years 2026 and 2027.

- Entering into an agreement with the Cuyahoga County District Board of Health (CCDBH) for the provision of Phase II Stormwater and Related Services to facilitate the city's compliance with its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Stormwater Permit.

The CCDBH provides various regulatory and technical services related to Phase II Stormwater management activities and will perform certain duties on behalf of the city to assist it in maintaining compliance with its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Stormwater Permit. The agreement between the city and CCDBH shall be effective from the date of execution through Dec. 31, 2030. The entire cost and expense for the services provided under this agreement will be funded by the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District. No financial contribution is required from the city of Garfield Heights.

•Resolutions ratifying the mayor's reappointment of Debra Sarnowski to serve as secretary to the city's Board of

Zoning Appeals and secretary for the Garfield Heights Planning Commission, both for four-year terms.

•Resolution ratifying the mayor's appointment of Johnathan Holland as a member of the city's Board of Zoning Appeals for the term effective Jan. 1, 2026, through Dec. 31, 2031.

•Authorizing the mayor to apply for and accept Placemaking Grant Funding from the Akron-Cleveland Association of Realtors.

In October 2023, the city, in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Planning Commission and the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority (GCRTA), initiated a study of Turney Road to evaluate its potential and readiness for Transit-Oriented Development (TOD). The results of that study determined that, with supportive policies and strategic development, along with the city's updated Zoning Code, the Turney Road corridor has the potential to become a regional asset and a transit-friendly "Downtown" for the city.

The Akron-Cleveland Association of Realtors offers Placemaking Grant funding in amounts up to \$7,500 for community asset improvements, including but not limited to street benches, lighting, wayfinding signage and enhancements to existing spaces.

The annual Taste of Turney event, held along the Turney Road corridor between Garfield Boulevard and Runnymede Avenue, has been identified as the intended event for the use of any such grant funding received in 2026, to strengthen the corridor's capacity for future growth and its role as a regional asset.

•Applying for and accepting grant funding for the development of a comprehensive Transportation Safety Action Plan from the Ohio Department of Transportation.

•Directing the deposit of cannabis tax revenues into the city's General Fund.

•Ratifying the mayor's appointment of Kimberly Motley as a member of the city's Planning Commission effective Jan. 1, 2026, through Dec. 31, 2032.

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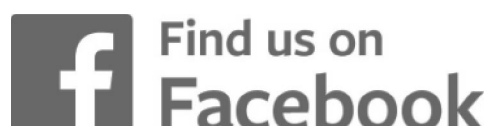

Criminal Damage-Residence

On Jan. 1, about 5:10 p.m., an officer was dispatched to a home in the 12800 block of Oakpark Blvd., for a criminal damaging report. The caller said he left his home on New Year's Eve and the next day located a bullet strike in the front of his house, just to the bottom right of his front window. He found the intact bullet lying on his front living room sofa. He waited to make the report until he was advised to do so for insurance purposes.

Traffic Offense-Fleeing

On Jan. 5, at about 8 p.m., police initiated a traffic stop in the E. 131 St. and Alvin Ave. area, on a blue Dodge Charger Scat Pack with no visible rear plate. While attempting to stop the vehicle, it was observed drifting across multiple lanes of traffic, appearing to search for an opportunity to evade officers. The pursuit of the suspect vehicle led officers to E. 131 St. and Miles, Lee Rd., Harvard Ave., Benwood, Edgewood, Corlett, Gay Ave., Kinsman, Shaker Blvd., Buckeye, E. 79 St. and Chester Ave., Hough area, and Superior. During the pursuit the driver of the vehicle showed disregard for public roadway safety, committing numerous traffic violations, such as driving on the opposite side of the roadway, failure to use lights, disregard for traffic signals and causing an accident with another vehicle. Officers lost sight of the vehicle at E. 79 St. and Superior Ave., and self-terminated the pursuit.

Officers returned to the scene of the accident at Buckeye Rd. and Opportunity Corridor to check for injuries. The involved driver said she was uninjured and the Cleveland Police Department had been notified and were en route to the scene. CPD said they had been attempting to locate the suspect vehicle, which had been reported stolen out of Sandusky, and provided a possible VIN for the vehicle. Total pursuit time was 13 minutes, with a maximum speed

of 90 mph. Suspect was still unknown at the time the report was written.

Assault

On Jan. 6, at 6:18 p.m., officers were dispatched to the 12100 block of Marguerite Ave., for a motor vehicle accident that had happened in the area. Police were advised that the caller claimed an assault had occurred after the accident, and that the other involved party was en route back to the police station to file a report as well. When police arrived on Marguerite, they met with the driver of a white Mazda who said that another vehicle had been trying to pass her but did not have enough room and struck the front end of her Mazda several times before getting passed her. Afterwards, the two drivers attempted to exchange information but a verbal dispute ensued. The driver of the other car struck the driver of the Mazda in the face, causing her earring to fall off. The Mazda driver then struck the other driver back for self defense reasons. After a short period of time the physical exchange ended. Police gathered information from the Mazda driver then headed back to the station to interview the other driver.

The other driver said she was a visiting nurse going home from work and she had gotten lost and turned onto Marguerite intending to turn back around. While attempting this she admitted to striking the front end of the other vehicle. While the two were exchanging information, the driver said the Mazda driver was irate the whole time, shouting at her and pointing her fingers in her face and pushing her head back multiple times. She said the Mazda driver then struck her in the face multiple times as the other driver attempted to defend herself, but was unsuccessful. After a moment, she said the Mazda driver was pulled off the other driver by a family member. A report will be sent over to the prosecutor for review.

Obstructing Official Business

On Jan. 12, about 9 p.m., officers were patrolling the Garfield Blvd. area when they observed a white Audi, and a random registration check showed the registered owner

had a felony warrant with Cleveland PD for larceny. Police activated emergency lights and sirens to conduct a traffic stop at Garfield Blvd. and Turney Rd. The car pulled over on Garfield Park Dr., and the driver, who was the registered owner, was immediately confrontational with officers and began yelling and cursing at them. He finally turned over his driver's license to officers after being asked multiple times. The license was run through dispatch and revealed that the suspect did have a felony warrant. He was advised by officers to get out of his vehicle but he refused. Police told him they would break his window and remove him from the car if he didn't comply. Officers explained to him that he was under arrest and to comply with lawful orders.

Another officer arrived on scene and repeated the demand that he exit the vehicle. The officer then broke the driver's front window and removed the suspect from the car with the help of one of the other officers. He was placed in handcuffs and walked to the back seat of the police cruiser, where he kept kicking the back passenger window. He was taken to city jail and charged with obstructing official business. Bond set at \$2500 or 10% surety. Cited for traffic control device and tinted glass. Warrant confirmed by CPD.

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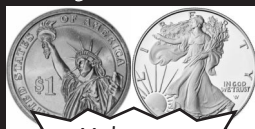

Amtrak Improvements Years Away

Legislation was introduced authorizing the city to give consent to the Director of Transportation of the State of Ohio to construct multi-modal transportation enhancements along E. 66 St., from Chester Ave. to Superior Ave. ODOT will construct multi-modal transportation enhancements, including pavement repair and minor widening, resurfacing, ADA crossings and signal upgrades,

Cuyahoga County property owners can now view and pay their tax bills online. Tax bills are posted on the County website and on Point & Pay. Property taxes must be paid online, in person or postmarked by Feb. 19, 2026. The Treasurer's Office will begin mailing physical copies of tax bills in late January. Those wishing to receive a courtesy copy of their physical tax bill early can call the Treasurer's Office at 216-443-7400 (option 1).

Property owners who are behind on their tax bills can learn about the County's Delinquent Tax Payment Plan options.

To better serve taxpayers, the Treasurer's Office will offer extended hours Tuesday - Thursday, February 17-19, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

County buildings will be closed on Monday, Feb. 16 in observance of the federal holiday.

Payment options

Property tax payment options include:

In Person: Taxpayers can make payment by cash, check, money order, and credit or debit card (fees apply) at the Treasurer's Office, located on the first floor of the County Administrative Headquarters at 2079 E. 9 St., Cleveland.

Taxpayers can also pay in person using check or money order via drop box at the Treasurer's Office, and at all Cuyahoga County Auto Title and Key bank locations.

By Mail: Taxpayers can pay by check, cashier's check or money order by detaching the bottom portion of their bills and sending them with payment to the Cuyahoga County Treasurer, 2079 E. 9 St., Cleveland, OH 44115. Please include the parcel number on the check or money order for faster processing.

Taxpayers who choose to mail their property tax payments should be aware of recent updates to United States Postal Service (USPS) postmark practices that may affect payment timeliness.

Postmark dates reflect when mail pieces are processed by USPS sorting machinery, which is not necessarily the date the mail pieces were placed in the mail. Because Ohio law relies on postmark date to determine whether a payment was made on time, taxpayers mailing payments close to a due date are strongly encouraged to allow additional mailing time, request an in-person, hand-stamped postmark at the Post Office counter, or use an alternative method of payment to ensure timely receipt.

Payments postmarked and received after the due date may be subject to penalties and interest charges.

By Phone: Taxpayers can pay via phone by check, or credit or debit card (fees apply) by calling 1-877-738-1212.

Online: Taxpayers can pay online by e-check (fee free), credit or debit card (fees apply).

Taxpayers are also encouraged to take advantage of EasyPay, a free and convenient service that allows taxpayers to make payments in monthly, semiannual or yearly installments.

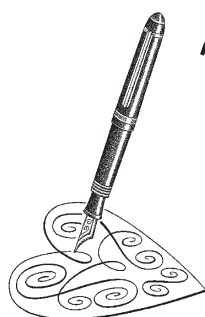
