Firefighters rescue animals from Garfield Heights house fire

The Garfield Heights Fire Department responded to a reported residential structure fire in the 4700 block of E. 90 St., early Tuesday afternoon, June 16.

At approximately 1 p.m., emergency crews were dispatched to the single-family home. Firefighters observed smoke coming from the eaves of the home and initiated an interior attack and brought the fire under control quickly.

No one was injured in the fire; however, two dogs and one cat were rescued. Aid was rendered to the animals in the yard prior to being transported to an emergency pet clinic by the resident and Garfield Heights PD.

The cause of the fire is currently under investigation; however, foul play is not suspected.

The GHFD was assisted on the scene by Maple Heights FD, Valley View FD, Cuyahoga Heights FD, Garfield Heights PD and local utility companies.

Why Little Free Libraries matter

Libraries are staples in our communities, providing inclusive spaces, avenues to learn and a community spirit. And on a smaller but equally powerful scale, LFLs do the same. Here are a few benefits they offer.

Connecting Communities: As they sit in front yards, next to parks and along sidewalks, Little Free Libraries (LFLs) invite casual connection and spark conversations between strangers and friends.

Boosting Book Access: In areas where public libraries and bookstores are few and far between, a LFL can be like finding an oasis in a desert. Filling essential gaps, these community-led libraries put books directly into the hands of people who need them most, encompassing all ages, incomes and backgrounds.

Promoting Literacy and Reading Joy: A recent study highlighted the impact these tiny libraries have in underserved communities. Of 768 surveyed students, 92% reported improved access to books through LFLs. And almost half said they were reading more often. What better way to kick off a lifelong love of reading?

Encouraging Sharing and Generosity: The very nature of LFLs is rooted in trust. Relying on the goodwill of people and their communities, they encourage sharing, generosity and mutual care.

Theft

On June 7, at 9:07 p.m., officers were dispatched to the area of Darlington and E. 128 St. for a report of a robbery. Police were advised that a juvenile and his adult brother had come to the police station lobby and said about a dozen juveniles took part in stealing a purple bicycle by force using Orbee guns. Officers toured the area and found a male juvenile riding a purple mountain bike matching the description of the stolen bike in the area of Wolf Ave. and E. 133 St. They spoke with him and he later admitted he had stolen the bike in retaliation for another incident. He had the Orbee gun in his backpack. His mother responded to the scene and the juvenile was released to her. The complainant clarified that several individuals had been shooting at him with Orbee guns but the suspect found on the purple bike was the one who had actually taken it after he left it near the sidewalk during the attack. The bike was returned to him and report forwarded to the Youth Bureau.

Menacing

On June 7, at 10:48 p.m., police arrived at a home in the 8400 block of Garfield Blvd., regarding several people arguing and preparing to fight. It was reported that a female all in black had a handgun and pointed it at victims. Police found no physical altercation in progress nor did they see a female all in black. One of those on scene told officers the female who brandished a firearm was sitting in the driveway inside a vehicle. They found two women in the car, one of them dressed all in black. Both were ordered to put their hands up and they did. One of the women told police the magazine to her handgun was in the glove box and her handgun was in her trunk. They were ordered out of the car and officers retrieved the handgun. The handgun owner told police that other females made threats to shoot someone, but she never brought her handgun out of her vehicle and never pointed it at anyone.

Another of the females said the woman wearing black did not point a gun at them but had it in her hand and chambered the gun and made threats of shooting them. The argument was caused when one of the females pulled her SUV into the driveway of the home and it broke down, blocking the other vehicle in. The three females all ran from the area and called 911 when encountering the woman with a gun. The woman in black with the gun was placed under arrest for aggravated menacing. She was taken by police to city jail and booked without incident. The SUV that broke down was eventually started and moved. Report forwarded to Detective Bureau.

Obstructing Official Business

•On June 15, at about 2:28 a.m., officers were dispatched to the 5100 block of E. 119 St., for an unwanted guest. Dispatch advised that two black males wearing all black with ski masks on were roaming through the neighborhood looking into people's homes. Once in the area police saw two juvenile boys matching the description walking east toward Wallingford. One of the officers attempted to make contact with them, but they continued walking east near Marymount Hospital. When officers ordered them to stop, they fled towards the McCracken apartments. Both juveniles were eventually detained and taken to the GHPD for processing. One of them had a bookbag which contained multiple screwdrivers and a small key which is typically used to break in and steal automobiles. Both juveniles were transported and turned over to their legal guardian, who was cited for failure to supervise and given a court date in Garfield Heights Municipal Court.

•On June 15, at 11:54 a.m., police were dispatched to the Sunoco station, 5326 Turney Rd., regarding reports of a solicitor. They saw a woman matching the description given sitting on the north side of the building. Management had said they wanted the woman off their property, which police relayed to her, but she refused to leave. She was ultimately placed under arrest for obstruction and refusing to identify herself. She was taken to city jail and placed in a holding cell. An inventory of her property revealed an ID with her name on it and an address in Oklahoma.

Before Cleveland became an industrial giant, it needed workers — and Polish immigrants answered the call.

Local author Tom Kaschalk will explore where Polish Clevelanders spent most of their lives: on the factory floor, in the mills and along the industrial corridors that powered the city's rise. From the stone quarries of Berea to the blast furnaces of Newburgh, from the looms of the Cleveland Worsted Mills to the machine shops and assembly lines of the East Side, this program traces the working lives of the men and women who helped build Cleveland.

Through historic photographs, neighborhood stories and newspaper accounts, Kaschalk connects these work-places to the communities that grew around them — places like Warszawa, Poznan, and Josephatowa — and the institutions they built, including churches, businesses and savings and loan associations.

This is more than industrial history. It is a story of grit, sacrifice and upward mobility — a generation that endured the heat, the dust and the long hours, and in doing so built the neighborhoods, families and opportunities that followed. The museum and beautiful gardens will be open during the event.

Law changes mean later property tax deadline for second half; must be postmarked by Aug. 13th

Recent changes to Ohio law will delay Cuyahoga County's second half property tax bills. To help ease the impact, the Cuyahoga County Treasurer's Office will give taxpayers extra time to make their payments.

Last year, in response to concerns about rising property values, the Ohio General Assembly passed several bills to provide property tax relief. Now that these laws are in effect, their implementation is causing delays in issuing tax bills and establishing due dates across the state.

"When this legislation was under consideration, Ohio's local officials warned the General Assembly that tax bill delays were a likely outcome," said Cuyahoga County Treasurer Brad Cromes. "Those delays are now here, and we're working closely with our partners to get tax bills in the mail as soon as possible."

The delay stems from House Bill 186, which created an "inflation cap credit" for taxpayers in school districts whose tax rates fall below the "20-mill floor." To calculate this credit, the Ohio Department of Taxation had to complete a one-time, mid-cycle adjustment to tax rates. Counties must also reprogram the software used to apply those rates to produce the tax bills.

The Cuyahoga County Treasurer's Office expects this work to be completed by mid-July, with printed tax bills mailed shortly thereafter.

Although the delay affects all Ohio taxpayers, the inflation cap credit will apply to only a few Cuyahoga County taxing districts. Those districts include Garfield Heights City School District, Independence Local School District, North Royalton City School District, Cuyahoga Valley Joint Vocational School District, and Polaris Joint Vocational School District.

"We expect these credits to be relatively small where they apply," added Treasurer Cromes. "Taxes due should remain more or less unchanged for taxpayers in all other districts, and for that reason, we encourage all taxpayers to consider paying early."

Participants in the EasyPay program, which allows taxpayers to make pre-payments in monthly installments, will see a final withdrawal on the originally scheduled date of July 15, 2026.

Real estate tax payments must be paid or postmarked by Aug. 13, 2026.

Missing Maple Hts. 6-year-old recovered in Houston

Last Thursday, June 18, the U.S. Marshals Service, Southern District of Texas, recovered a missing 6-year-old boy from Maple Heights and arrested D' Juan Younger, 37. Younger was wanted by the Maple Heights Police Department for interference with custody, according to a U.S. Marshals news release.

On June 16, 2026, the Maple Heights Police Department Detective Bureau requested assistance from the U.S. Marshals Service SPEAR Unit (Specialized Personnel for Enforcement, Apprehension and Recovery) in reference to this missing child. On June 15, 2026, the mother of the missing 6-year-old boy contacted the Maple Heights Police Department after it was believed that her child was abducted by D' Juan Younger.

The mother had arranged for the 6-year-old boy to be watched by family members over the past weekend and when she arrived to pick up her son, he was missing. It is alleged that Younger took the 6-year-old boy from the family member's residence without permission and then traveled to the Houston, Texas area. The mother of the child and the Maple Heights Police Department pleaded with Younger to return the boy, but he refused. Subsequently, the Maple Heights Police Department obtained a warrant against Younger for interference with custody.

The U.S. Marshals in Northern Ohio immediately sent information on the possible whereabouts of the boy and Younger to investigators with the U.S. Marshals in the Southern District of Texas. Within a day of receiving the information, they were able to locate Younger and the missing boy. The boy was safely recovered, and Younger was taken into custody without incident. Younger will remain in custody in Houston until he can be extradited back to Cuyahoga County to face the charges against him.

U.S. Marshal Pete Elliott stated, "I would like to commend the efforts and outstanding investigative work of the Maple Height Police Department. Their tenacity to bring criminal charges against this fugitive, and their willingness to request our assistance, allowed for a safe and speedy recovering of the child."
