ORG presents \$50,000 Cornerstone Partnership check to G.H. City Schools

School districts across Ohio continue to face significant funding shortfalls, forcing difficult decisions that often reduce or eliminate programming critical to student development beyond core academics.

Leadership training, career exploration and workforce readiness initiatives are frequently among the first programs impacted, leaving students underprepared for life after graduation.

To help address this growing gap, the Effective Leadership Academy (ELA) created its Cornerstone Partnership model, inviting businesses to invest directly in students by partnering with a school district of their choice. ORG, an investment company headquartered in Cleveland, is the first official Cornerstone Partner setting the standard for how private-sector leadership can directly support public education.

On Wednesday, Feb. 18, at 9 a.m., ORG presented a \$50,000 Cornerstone Partnership check to the Effective Leadership Academy in support of the Garfield Heights City School District and Superintendent Dr. Richard Reynolds at the Garfield Heights Civic Center, hosted by Mayor Matt Burke. The investment will fund ELA leadership and career readiness programming for middle and high school students over a two-year period.

In just one year of programming made possible by ORG's gift, 337 Garfield Heights students have already participated in ELA initiatives, including:

- 190 eighth-grade students in Career Pathways programming
- 125 sixth-grade students in Pathways to Success
- 22 high school students in the Career Leadership Academy

These programs provide structured leadership development, career exploration and workforce readiness training that equip students with the skills and confidence needed for success after graduation.

"This is what happens when education and business come together with a shared purpose," said Burke. "Our students benefit today, and our community benefits tomorrow."

ORG principals, Jonathan Berns and Ed Schwartz, selected Garfield Heights City Schools for this partnership, recognizing the district's commitment to preparing students for meaningful futures and the importance of strengthening the local workforce pipeline.

Garfield Heights man indicted by grand jury in death of Lyft driver

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O'Malley announced that a Cuyahoga County grand jury yesterday returned an indictment charging 20-year-old Derrek Dove with killing 56-year-old Antoine Latham while he was driving for Lyft in Cleveland.

It is alleged that on Feb. 8, 2026, around 10 p.m., Antoine Latham picked up Derrek Dove, along with at least two unknown suspects, for a Lyft ride with a drop-off location in the area of E. 102 St. and Rosehill Ave. in Cleveland.

During the ride, the suspects intended to rob Antoine Latham and fired, shooting him in the head, according to a press release from the prosecutor's office. Antoine Latham then crashed his vehicle into a guardrail in front of a residence near Rosehill Ave. and Woodhill Rd. Dove and the unknown suspects then fled the scene, police said. The Cleveland Division of Police (CDP) and Cleveland EMS responded to the scene. Latham was transferred to a nearby hospital and later pronounced deceased.

The investigation is being conducted by CDP and remains ongoing. Lyft records, phone records, and video surveillance linked Dove to the crime, police said. If you have any information about this incident, please contact CDP Homicide at 216-623-5464.

At this time, there is no evidence linking this incident to the Feb. 10, 2026, shooting of Lyft driver Vasyl Shvets, the prosecutor said.

New SNAP work requirements may impact eligibility to get benefits

Federal law changes from the One Big Beautiful Bill Act of 2025 (HR1) introduced changes to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), including new eligibility, work requirements, reporting, and administrative requirements that will affect thousands of families in Cuyahoga County.

According to the Cuyahoga County Department of Job and Family Services (JFS), SNAP now requires able-bodied adults from 18 to 64 years of age to work at least 20 hours a week (80 hours a month) to continue to receive their benefits. This includes working in a paid position, unpaid community service and certain employment and

training programs.

This also means that those who were previously exempt - such as those over 54, veterans, the homeless or those who have aged out of the foster care system - must meet these requirements. Those who have children under 18 are no longer exempt, only those with children under 14.

As of December 2025, JFS sent out letters informing those impacted by eligibility changes that they were in danger of losing their exempt status.

Despite the new requirements, there are still some exceptions. Adults between the ages of 60-64 could be eligible for exemptions if they are mentally or physically unable to work, pregnant, live with someone who is also an assistance group member under the age of 14, or an Indian, Urban Indian or California Indian. Other age groups may be eligible for these exemptions.

Those who are 59 years of age or younger may be exempt if they are students who are enrolled at least half time, people who are employed or self-employed and work at least 30 hours a week or those who are applying for or receiving unemployment benefits. Those in a drug addiction, alcoholic treatment or rehab program are also exempt.

Anyone who does not meet the new work requirement will be allowed to receive benefits for only three months in a three-year period until they submit proof that they meet the work requirement for 30 days or get an exemption.

A person who has satisfied the unpaid work hours requirement must complete the ABA Verification of Unpaid Hours form (Form number 07410). The form can be found online at www.odjfs.state.oh.us/forms/ and then submitted at ssp.benefits.ohio.gov or by mail or in person to the Cuyahoga JFS office at 1641 Payne Avenue, Cleveland, OH 44114.

Community police reports

Garfield Heights

Shots Fired

On Feb. 5, at 8:52 p.m., GHPD officers were dispatched to the 12000 block of Shady Oak Blvd. For numerous calls regarding shots fired.

Police canvassed the area through several side streets upon arrival. After some time officers cleared the scene with negative results in locating evidence pertaining to a shooting. No immediate people in the area were located who might have needed police assistance and no damage to the property could be identified. Police cleared from the scene. Same day later, police received a call from a female in reference to the shots fired call. She stated she had security footage that captured the audible noise of apparent gunfire.

Police responded to the area again with a more accurate location of possible gunfire and began canvassing the area. They soon located several spent casings on the north end of Shady Oak Blvd. After speaking to the homeowner who provided the video footage, police could hear approximately 11 obvious gunshots appearing to be in close proximity to the front of the house. The homeowner had no further video footage faced outside towards where the incident occurred.

A total of 9 silver-colored casings were located and collected as evidence. Officers continued canvassing the area for possible property damage with negative results.

Breaking and Entering

On Feb. 1, at about 8:20 p.m., officers responded to the police station lobby to take a walk-in theft report. The victim stated that some items were stolen out of his garage and believes it was on Friday, Jan. 23, but he noticed the items were missing only on Monday, Jan. 26. The stolen items were: gray/purple 4 Proteam back pack battery-powered vacuums, 1 Viper carpet cleaner, 1 Daytona carpet cleaner, a motor scrubber, 1 red/silver Dopple scrubber, a square scrubber, a Tentent floor cleaner and circle scrubber. There was also a Macbook that had been in a black carrying case laying on a work bench that was taken during the incident. The complainant needed the report for insurance purposes only; he didn’t wish to pursue the matter legally.

Theft

On Feb. 7, at 11:51 a.m., officers responded to the GHPD for a report of a theft. Upon arrival, the officer spoke to the victim on the phone, who stated that on Jan. 18, at 3 p.m., her fiance hired a moving company, “America Moving,” to move their 4 bedroom house belongings from Johnston Parkway in Garfield Heights to Michigan. She paid the movers \$1800, and they packed the truck with their belongings. On the listed date and time the movers called her and told her that they were outside of her new home to deliver her belongings. They requested an additional \$2,000 for the belongings to be

loaded off the truck. She refused to pay them any more money since they had already received \$1800. Then the movers left the residence in their Penske truck loaded with the family's goods and the woman followed them into Toledo, Ohio before she stopped her pursuit. She was able to take pictures of the men and their license plate. The complainant provided the list of stolen items: three bedroom sets, two TV’s, boutique clothing and mannequins, Nintendo Switch and Portable Nintendo, Nintendo games, shoes, toys, the victim’s cell phone, along with other belongings.

Disorderly Conduct

On Feb. 9, around 8:36 a.m., the school resource officer (SRO) at Garfield Heights Middle School responded to the second-floor hallway for a male student who was being disorderly with the school staff. The seventh grade principal explained that the student became disorderly when he was asked by staff to remove his hat and hoodie, which was against school rules. The principal said the student walked away down the hallway using profanity. The officer found the student on the second floor stairs and asked him to stop using profanity and being disrespectful towards the principal. The student continued to curse, calling the principal foul names in front of other school staff, students and the SRO. The officer gave the student time to calm down and advised him to come into his office and stop making a scene in the hallway. But the student continued cursing at the principal loudly. This caused other students to gather in the hallway to see what was going on and disturbing classes and taking away classwork time.

While the SRO escorted the student to a conference room, the student continued his disruptive behavior and foul language. In the conference room the student refused to take a seat and started kicking items in the room along with the heating vent. He continued to scream loudly and said that he wanted someone to call his mother. This behavior continued for approximately 20 minutes after the SRO asked him to stop screaming, yelling and cursing inside of the school. The student eventually was seated in a chair by the officer and was advised that if he did not stop his disorderly behavior he would be detained and charged with disorderly conduct.

The student started to calm down and the SRO called the boy's mother and informed her that her son’s behavior would be getting him suspended. While waiting for his mother to arrive, the student stated to the SRO that he was upset because the principal and the dean asked him to take his hat and hoodie off, while he felt other students still had their hats on. The student felt he was the only one being called out for not following the school rules.

His mother arrived to pick him up and was advised of the reasons her son was getting suspended for five days. The SRO said that pending the student's behavior for the rest of the school year, the report could be sent to the Juvenile Detective Bureau for criminal charges. However, he said the report would not be forwarded to pursue charges at this time. The student was advised to not get into any more trouble for the rest of the school year and was released to his mother.

Pair found guilty in death of 10-year-old boy

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Michael C. O’Malley announced yesterday that Jeffrey Grant, 35, and Lanaemarshe Grant, 34, were found guilty on all charges for shooting and killing 10-year-old Kaden Coleman in February 2025. They will be sentenced on March 5, 2026, at 9 a.m.

“A jury has spoken, delivering justice for Kaden Coleman. Friday’s verdict holds the defendants responsible for this senseless murder.”

On Feb. 7, 2025, a 35-year-old male was backing out of his driveway near E. 147 St. and Edgewood Ave., in Cleveland. A 36-year-old female was in the passenger seat and her 10-year-old son, Kaden Coleman, was in the backseat. Jeffrey Grant and an unknown male drove to the area of the residence in a rental car and approached the vehicle. The vehicle was shot multiple times and then they fled the scene. One of the bullets struck Kaden Coleman in the head.

The male and female then drove Kaden to Cleveland’s Fourth District police station where he was transported to a nearby hospital and pronounced deceased.

After further investigation, the police executed a warrant at a residence in Maple Heights. They discovered a drug lab in the basement with a large amount of drugs including over 550 grams of cocaine. Lanaemarshe Grant and Jeffrey Grant were present and arrested. Surveillance footage, clothing, cellphone data and records and the rental car linked Jeffrey Grant to the homicide.

On Feb. 13, 2026, Jeffrey Grant was found guilty by a jury on the following charges:

- Three counts of Aggravated Murder
- Two counts of Murder
- Two counts of Attempted Murder
- One count of Involuntary Manslaughter
- Four counts of Felonious Assault
- One count of Possession of Cocaine
- One count of Trafficking in Cocaine
- One count of Possessing Criminal Tools

On Feb. 13, 2026, Lanaemarshe Grant was found guilty by a jury on the following charges:

- One count of Involuntary Manslaughter
- One count of Possession of Cocaine
- One count of Trafficking in Cocaine
- One count of Possessing Criminal Tools

Additionally, Judge Michael Shaughnessy found them both guilty of one count of Having Weapons While Under Disability. They will be sentenced March 5, 2026, at 9 a.m.

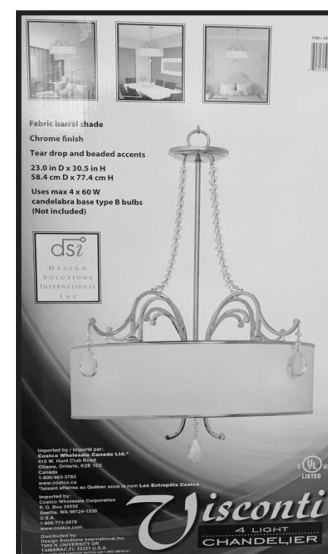

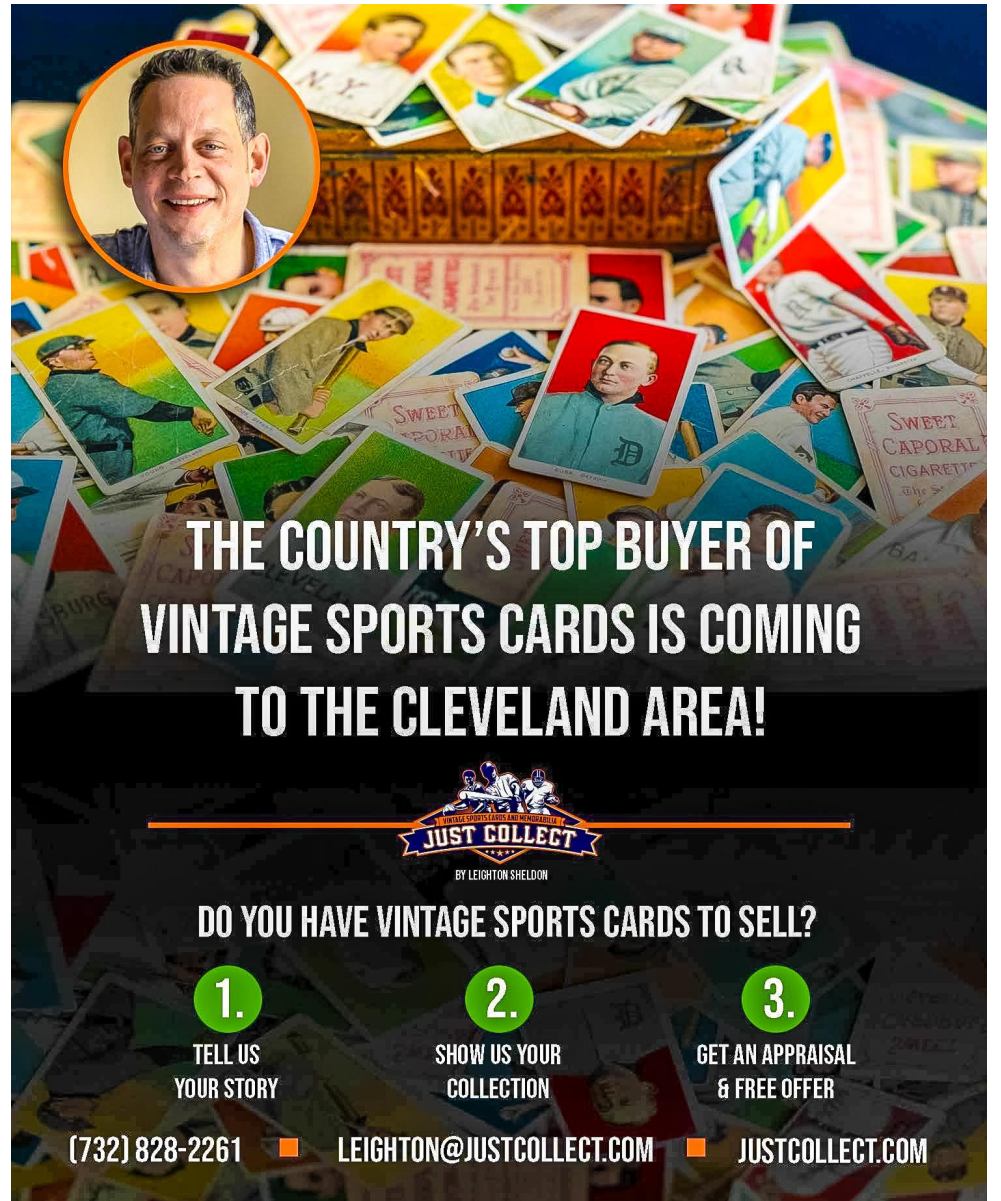
